

ANDREWS FORGIVEN AND TRIAL STOPPED

Wife Will Give Erring Husband
Another Chance and Affinity
Will Be Forgotten.

THEFT CHARGE DROPPED

Son Reunites Couple After Trouble
Said to Have Been Caused by
Escapade With Pretty Nurse
and Desertion of Wife.

A complete reconciliation between Edward G. Andrews, alias Ezra Gager, and his wife, Margaret Andrews, has been made and the indictment charging Andrews with a statutory offense will be dropped, it was announced at the courthouse yesterday. This announcement was made just before the trial, which promised to team with interest, was started before a jury in Circuit Judge Gates' court.

According to counsel, Andrews' infatuation for Frances Early, a pretty Rochester, N. Y., nurse, had died and he is now anxious to start life anew with his wife, with whom he had lived for 26 years prior to his alleged elopement with the Early woman last year. A son of the couple, who arrived recently from Detroit, is said to have played a prominent part in bringing about a complete reconciliation between husband and wife. Andrews will settle down here in Portland and make a home for his wife, it was said.

The unexpected outcome of a quasi-sensational case followed reconciliation negotiations which have been in progress for several days. Upon her arrival in Portland six weeks ago, Mrs. Andrews spoke bitterly against her husband and it was then that she announced that she would remain here and testify against him at his trial. She has already appeared before the grand jury and it was partly on her testimony that the indictment was directed.

Before his alleged elopement, Andrews was a prominent Rochester business man, owning a fine home and with a lucrative business. He left suddenly early last year and his wife had not heard from him until in March of this year, when she learned that he was in Portland and was indicted for a suit for divorce. She hastened to Portland from Salt Lake City and caused her husband's arrest. Before he left Rochester, Andrews had decided a part of his property to his wife and had left her in fairly comfortable circumstances.

It is averred that the Early woman, with whom he is alleged to have eloped, posed as his wife during her residence in Portland. They had rented a house in the Irvington district and it was there that she was introduced into society as his wife.

Upon her arrival here, Mrs. Andrews charged her husband with the embezzlement of funds from a former business partner and averred that he had taken the embezzled money and purchased railroad bonds after his arrival in Portland. Andrews has since admitted purchasing \$5000 of railroad bonds, but has persistently denied that he embezzled the money, although he admits that he assigned the bonds to his former business partner after he had been located in this city.

However, in view of the fact that Mrs. Andrews is willing to take her husband back and give him another chance, and because of his seemingly sincere desire to forget the Early woman, it was announced at the District Attorney's office yesterday that the indictment would be dismissed.

GOOD THINGS IN THE MARKET

SUMMER has come for sure and the first grapes are here! They are Malaga in variety; green in color; grown in Imperial Valley, California, and retail at 25 and 25 cents a pound; \$1 and \$1.15 for five-pound baskets.

A consignment of unusually large, fine mountain strawberries, from Hood River, are shown. They are of the "Imperial Oregon" variety, for table use, and quoted at 15 cents a basket. Lents offers at 10 cents a box, but the average price for strawberries is three boxes for 25 cents, and as the crop is small, they are not expected to go lower.

Some very large Oregon Bing and Royal Anne cherries are 25 cents a pound, but very few of this fruit can be bought from 20 cents down to 10 cents a pound.

The Dalles sends down selected Royal Anne cherries in 25-pound boxes, \$2.75, 15 cents a pound; ten-pound boxes, \$1.30.

These boxes are very suitable for sending to friends. The express charges are not high and Oregon cherries are in a class by themselves. Kentish or pie cherries are new this week; 10 cents a pound, three pounds for a quarter.

Black Republican cherries, 10 cents a pound.

Fresh white figs are new comers—25 cents a dozen; black, 15 cents; two dozen for a quarter.

The last of the gooseberries are here—5 cents a box.

Red currants, two boxes, 15 cents; \$1.50 a crate.

Raspberries, local, 15 cents a box. Apricots, 40 cents a basket, 15 cents a dozen.

Triumph peaches, 20 cents; other stock, 10 cents a dozen.

A new arrival, the white-flesh variety, 20 cents a dozen; 50 cents a basket.

Chinese plums, from Southern Oregon, 15 cents a dozen; 50 cents a basket.

Rhubarb, wine variety, three pounds 10 cents; eight pounds for a quarter.

New Red Astrakhan apples, three pounds 25 cents; Winesap, 20 and 20 cents a dozen.

Bananas, 25 and 30 cents a dozen; pineapples, 10 cents a pound.

Oranges, from 15 to 50 cents a dozen. Florida grape fruit, 15 cents each; four, three and two for 15 cents.

California, 5 cents each, three for 10 cents; eight and six for a quarter.

Lemons, 15, 20 and 25 cents a dozen. Canteleupes, from 15 cents each to four for 25 cents.

Watermelon, 2 cents a pound. Ice cream melon, 6 cents a pound.

In the vegetable market: Green peas are the leader. The price is probably as low as can be counted upon this season and housekeepers are canning accordingly.

Beaverton, Tualatin Valley and East St. Johns all send good consignments, the average price being 5 cents a pound, three pounds, 10 cents. The

varieties are mostly American Wonder and Telephone.
Six pounds are offered for a quarter and a 50-pound sack for \$1.50. In canning, 5 pounds of peas is calculated to fill 12 quart jars.
Shelled peas, 10 cents a box.
Hothouse tomatoes, from Gresham, 20 cents a pound. Other stock, 15 cents a pound; two pounds, 25 cents.
Cucumbers, field-grown, from The Dalles, "guaranteed mild and tender," 10 cents each; smaller, 5 cents each; two for 15 cents.
Beaverton asparagus, 10 cents a bunch, \$1 a dozen; others, two bunches 15 cents. Asparagus is considered unusually low in price this year.

New potatoes, two pounds, 15 cents; four pounds for a quarter.
Last season's potatoes, six pounds 25 cents.

Home-grown cabbage, 5 and 10 cents a head.

Cauliflower, 10 and 15 cents each.

Summer and crooked-neck squash, medium, 5 cents each; larger, three for a quarter.

Wax beans, grown at The Dalles, 8 cents a pound; two pounds 15 cents; crisp and tender.

Stringless green beans, 10 cents a pound.

Lima, or broad beans, 5 cents a pound.

Lettuce heads, two for 5 cents; larger, three for 10 cents, up to 10 cents each.

Leaf lettuce, two bunches 5 cents; Celery, 10 and 15 cents a stalk.

Spinach, 5 cents a pound; two pounds 15 cents. Best-top greens, two bunches 5 cents.

Artichokes, two for 15 cents. Green peppers, 5 cents each.

Eggplant, 45 cents; okra, 20 cents a pound.

Dried onions, three pounds 10 cents.

In the fish market: As this is the third of the four months in the calendar apart from "R"—May, June, July and August—several varieties of fish are remarkable by their absence, but the supply is still the reverse of meager.

Columbia River salmon and sturgeon are 20 and 25 cents a pound.

Salmon trout and blue-back salmon are 20 cents also. Sea trout, 22 cents a pound.

As a great delicacy lake trout, from Utah, are offered at 25 cents each.

Shad is nearing the end of its season, and the price trends upward. The whole fish, averaging three pounds, is now retailed at 10 cents a pound, while, in some quarters, 12½ cents is asked.

Shad roe, 40 cents a pound.

From our sister state to the south come fresh smelt and California smelt, 20 cents a pound, and sand-dabs 15 cents.

Halibut and black cod, 15 cents a pound.

Flounders, sea perch, Newport soles and ink fish, each 12½ cents a pound.

Ocean (red) sturgeon, two pounds for a quarter.

Newport cod, half or whole fish, 8 cents a pound.

Red snapper, generally retailed by the whole fish, 10 and 7 cents a pound.

From Eureka, Cal., some crabs have been forwarded, which bring from 20 to 50 cents each. This is the closed season for crabs in Oregon and Washington.

Lobsters 35 cents, prawns 30, shrimps 25 and shrimp meat 40 cents a pound.

Eastern oysters in shell 35 cents a dozen.

Hardshell clams 5 cents a pound.

Minor clams may be considered unobtainable until the first of September.

In the poultry market: Hens 25 and 25 cents a pound.

Roasters and broilers 30 cents, fliers 25 cents a pound.

Squabs 50 cents each.

Tip-top eggs 40 cents, "strictly fresh" 35 and 38 cents a dozen, two dozens 70 cents.

No. 1 creamery butter 45 cents a pound, 55 cents a pound.

Good creamery 43 and 40 cents.

Dairy butter 35 and 28 cents a pound.

Curd or dry cheese and cottage cheese 10 cents a pound.

Cream (cottage) cheese, rich in cream, 15 cents a pound.

Tab cream 20 cents a pint, 10 cents half pint.

Whipping cream 30 cents a pint, 15 cents half pint.

Live rabbits, "Flemish Giant" (buck) \$1 each, "Russian Red" (doe) 50 cents.

A novelty in groceries—Rock candy crystals, 25 cents for one-pound cartons, society's latest for after-dinner coffee.

VIOLENCE IS THREATENED

Member of Exemption Board Tries to Resign.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—Threats of violence against members of the local draft exemption board were reported last night, resulting in the attempted resignation of one member and the defiance of his enemies by another.

John J. Duddy, a board member, directed his resignation to Mayor Rolph, saying that his life had been threatened if he served. The mayor refused the withdrawal, asserting that he was not empowered to accept it.

John E. Campodonico, a produce dealer, reported also that he had been warned against serving. He declared that he would not permit this to influence him.

Patrolman James Gaffney, of New York, put down his club and helmet and started for San Francisco to be a rich man. Mrs. Sarah Gaffney died and left him \$25,000.

KITCHEN TOPICS UP

Home Economics Instructors Hold Conference.

25 SUPERVISORS ARE HERE

Best Methods of Coping With War Problems Discussed by Educators From Over Country at First Session.

How best to cope with the special problems confronting the kitchen under war conditions was the tenor of discussion at the Home Economics Conference, which convened yesterday morning at the Benson Girls' School of Trades, with an attendance of 25 supervisors in that department from many of the principal schools of the country.

Chief in distinction among the convention members is Mrs. H. W. Calvin, a specialist representing the National Bureau of Education, who delivered an address on the special problems of present-day home economics.

Other speakers were: Miss Edna Groves, supervisor, of Portland; Miss Adelaide Bayler, of Indianapolis, Ind.; Miss Essie Heyle, of Kansas City, Mo., and Miss Anna L. Post, of Tacoma, Wash.

Luncheon was served at conference headquarters, under the supervision of the domestic science department, and the afternoon session began at 2 o'clock. At this session the discussions were relative to uniformity and variation in sewing problems, and to sewing in the lower grades. Papers and discussions were given by Miss Fisher, Pasadena, Cal.; Miss Grace Johnson, Corvallis, Or.; Miss Prentiss, Berkeley, Cal.; Miss Amy L. Greenlaw, Sacramento, Cal.

All of the delegates to the Home Economics Conference are also delegates to the National Education Association, and although their sessions are separate from the greater assembly, they are directly in line with its purposes.

The second and closing session of the conference will be today, beginning with breakfast at the Seward Hotel at 8:15. The morning session begins at 9:30, and the afternoon session at 2 o'clock. Headquarters for convention members is at the Seward Hotel.
