

## BOND SUBSCRIPTION 36 PER CENT SHORT

Country at Large Is Far Below Quota, Although New York Is 25 Per Cent Ahead.

NO MORE TIME GRANTED

San Francisco Reserve District Is Nearly 63 Per Cent Behind, According to Reports in Hands of Government.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Treasury officials announced today that the liberty loan apparently was short \$342,000,000 of full subscription Tuesday night, two and one-half days before the closing of the books.

Announcement was based on actual returns forwarded by banks and trust companies to the 12 reserve banks, accompanied by the two per cent of subscriptions required.

A tremendous 11th-hour drive throughout the Nation, officials hope, will bring the final count of dollars well beyond the \$2,000,000,000 mark. The only tangible evidence on which to base an estimate, however, are the returns from the reserve banks as of the close of business last night. These show total actual subscriptions of \$1,658,000,000, distributed among reserve districts as follows:

New York, \$758,000,000; Boston, \$161,000,000; Philadelphia, \$23,000,000; Richmond, \$55,000,000; Atlanta, \$25,000,000; Chicago, \$184,000,000; Cleveland, \$153,000,000; St. Louis, \$100,000,000; Minneapolis, \$50,000,000; Kansas City, \$58,000,000; Dallas, \$29,000,000, and San Francisco, \$52,000,000.

New York 25 Per Cent Ahead.

New York not only exceeded the minimum allotment but it has topped the maximum of \$750,000,000 by \$8,000,000.

Here is the apparent shortage in each reserve district, based upon the latest returns and the minimum allotments: Boston, \$78,000,000, or 53 per cent; Philadelphia, \$27,000,000, or more than 40 per cent; Richmond, \$25,000,000, or more than 30 per cent; Atlanta, \$22,000,000, or more than 53 per cent; Chicago, \$76,000,000, or more than 29 per cent; Cleveland, \$27,000,000, or 15 per cent; St. Louis, \$23,000,000, or more than 40 per cent; Minneapolis, \$50,000,000, or 27 1/2 per cent; Kansas City, \$42,000,000, or 42 per cent; Dallas, \$11,000,000, or more than 27 per cent; San Francisco, \$38,000,000, or nearly 63 per cent.

Analysis of these figures discloses that outside of New York the country apparently has failed, to last night, by exactly \$500,000,000 to take its minimum allotment of \$1,400,000,000 of the bonds, the other \$300,000,000 minimum being allotted to New York. Thus, while the New York district has over-subscribed its minimum allotment by approximately 25 per cent, the rest of the country as a whole apparently has fallen 26 per cent under its minimum.

Noon Friday Is Limit.

The closing hour of noon Friday is not to be extended, notwithstanding widespread rumors to the contrary. The closing hour will be the standard time of the section of the country in which such reserve banks are situated and will apply to all banks in that reserve district.

Secretary McAdoo, home after his second speaking tour of the liberty loan and just before leaving for Baltimore to make his last speech for the loan, issued a statement in which he said:

"A tremendous interest has been aroused in the liberty loan throughout the country. On my recent trip I found everywhere a spirit of enthusiasm and patriotic co-operation among all classes of the people. It is gratifying to find America aroused in indomitable and invincible.

Great Triumph Expected.

"The liberty loan will be a success if the work is continued to the present high pitch of interest and efficiency until June 15. Should the final returns on June 15 disclose that the liberty loan has exceeded its minimum or more than in full it will be a distinct triumph; it will be a superior record to that of any other war loan or the belligerent powers in the flotation of its first war loan.

"This loan, the total of which is \$2,000,000,000, is the most colossal piece of financing ever undertaken in the United States. I urge every patriotic organization, every patriotic club, every private corporation, and every individual working for the success of the liberty loan to continue their efforts with renewed vigor and enthusiasm for the remaining two days. If they do this, as I know that they will, the first great victory of this war for liberty and democracy will have been won."

## EQUAL PAY MOVE GROWS

MRS. CARRIE CHAPMAN CATT CALLS FIGHT TO CABINET.

Secretary Redfield Orders Preference for Women in Clerkships to Release Men for War.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, today carried her "equal pay for equal work" fight into the Cabinet and called on the heads of the Government departments to record themselves on whether they favor a man's pay for a woman who does his work. Secretary Redfield yesterday ordered preference for women in clerkships to release men for military duty.

Under the campaign the Pennsylvania Railroad, the United Cigar Stores Company and other large corporations have subscribed to the "equal pay for equal work" slogan.

## 2 MONTHS GIVEN BRITAIN

GERMAN ADMIRAL PREDICTS COMPLETE U-BOAT VICTORY.

Assurance Is Repeated in Reichstag as Proof to Doubters; Russian Separate Peace in Doubt.

COPENHAGEN, June 13, via London. England is given less than two months of life by Herr Von Heydebrand, conservative leader in the Reichstag. In a speech to his electors he quoted a German Admiral as saying:

"We hope, yes we are certain, that in two months at the most the condi-

tion of the English will be such that Great Britain will be finished." Herr Von Heydebrand had asked the Admiral whether he believed Germany could win a complete victory through the submarine campaign. The Admiral's confident reply was used by the Conservative leader to confound "doubters and lukewarm individuals" found among the German masses, who are questioning in increasing degree the political and military efficacy of ruthless submarine warfare.

Herr Von Heydebrand also gave warning against hope of a separate peace with Russia and a consequent easy victory over Germany's other opponents.

"French in One Lesson" Taught to U. S. Marines.

"Wake Me Up When Dinner Is Ready" Is Just as Easy When You Know How.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—"Ray-vay-mwah kong ler dee-nay ser-ah pray," is the proper way to tell a Frenchman to wake you up when dinner is ready, according to a little "French in one lesson" that has been distributed among the United States Marines who are going to France.

Every sea-soldier on the firing line will be supplied with a handy little pocket dictionary that contains about a thousand practical words and phrases, together with the phonetic pronunciation, according to Hannibal, Charlemagne, or whoever it was that originated the French language. It is just the size to fit handily into the breastpocket of a uniform. Doubtless the little polli will lend a hand to his American comrade when he comes to a particularly knotty problem. Should the sea-soldier become peeved at the intricacies of the language he may say: "Ock-oo-pay"—just like that. It means "why."

## 38 MORE BRITONS SUNK

22 OF NUMBER ARE OF MORE THAN 1000 TONS EACH.

Six Are Fishing vessels; 23 Attacked Unsuccessfully; 2707 Arrive and 2522 Depart.

LONDON, June 13.—The weekly shipping report issued by the Admiralty today states that 22 British merchantmen of more than 1000 tons were sunk. Ten merchantmen of less than that tonnage also were sunk, together with six fishing vessels.

A summary of the report follows: Arrivals, 2707; sailings, 2522. British merchant ships over 1000 tons sunk, by mine and submarine, including one previously, 22; under 1000 tons, including one previously, 10. British merchant ships unsuccessfully attacked, including seven previously, 23. British fishing vessels sunk, 6.

"PRINCE" TAN IS DEAD

Chinese Actor, Favorite of ex-Emperor, Passes at 72.

PEKIN, May 13.—(Correspondence of the Press.)—"Prince" Tan, said to be the most influential actor China has known, is dead at the age of 72. Of humble parentage, he was the nominal title of Prince before the end of the Manchu regime and it clung to him during the republic. Tan was the favorite of the late Grand Empress Dowager Tzu Hsi and was a great political factor under the Tsing dynasty.

His salary was once reputed to be nearly 10 times that of the Prime Minister of China, being put at \$15,000 a month, and during the last years of his life he was paid \$200 for every public or private appearance, his average time on the stage for a performance being one hour.

## ANARCHIST SENT TO PRISON

Three Years and \$10,000 Fine Imposed for Anti-Draft Acts.

NEW YORK, June 13.—Louis Kramer, confessed anarchist, was sentenced today to three years in Atlantic Prison and ordered to pay a fine of \$10,000 for conspiracy to distribute anti-conscription literature. Kramer also received a year in jail for failing to register.

Morris Becker, convicted with Kramer on the conspiracy charge, was sentenced to one year in the same prison at Atlanta. When sentence was pronounced there was loud applause from the spectators.

## FILM OFFERED AT TRIAL

Mooney Defense Objects to Moving Picture of Bomb Wreckage.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13.—Attempts by the prosecution to introduce as evidence about 1000 feet of moving-picture film of the scenes at the explosion three minutes after it occurred was "vigorously contested by the attorney for the defense today."

Superior Judge Emmett Seawell said he would review the films before making a decision.

Petrograd Socialists Win.

LONDON, June 13.—A Petrograd dispatch to Reuters states that the Socialists, comprising the Revolutionary Socialists, Democratic Socialists and Laborites, carried the election in the Petrograd district for members of the municipal council. In the election universal suffrage for women was applied for the first time in Russia.

Two Killed by Tornado.

TRENTON, Mo., June 13.—Reports from the district of Mercer County, Missouri, north of Princeton, swept by a tornado yesterday, placed the dead at two with several persons injured. The property damage was heavy, many houses being destroyed and numerous livestock killed.

Spanish Neutrality Forecast.

MADRID, June 12, via Paris, June 13. Eduardo Dato, Premier of the new Spanish Cabinet, declared today that the return of Marquis de Lema to the post of Minister of Foreign Affairs was a guarantee that the new Spanish government would continue to follow a policy of absolute neutrality.

Forty Utah Slackers Arrested.

SALT LAKE, June 13.—Forty men have been arrested in Utah within the last three days charged with failing to register for conscription. It was announced by the Federal Department of Justice here today.

Five Lane County Boys Enlist.

EUGENE, Or., June 13.—(Special.)—Recruiting Sergeant C. J. Bradley announced today that five Lane County boys had enlisted in the Marine Corps since Monday. Eugene's quota is 20 for Marine Corps week, he stated.

## GREAT WAR BUDGET SENT TO PRESIDENT

Senate Passes Measure After It Finds Shipping Board Cannot Oust Goethals.

THREE BILLION AVAILABLE

Bill Appropriates Money for Every Military Purpose, Including Merchant Marine and Pay for Men at Reserve Camps.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—The \$3,000,000,000 war budget finally got over the last obstacle in Congress today and went to President Wilson for his signature.

It appropriates the greatest sum ever voted at one time by any legislative body. Its amount is greater than the total cost of the Civil War.

The budget provides principally for Army and Navy expenditures. Aside from that feature its most important single provision is an appropriation of \$750,000,000 for an American merchant marine, to be constructed by the shipping board under the direction of Major-General Goethals.

At the last moment there was a question in the Senate whether the language which placed General Goethals in charge of the work had been sufficiently definite so he could not be forced out of office without consulting Congress. It was explained that although the House had changed the Senate's language in that regard, it was satisfactory to General Goethals.

Objection to the conference report on the ground it failed to make it impossible for the Shipping Board to remove General Goethals from office should it so desire, was made by Senators Lodge, of Massachusetts, and Smith, of Michigan.

"Congress and the country have confidence in Goethals and mean to keep him where he is, but that is not the plan of the Shipping Board," said Senator Lodge. "The bill provided for General Goethals by name, but that was cut out in the House."

Senator Martin, in charge of the bill, assured the Senate that there was no intention to remove General Goethals. Senator Smith attacked the Shipping Board, saying:

"The Board has appeared before our committee several times and if they have any large capacity, they have yet to demonstrate it."

In addition to funds for innumerable military purposes, the bill appropriates \$100 a month for men in reserve officers' training camps.

Seattle with a quota of \$8,200,000 and Seattle with the \$7,800,000 mark. Neither San Francisco nor Los Angeles, whose allotments, based on their respective banking resources, were not greater than Portland's, had subscribed up to the minimum.

Large Orders May Wait.

If the loan is greatly over-subscribed in the country at large, it is expected that the Treasury Department will cut down the subscriptions of some of the larger applicants, or apply the difference on the next loan, which doubtless will be floated before the end of the year.

It is the expressed intention of the Government not to cut down the size of any of the smaller subscriptions. Employees of the North Bank Railroad took an aggregate of \$60,000 in bonds yesterday. They were handled by the Northwestern National Bank. Additional applications are pouring in from employees in the territory outside of Portland and are expected to bring the total up to \$70,000 at least. The company has arranged to underwrite these subscriptions, allowing employees to pay for them on the installment plan.

Bricklayers Buy Bonds.

The O. W. R. & N. Company has allotted approximately \$140,000 of the purchases made by its employees with the Portland committee. The aggregate subscriptions by employees of the company probably will reach \$200,000. The original estimate was only \$250,000. Employees have arranged to make the payments on small monthly installments. The purchases have been distributed between the Northwestern and the United States National.

One of the notable subscriptions yesterday was the one for \$200 made by Bricklayers' and Masons' International Union No. 1. This sum represents the entire surplus of the organization.

It is understood that other labor unions are arranging to buy bonds today.

Department Store Takes \$15,000.

Employees of the Olds, Wortman & King store last night subscribed to \$15,000 worth of bonds, which will be handled on the installment plan.

The Columbia Contract Company, which previously had subscribed for \$100,000, yesterday took out an additional \$45,000.

The Hawley Pulp & Paper Company subscribed \$25,000, and Eva A. Hawley, a member of the firm, \$25,000.

John Yeon Takes \$10,000.

Other big subscriptions yesterday were \$25,000 by the Mitchell, Lewis & Staver Company; \$10,000 by John E. Yeon; \$10,000 by C. S. Jackson, and \$10,000 by members of Mr. Jackson's family; \$5000 by the Portland Seed Company; \$2500 by Nathan Strauss; \$10,000 by John Trommald; Mary F. Felling; \$5000; Henrietta E. Felling; \$5000; Ira F. Fellers Furniture Company; \$2500; Rogers, Hart & Gibson Company; \$3000; A. P. Henningson; \$2500; Edgar W. Smith; \$2500; Miller, Calhoun & Company; \$2500.

S. Benson, who previously had subscribed \$50,000, yesterday subscribed an additional \$50,000, while his son, A. S. Benson, who already had taken \$10,000, took out an additional \$15,000.

The Citizens Bank doubled its \$10,000 subscription.

The Lumbermens National Bank subscribed an aggregate of \$133,000, while the bank of George W. Bates & Company took \$20,000.

The Northern Pacific Terminal Company and employees subscribed a total of \$18,000, which was sent to headquarters yesterday.

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TACOMA IS OVERSUBSCRIBED

Bankers and Business Men Renew Efforts to Increase Bond Sale.

TACOMA, Wash., June 13.—(Special.)—Tacoma has subscribed its quota of \$2,200,000 in United States liberty bonds. The grand total is \$2,233,300.

Efforts of Tacoma bankers and business men today were directed to over-subscribing this quota by the greatest possible sum. Southwestern Washington today passed \$750,000 in subscriptions out of a total of \$1,700,000 set aside by the Federal Reserve Bank at San Francisco.

The Tacoma Smelter today subscribed \$150,000 to the liberty loan, the largest single subscription with the exception of the Tacoma banks. This is in addition to the subscription of smelter employees. The largest bank subscription is that of the National Bank of Tacoma for \$100,000.

H. Y. Walker, manager of the Tacoma Smelter, today said the big subscription was taken for no other reason than loyalty and patriotism to the Government of the United States.

Employees of the Tacoma Smelter are divided into teams representing the different departments. Each team today more than \$23,800 had been subscribed, with subscriptions coming in rapidly.

The last count of the banks yesterday showed a total of \$1,960,350.

Utah Exceeds Loan Portion.

SALT LAKE, June 13.—Utah over-subscribed its allotment of \$5,500,000 in liberty bonds when subscriptions of \$700,000 were announced today by the committee in charge.

John D. Buys More Bonds.

NEW YORK, June 13.—John D. Rockefeller today made a "prince" \$5,000,000 subscription to the liberty loan.

## RUSSIAN MISSION LANDS

WAR MESSENGERS ARRIVE AT AMERICAN PACIFIC PORT.

Party to Extend Petrograd's Greetings and Arrange for Aid From United States.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—The Russian mission to the United States, headed by Boris A. Bakmeteff as a special ambassador, has landed at a Pacific port. The party, consisting of about 40 members, will stop first at Seattle, Wash., and proceed at once to Washington.

The mission passed through Yokohama about 10 days ago and consequently made a quick and easy trip. Baron Ungern, one of the secretaries of the Russian Embassy here, met the party and will escort it across the continent to Washington. In Chicago Brookbridge Long, Third Assistant Secretary of State, will join the mission. Such courtesies as were extended to the visiting French, British and Italian special missions will be extended to Ambassador Bakmeteff and his party.

The head of the Russian mission comes to Washington in a double capacity, first as the head of the extraordinary embassy sent by the provisional government, to extend to the United States Government its thanks for entry into the war on the side of the entente allies, and second, as Ambassador resident until such time as the visiting French, British and Italian special missions will be extended to Ambassador Bakmeteff and his party.

WAR PLANT IS WRECKED

Many Persons in French Munitions Factory Injured.

PARIS, June 13.—The French Ministry of Munitions today announced this afternoon that an accident had happened in one of the principal automobile factories in France, near Lyons. A large number of wounded, it was said, had been taken to the hospital. The ruins of the factory were being searched.

No definite information had thus far been obtained concerning the number of dead and wounded.

## CANADIAN PRESS UNITES

NATIONAL NEWS ASSOCIATION IS ORGANIZED BY DAILY PAPERS.

System of Leased Wires From Coast to Coast With Day and Night Service Is Proposed.

TORONTO, June 13.—At the annual meeting here today of the Canadian Press, Limited, which includes in its membership practically all the daily paper publishers of the Dominion, the plan for the Canadian National News Association, which already has been approved by the existing Canadian cooperative news gathering and distributing organizations, was adopted unanimously.

Melville E. Stone, general manager of

the Associated Press, who was present, congratulated the publishers and people of Canada on this great forward step toward National unity and solidarity, pointing out how the proposed system of leased wires from coast to coast day and night would tend to bring all parts of the Dominion into the closest association.
