

WORLD MARKETS OPEN TO LUMBER

Members of Federal Trade Commission Give Encouragement to Producers.

SOUTH AMERICA FIELD BIG

Extension of Trade to Foreign Countries Possible Before War Is Over. Southern Europe Expected to Make Heavy Demands.

As soon as the war is over—and many believe before—Northwestern lumber manufacturers will have a tremendous opportunity of extending their markets into Europe and South America.

FILLING OF ORDERS IS BIG PROBLEM

West Coast Lumber Association Considers Caring for Large Federal Business.

SHIPS NEED VAST AMOUNT

Demand Already Has Reached Approximately 170,000,000 Feet. Distribution of Orders Delayed for Lack of Information.

Secretary Allen of the association, who not only has secured successive heavy orders for lumber but has induced the Government to modify its ruling with reference to deckload charges on movements through the Panama Canal.
