WASHINGTON, May 8 .- Foreign Secretary Balfour declared in an epochal address in the Senate chamber today

"We English-speaking peoples have

purposes, and when the war broke out undoubtedly the Germans around the world, estimated the value from their point of view of the nations with whom they might be concerned and they decided that neither British nor American countries counted in the Union Depot at 8 o'clock last night to

"I speak with confidence about the issue of this great stringgle—a confidence which is redoubled since you have thrown in your lot with those who have been fighting since 1914. I see, indeed, suggestions that Germany, incapable of winning by arms, is going to win through the illegitimate weapon of submarine warfare. I believe it not. SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, May 5.— (Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—There are German submarines in the Atlantic and until very recently they have been supplied from the United States by ships flying the

United States by ships flying the American flag, according to statements by members of the crew of the steamer Manitowoc, which for several weeks was detained in the harbor at St. Thomas. Twenty-one of the crew are returning to the United States after difficulties with Captain F. Hogstead, master of the ship.

The Manitowoc, Muskegon and Aliaguash, all belonging to the same line, shortly before the Danish Islands became the Virgin Islands, United States of America, put into the harbor at St. Thomas bound from Buenos Aires to New York supposedly to "await orders." "After a heavy bombardment, including the discharge of a large number of gas shells," the dispatch reads, "the enemy this morning launched an attack in force in the region northeast of Fresnoy village, held by the Canadian troops. Our line was penetrated. The Germans did not long retain their advantage.
