

50,000 MEN ARE MOVING ON PEKIN

Republicans Appear to Be About to Prevent Restoration of Manchus.

RAILROAD LINE WRECKED

American and Japanese Forces Are Sent to Restore Communication and Government Is Warned That Line Must Be Open.

TIENTSIN, July 6.—Fifty thousand soldiers of the Republican forces are converging on Peking and the attempt to restore the Manchu dynasty appears to be at the point of failure.

By midnight Tuan Chi Jui, who has been appointed commander in chief of the punitive expedition, was expected to have 20,000 troops between Tientsin and Peking. Large forces are coming up from the south along the Hankow Railway, 1000 soldiers are advancing.

General Chang Hsun, the dictator who attempted to restore the monarchy, has only some 2000 men.

Dictator's Troops Deserting.
Tuan Chi Jui today addressed an ultimatum to Chang Hsun's troops, promising them more favorable treatment if they would lay down their arms.

The Northern military leaders believe Chang Hsun will be deserted by his troops when the strength of the Republican forces is realized. It is rumored that part of Chang Hsun's forces already have deserted him. Fifteen provinces are supporting Tuan Chi Jui.

PEKIN, July 6.—Fighting began yesterday at Lang Fang, about 35 miles southeast of Peking, between the troops of General Chang Hsun, supporter of the monarchy, and the forces of the Republicans.

Capital Is Terror-Stricken.
The situation in the capital is becoming serious. Trains are filled with fleeing Chinese going to Tientsin. The hotels are full of foreigners. Small American and Japanese forces are endeavoring to come from Tientsin, but their arrival may be delayed by the fighting at Lang Fang where 5000 of the troops of General Chang Hsun are opposing an advance guard of 20,000 Republicans.

The position of General Chang Hsun, the leader of the royalist movement, apparently is hopeless. It is feared that when this is realized his troops will loot Peking. The legations are prepared for all eventualities.

Tuan Chi Jui, commander-in-chief of the Republican forces, has issued a lengthy manifesto denouncing Chang Hsun, saying that his action is villainous and declaring he is using the Manchus to further his own ambitions. Tuan Chi Jui promises generous treatment for the Manchus after the republic is restored.

Three thousand Imperialist troops and 1000 of Chang Hsun's soldiers have taken position astride the Peking-Hankow Railway four miles from this city, ready to oppose 10,000 troops commanded by Tsao-Kun.

The diplomatic representatives have warned the government that the protocol of 1901 requires maintenance of and free passage of the Peking-Shanghai Railway.

SHANGHAI, July 6.—The situation in North China, according to reports received here, is becoming more complex and several parties have arisen with the avowed purpose of displacing General Chang Hsun.

The bureaucratic Republicans, headed by Tuan Chi Jui, already are marching toward Peking with Tuan at the head of the Eighth Chi Li division.

Cruiser Sent for President.
Feng Kwon Chang, ex-Vice-President, is declared to be making attempts to become the head of the provisional government at Nanking. Republicans here have dispatched the cruiser Hai Chi to Chinwangtao, on the Gulf of Lian Tung, in an effort to persuade Li Yuan Hung, the deposed President, to leave Peking and come to Shanghai.

LONDON, July 6.—Reuter's Shanghai correspondent, in a message filed Thursday, reports that Chang Hsun's troops on that day tore up the Peking-Tientsin Railway at Lang Fang. Foreign troops are being sent to restore communications. The provinces generally are calm. Chang Hsun stands virtually alone, the dispatch says.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—Fung Kuei Chung, vice-president of the Chinese republic, was elected temporary President of the republican government today by military governors of provinces opposed to restoration of the monarchy, according to cable dispatches received here late today by the Chinese World, a local Chinese newspaper.

BANK GOVERNOR RESIGNS
Archibald Kains to Head Foreign Banking Corporation.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—Archibald Kains tendered his resignation as governor of the Federal Reserve Bank of the twelfth district, at a special meeting of the board of directors here late today. It was accepted. Mr. Kains has accepted the presidency of the American Foreign Banking Corporation of New York, which is now organizing, he announced.

Mr. Kains was appointed governor of the Federal Reserve Bank in November, 1914. He has had many years of experience as a banker, having served for seven years as examiner of San Francisco clearing-house banks and for 17 years as manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce here.

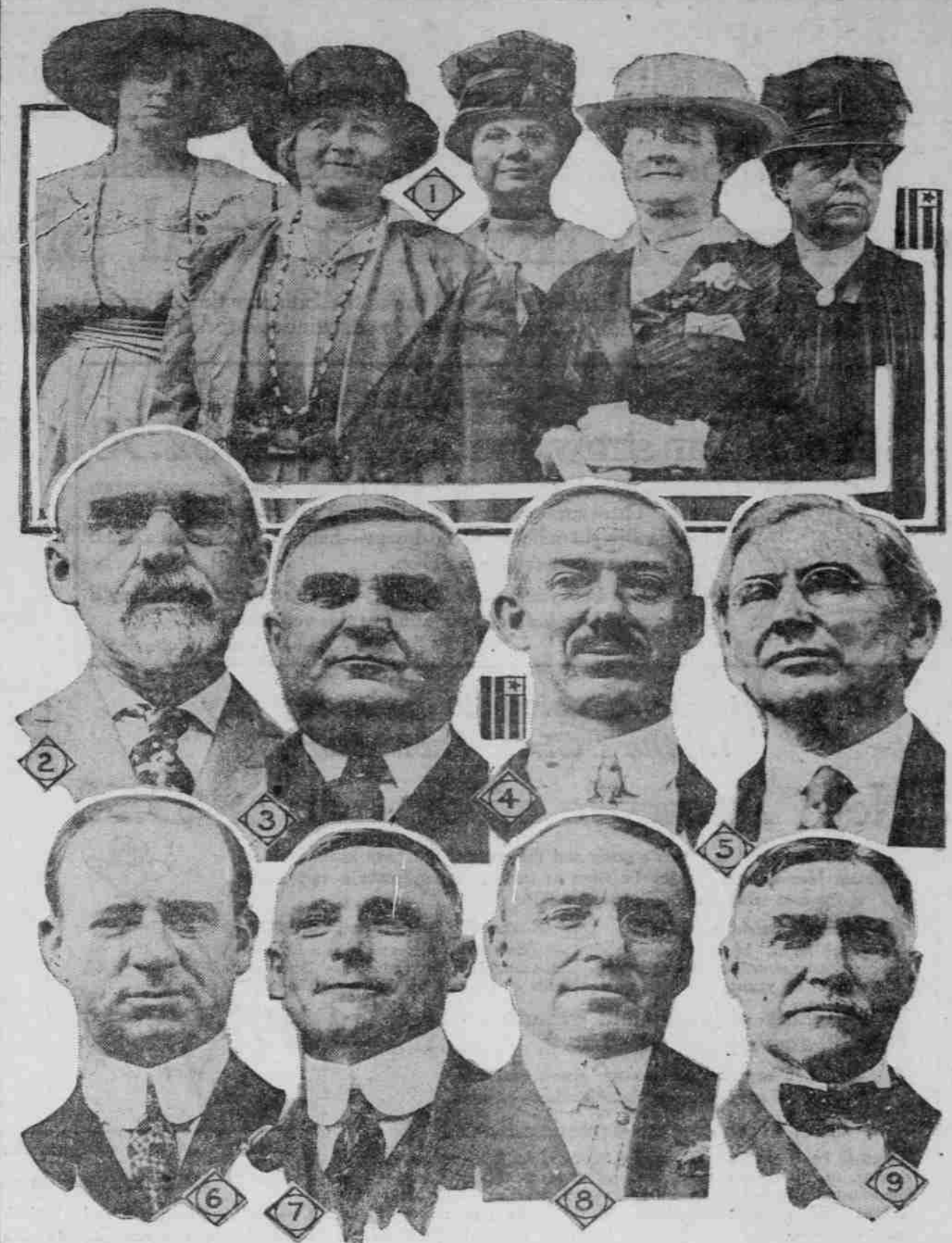
ENEMY DIVER IS FEARED

SERMONS TO BE TOPICAL

Question of Banning Instruction in German From Schools Will Be Considered by Committee Before Session Closes.

The annual business meeting of the National Council will be held Monday morning, convening at 10 o'clock. Meantime the ranks of the attendant educators will have grown to an army, and all will be in readiness for the general plunge into real work.

Churches to Honor Teachers.
Sunday has been set aside as "Educational Sunday," and will be so observed by special sermons in many of the Portland churches. A special musical service will be held in the Public Auditorium at 3 o'clock, with William M. Ladd as presiding officer. Prayer will be offered by Right Rev. Walter T. Sumner, bishop of Oregon. An address will be made by Robert J. Alex, president of the University of Maine and president of the National Education Association.

Musical will be furnished by the festival chorus, under the direction of W. H. Boyer, and by the auditorium orchestra, directed by Harold Bayley. Various sightseeing trips have been arranged.

Noted Educators Arrive.
Among the several educators of National prominence who arrived yesterday are Charles C. Van Hise, president of Wisconsin University, and Ella Flagg Young, former superintendent of Chicago schools and foremost lecturer and contributor on educational subjects.

President Van Hise is specially commissioned by Herbert C. Hoover, food controller of the United States, to appear before the convention. He will deliver a series of addresses on the importance of food conservation and, it is expected, will definitely outline the National plan of winning the war by careful economy.

The following announcement regarding the procuring of membership badges, was given out by Secretary Springer yesterday:
"All persons in Portland who have taken out memberships in the National Educational Association can get their badges and programmes on Saturday and Sunday in the exhibit room on the first floor of the Oregon building at the Chamber of Commerce."

Registration Opens Monday.
"All persons desiring to get their badges and programmes should bring their receipts with them. On Monday morning regular registration headquarters will be opened at the Auditorium. Until then persons desiring to

register in the National Education Association can do so at the Chamber of Commerce."

Portland's magnificent new Public Auditorium is a source of much gratification to those visitors who have held it, many of whom were in attendance at the dedication programme and the second evening of the Music Festival.

In commenting on the structure and its purpose, C. G. Pearce, president of the State Normal School, Wisconsin, and president of the board of trustees of the association, added a tribute to the general desirability of Portland as a convention hostess.

"Portland has the best auditorium in which the National Education Association has met for years," he said. "It is not a great, big barn in which you can hear nothing that is said as some of the auditoriums in which we have met have been. It is just the right size. You can hear every word of a good speaker."

Decorations Also Please.
"I think Portland has outdone herself in the matter of decorating the streets, hotels and business houses. Every visitor coming to the city is impressed at once with the fact that Portland is taking this convention seriously. I wish every visiting teacher might get the inspiration that comes from seeing Portland's excellent park system and from getting the splendid views that may be had from Washington Park and other points of vantage."

"Portland is a good city in which to hold this convention and the educators of the Nation will feel at home here."

Same Shoes Worn While War Lasts.
He purchased a new pair of shoes in 1914, just after the world war broke out and promised not to buy another pair until after the end of the war. He has had these shoes repaired four times. He thinks the leather will hold stitches for another year, but if war continues after that he expects to go barefooted as he did during the closing years of the great Civil War.

Much may depend on President Crabtree's shoes. As chief of the committee on resolutions, he will preside at those formidable sessions which are to give to the world the attitude of America's educators in the existing state of affairs. Two years ago the committee presented resolutions insuring world disarmament, or something of the sort, while last year they advocated universal military training.

Anti-Draft Forces May Ask Help.
A formal report will not be drafted until after the conference has held a meeting to consider the suggestions which have been received. The suggestions mainly grow out of the general purpose of the meeting and have to do with general National preparedness and patriotism.

While there is a rumor to the effect that the new anti-conscription league will ask for N. E. A. approval, Chairman Crabtree says that he has received no suggestive resolution on that side of the question. A meeting of the committee will be called as soon as a quorum arrives.

While anti-conscription and international peace are proposed in the suggestions to be presented to the committee, there is one of equal and opposite significance. It asks that the National Education Association go on record in favor of banning the teaching of German from American schools.

PEACE TALK NEAR

Hollweg Expected to Lay Basis for Negotiations.

RUSSIAN PEACE GIVEN UP

German Sources at The Hague Say Chancellor Realizes Russian Offensive Must Be Faced. Speech Expected Today.

LONDON, July 6.—Declarations which will serve as a basis for peace negotiations will be made by the German Chancellor, Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, in his coming speech before the Reichstag, according to German sources of information at The Hague, as quoted by the Central News correspondent there.

This changed attitude is said to be the outcome of the thought that all hope of separate peace with Russia must be abandoned and that a Russian offensive must be faced.

The Chancellor's speech probably will be delivered tomorrow.

BERLIN, via Amsterdam, July 6.—The Reichstag was opened yesterday with a speech by the President, who said that the war continued to rage and asked what a "shocking amount of

misery and distress would have been spared the world if Germany's enemies had agreed to the magnanimous peace offer of Emperor William and his allies to find peace which would serve the honor and the interests of all nations."

The Reichstag's President declared that the war aims of Germany's enemies meant disruption and destruction of Germany and her allies, but that against this existed the usual unanimous duty to resist with all her power and defend Germany's future, cost what it may.

M'NARY URGES IRRIGATION
Western Senators Asked to Support \$20,000,000 Appropriation.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, July 6.—Senator McNary today sent to each Senator from the West a copy of his amendment to the food conservation bill appropriating \$20,000,000 to build new irrigation projects. He explained that the amendment is designed, in a practical way, to increase the crop production of the West in future years and is in harmony with the general purpose of the food bill.

The Senator asked each Senator from an irrigation state to join him in an effort to have the amendment adopted, pointing out that if the West will unite in support of this proposition and will make a concerted and aggressive fight the amendment will have a fair prospect of adoption.

COLORADO GUARD CALLED
Governor Wants Militia Ready for Federal Muster.

DENVER, July 6.—Governor Gunter today issued an order directing Adjutant-General Baldwin to mobilize the National Guard tomorrow morning. The order affects 3552 men. Those engaged in farming duties are allowed to wait until August 1.

The object of the mobilization, the Governor said, is to have the guardsmen ready for service on August 5, when they are to be mustered into Federal service.

ANTI-JEWISH TALK DEcriED
Russian Delegates Fear Agitation Might Start Revolution.

PETROGRAD, July 6.—The Congress of Workmen and Soldiers' delegates today adopted a resolution condemning anti-Jewish agitation, in which it sees danger of a revolutionary movement. The resolution demands energetic opposition to all attempt at anti-Semitic agitation and suppression of all propaganda of that nature.

Freight on Salt Is Reduced.
SALEM, Or., July 6.—(Special.)—To Portland Jobbers is given a chance at the salt trade among Eastern Oregon stockmen by a voluntary move on the part of the O. W. H. & N. reducing its rate on salt by about 5 per cent. Heretofore this business has been transacted almost entirely from Salt Lake.

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NEW LOAN IS PROPOSED

REICHSTAG WILL PROVIDE CREDIT OF 15,000,000,000 MARKS.

Latest War Loan Subscribed Beyond Expectation—Gold Is Being Gathered by Bank.

AMSTERDAM, July 6.—Discussion in the German Reichstag at Berlin of the first reading of a bill providing for a credit of 15,000,000,000 marks is reported in a Berlin telegram today.

Count von Rodern, Secretary of the Imperial Treasury, stated that the monthly expenditures from February to May were 2,000,000,000 marks, the increase being due to expenditures on arms and munitions and for relief and the payment of interest.

The latest war loan totaled 13,120,000,000 marks, which, said the Secretary, "far exceeded our expectations."

"Such an achievement was possible," continued Count von Rodern, "owing to greater possibilities for making profits and to savings. By June 31 95 per cent of the amount subscribed had been paid in. The gold reserve in the Reichsbank on June 15 had risen to 2,553,000,000 marks, despite the export of metal, but since then it has decreased 75,000,000.

"Gold in the form of jewelry and coins must be handed to the Reichsbank," added the Secretary.

SENTRY IS FOUND DEAD
Army Officials Investigate Shooting Near Great Falls.

GREAT FALLS, Mont., July 6.—Jacob Lee, 27 years old, a member of Company D, Second Montana, was found dead today at the approach to the railroad bridge where he had been acting as a sentry. There was a bullet hole through his stomach.

An investigation is being made.
