SERMON IS AT NOONDAY

REV. HAROLD GRIFFIS TELLS OF "SPLENDID UNANIMITY."

Young Pastor of First Christian Church Speaks Inspiringly Upon Patriotic Theme.

A patriotic address on "Our Splendid Unanimity—a noon meeting in a downtown church attended by men and women who united enthusiastically in singing "America"—this on a busy week day, attracted the attention of those who passed along Broadway yesterday at 12:30 o'clock when the interdenominational Friday noon assembly was being held in the Unitarian Church.
The sermon was given by a young pastor, Rev. Harold Griffis, of the First Christian Church, who spoke inspiringly on his patriotic theme. He spoke of the war entered by the United States without desire for conquest, without hate, but with a desire to uphold the spirit of democracy and to wipe out autocracy and militarism. His audience included men and women

of the business and professional world, a number of prominent ministers, shop girls and office men devoting their lunch time to the patriotic and religious service.
"View of our splendid unanimity as regards the great issues of the hour," said Mr. Griffis, "let us thank God and take courage. The fight is the struggle is splendid, and yet with this wholesome unity of thought purpose on the part of a great freedom-loving people the outcome is not uncertain. We shall remember that progress has ever been bought with a price, that the sweetest graces and noblest achievements of the race have sprung from a soil that has been enriched by human blood, and that all down through the centuries the pathway of life, like the Apian Way, has been lined with crosses. As the poet has put it—
"'Tis weary watching wave on wave,
And yet the tide heaves onward;
We build like corals, grave on grave,
But have a path that's onward,
The bester back in many a fray,
Yet ever strength we'll borrow;
And where the vanguard rests today
The rear will camp tomorrow."

DRAFT DATA HERE SOON

CREDIT GIVEN FOR MEN IN NATIONAL GUARD.

Adjutant-General White Hastens Allocation of Draft Credits to Various Counties.

Definite instructions about the method to be used in drawing Oregon's first quota of men under the selective draft system are expected to be given out by the War Department in the next few days.
In the meantime, Adjutant-General White is busy making the allocation, as it is called, of draft credits to be allowed each county in the state. In other words, he is locating, and reporting to the War Department, the home county of every man now in the Oregon National Guard. When the draft is made, each county will receive credit against its required quota for the number of men it has serving in the National Guard.
Suppose, for example, that a county were required to furnish 100 men and already had 50 men serving in the Na-

tional Guard. It would consequently have to furnish only 50 more to make up its allotment.
In making the allocation, the home counties of the men are considered, not the county in which they happened to enlist.
To obtain this data, which had been called for immediately by the War Department, desires to have full information to keep the wires humming through five states in which detachments of Oregon troops are on detail, yesterday.
A tabulated statement of the credits allowed the various counties cannot be given out at this time, General White explained, as the War Department desires to have full information available before publicity is given it.

Business Men to Picnic.

After a pell-mell week spent speeding with the Red Cross regiment, Progressive Business Men, with their wives and families, will recuperate at a picnic to be given tomorrow at the Weed Peony Farm at Beaverton. All kinds of amusement will be provided for old and young. Over 30,000 peonies are now in bloom at the farm. A large number of the members have signified their intention of going on the trip. Members will go early by automobile. Southern Pacific Electric or Oregon Electric to Beaverton.

SHAD HATCHERY STARTS

STATE INSTALLS EQUIPMENT NEAR ASTORIA.

Eggs Float in Jars 70 Hours Before Hatching, and Young Fish Are Released at Once.

ASTORIA, Or., June 22.—(Special)—A shad hatchery is being established by the state fisheries department on the Adams ranch in the Young's River district. Deputy Warden Rathbun is here installing the hatchery, which is to be under the charge of James Bailey, an employe at the Government hatchery on the Clackamas River. The new plant is close to several fish traps in Young's River and arrangements have been made with the owners to secure fish from these traps for spawning purposes.
A shad hatchery is much different from a salmon hatchery, as no troughs are used. The eggs are simply placed in jars and running water turned into them. The eggs, which are transparent, float on the top of the water and hatch in about 70 hours. The young

fish are then released immediately. As a result of this plan, while a small one, can handle all the eggs that can be secured.
The run of shad into the Columbia this year has been almost a failure and the department is making an effort to build up the supply of this fish, for which there is a heavy demand in the market.

JUDGE PAROLES PRISONER

Thirty Days of Year's Sentence of Palmer Wilson is Remitted.

Palmer Wilson, who last Fall pleaded guilty to an indictment charging him with contributing to the delinquency of a minor and who was sentenced to serve a year in the County Jail, was paroled yesterday by Presiding Judge Kavanaugh, 30 days before his sentence would have expired.
Wilson's ill health played a big part in his benefiting by the leniency of the court, as it was stated he is suffering from an incurable affection of the bones. His condition has become serious during confinement.
Granting of a parole by the court to a prisoner who had served a major portion of his sentence is said to have

established a precedent in the local courts.

Hellx Farmland Pays Fine.

PENDLETON, Or., June 22.—(Special)—Bruce Hamilton, young Hellx farm hand, who claimed to be 21 when securing liquor last Fall, but failed to register in the war census, pleaded guilty yesterday here to a charge of having made a false affidavit as to his age and paid a fine of \$50. He showed that he was not yet 21.
