

20 TEAMS TO COMB CITY FOR RED CROSS

Chairman W. B. Ayer Begins
Task of Assembling Teams
to Seek for Funds.

200 CANVASSERS NEEDED

State Delegates, Who Attended Conference in Portland Monday,
Return to Home Towns to
Press Campaign.

General Chairman W. B. Ayer, of the Red Cross campaign committee, yesterday morning took charge of the field work of Portland's big \$200,000 drive and from now until the end of Red Cross week, June 15-25, will devote his entire time to the work of raising Portland's share of the \$100,000,000 called for by President Wilson for this branch of the war work.

Mr. Ayer's first task is to assemble his organization of "teams" for the systematic canvassing of the city. As a result of Monday's conference with the visiting war council delegation, the local campaign committee decided to double the number of teams at first planned and to organize 20 instead of ten teams, each working under a captain. Under this plan 200 men will be needed and these are to be drawn from Portland's most prominent business men, able citizens and financiers.

Lists Being Prepared.

"Mr. Ayer is now working on his list," said Manager R. H. Strong, of the executive committee, last night, "and in making splendid progress. More than half of the men he has asked to abandon their business and give up their time and energies to this patriotic work have responded to the call. By noon tomorrow he hopes to have his list complete and the list will be immediately call a meeting of these workers, for the purpose of organizing the 20 teams for the mammoth drive."

"Meanwhile, we have a big clerical force at work making up lists to be canvassed, from the city directory, club rosters, etc., and otherwise preparing material for the systematic canvassing of all Portland. We do not want to overlook a single man, woman or child in presenting this opportunity for patriotic service."

Already Red Cross campaign headquarters, on the second floor of the Morgan building, presents a very industrious appearance. Scores of typewriters and desks have been moved in and stenographers are preparing lists and doing other work under the direction of the field workers.

In a separate department, L. G. Nichols, state field manager, is organizing his forces, with a big corps of workers.

Whole State Begins Task.

"Reports are already coming in from different parts of the state," said Mr. Nichols in an interview, "the delegates who attended Monday's conference in Portland have gone back home and are right to work, organizing their teams and following out the same plan as has been adopted for Portland. Every city and town in Oregon will be organized in this identical way and all will make the drive together, sending in daily reports to our headquarters here in Portland. We are looking for big results from the splendid spirit of enthusiastic co-operation that is being shown."

An eight-page inspirational bulletin, of which from 75,000 to 100,000 copies are to be printed, has been prepared and this bulletin will be placed in the hands of every Red Cross worker in the state. It contains full information about the methods and needs of the Red Cross, its relation to the Government and its important place in the war work. Another three-page bulletin, covering all details of the National war council plan of organization, will be sent to every unit working under the state field manager.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

John 19:16-30: Jesus Crucified.

CONNECTION.

After three stages of the ecclesiastical trial of Jesus, during which the charges were framed as, threefold, sedition, treason and blasphemy, there came three stages of the civil trial—before Pilate, then Herod and finally before Pilate again. Pilate was anxious to release Jesus because he knew he didn't deserve it; knew that the Jews were doing it in blind rage, and that he had favored a man who had already inflicted on him severe torture by scourging with the hope that it would satisfy the thirst of Christ's enemies for blood. He made effort to release him, and did everything but one. His deepest desire and strongest purpose was to hold on to his position. At last the issue was clear. If he released Jesus, the Jews, who hated him anyhow, would report at Rome that he had favored a man who claimed to be a king, and therefore a rival of Caesar. Pilate had to impose the sentence or run too great a risk.

THE LESSON.

The Crucifixion, 16-22.

"Then therefore he delivered him unto them to be crucified. They took Jesus therefore; and he went out, bearing the cross for himself, unto the place called in Hebrew Golgotha, where they crucified him, and with him two others, on either side one, and Jesus in the midst. And Pilate wrote a title also, and put it on the cross. And there was written, Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews. This title therefore read many of the Jews, for the place where Jesus was crucified was nigh to the city; and it was written in Hebrew, and in Latin, and in Greek. The chief priests of the Jews therefore said unto Pilate, Write not, The King of the Jews; but that he said, 'I am King of the Jews.' Pilate answered, 'What I have written I have written.'"

1. Stalker. It was not simply that he consented, but imposed the sentence on Jesus. The Roman law required and do with him all that their law permitted, for they couldn't impose the death sentence without the action of Rome. Crucifixion was a Roman method of execution, used mainly in the case of slaves and criminals. Pilate preferred this method in order to indicate that the King of the Jews was no better than a slave.

John gives very few details, says nothing about the mistreatment by the soldiers as they started for Calvary, gives no incidents of the march to the place, of laying the cross on Simon of Cyrene, of the remarks of the women as they passed along, of the offer of a stupefying draft prepared by the kind-hearted women, which

CAR EFFICIENCY ASKED

COMMERCIAL BUREAU APPEALS TO
AMERICAN SHIPPERS.

Loading of Cars Neater to Maximum
Capacity Held to Be Necessary
to Relieve Shortage.

A plea for a campaign on the part of business organizations throughout the country to help the Government cope with the car shortage, so that the Government may not be hampered in its movement of troops, has been issued by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce at Washington, D. C., and a copy of the message was received yesterday by the Portland Chamber of Commerce from E. E. Pratt, chief of the bureau.

"When our troops are actually in the field the demand for freight cars will be greatly increased," he says. "At the present time it is far beyond that of any previous time in our history."

The car service commission of the American Railway Association is working on the matter of co-ordinating freight traffic resources of the country, but Dr. Pratt points out that it will need the co-operation of all those who are interested.

Attention is called to the fact that a large percentage of freight cars are sent out loaded only to the minimum capacity fixed in the tariffs of the carriers, although the maximum safe capacity of the car is in some cases but a few inches less than the full load. Unless cars are loaded to the maximum and delays obviated there will not be enough cars to go around, with resulting hardships to everyone.
