COSSACKS SEIZE VILLA

CRIMINALS AMONG ANARCHISTS ARE ARRESTED.

Bombs Thrown at Soldiers of Provisional Government Fail to Explode. Afia Kills Himself.

PETROGRAD, July 3.—A force of Cossacks acting under orders from the provisional government raided the villa of former Minister Durovov, which since the revolution has been the headquarters of Maximalists and anarchists, many of whom were returned from Siberia. The government has given orders to arrest criminals among the anarchists and also persons who helped to release offenders detained in the Krest prison. When the Cossacks entered the yard several bombs were thrown by anarchists. The bombs, however, failed to explode.

The Cossacks did not reply, but on entering the villa they found the body of a well-known anarchist named Afia, whose comrades declared he had committed suicide. Arrests were made and the villa is now in the hands of the troops.
