Turkey Reports Killing of 500 Russians With Bayonet, Capture of 202.

WHITE FLAGS FIRED ON

Russians on Rumanian Front Decline to Fraternize With Teutons—Battle is Renewed in Mesopotamia.

BERLIN, via London, July 6.—An artillery battle of great violence developed yesterday between Zborov and Brestany in Eastern Galicia, the War Office announced today.

COPENHAGEN, via London, July 6.—An official statement issued by the Turkish War Department follows: "Galician front—Our troops yesterday captured 202 Russians in repelling an attack. Five hundred Russians were killed with the bayonet."

PETROGRAD, July 6.—The heavy gunfire of both the Russians and the Teutons in the region of Zichoff on the Eastern Galician front was increased yesterday, the Russian War Department announced today.

BERLIN, via London, July 6.—The battle in Eastern Galicia between the Teutonic forces and the Russians developed afresh today, after that night's pause from yesterday's violent artillery action.
