

# EMBRYO OFFICERS LEARN DISCIPLINE

## Eastern Candidates, Unaccustomed to Being Bossed, Yield to Army Rules.

### INFLUENCE IS DEMOCRATIC

#### Sons of Famous Men Among Students at Plattsburg—Every Man Who Qualifies Is Assured Commission.

PLATTSBURGH BARRACKS, N. Y., July 9.—(Special).—Two months of intensive training has changed the 5000 men at the Plattsburg camp from a mass of novices to an organization of well-disciplined soldiers. Those who came here with the idea that the camp afforded a desirable place for a summer's vacation, those who have not taken the proper interest in the work or those who, unfortunately, were found to be physically unfit, have been eliminated and the rest, who have qualified for the final, are bucking down for the home stretch.

The army discipline which every soldier in the new army must conform to will leave its imprint on the minds of the allied flags float from the palace at Potsdam. It will be one of the finest and most permanent results of the war.

#### Discipline Is Strict.

When the bugle sounds at 5:30 on week days you must get up. There's no alternative. Every man scrambles into his uniform. Some have become as proficient in dressing as a fire horse is in getting into his harness. Two minutes is the record in my company. This report is current that the post hospital is crowded Saturdays and Sundays with patients who find there a place to redress lost sleep. The drinking of even the lightest alcoholic drinks is sufficient ground for summary dismissal. This order hits some of the men pretty hard at first, but most of them now agree that they are better off without their customary "nips." The food, while plain, is well cooked and well seasoned.

#### Camps Are Democratic.

Besides the discipline, another interesting feature of the military life is its democratizing influence. The candidates are grouped together into companies of living in the same barracks. Every man is on the same footing. Wealth or position are of no account and individuality is lost in the monotony of the olive drab. There's only one standard: "What can you do?"

A large number of familiar names are represented in the 5000. Colonel Roosevelt's two sons, Major Theodore, Jr., and Second Lieutenant Archie, are in a New York company. Both are efficient officers and well liked. Captain Bill Root, Jr., is assigned to the Ninth Company of the New England division. Good friend, son of the former Minnesota University President, now head of the Rockefeller Foundation, is in training. Elliott, the author of the popular song, "Long, Long Trail," was attached to my company (Eighth New England) until he was discharged because of a slight in the right eye. The song was originally written for a college play at the New Hampshire State College, the institution of which Elliott is president. O. A. C. has been chosen President. The song has so far brought \$20,000 in royalties to its composer.

#### Commissioned Officers Assured.

Forty-five from each company will be commissioned as reserve officers and ordered into active service with the first 500,000. An equal number will either be commissioned and put on the inactive list or be sent to the next camp. Ten or fifteen will be given second Lieutenant commissions in the regular army. Others will be assigned to the aerial, ordnance or quartermaster branches of the service. Major Stewart, the senior instructor, has been given a commission to every man who qualifies, though those for active service will be selected on a competitive basis. Most of the candidates want to go to active service, at the same time realizing that it means the French front within six months. The way they have sacrificed and will sacrifice for the country in the war augurs well for a speedy victory.

The state troops are called into service as follows:

On July 25—Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, District of Columbia, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Illinois, Montana, Wyoming, Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

On August 5—Indiana, Kentucky, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Texas, Missouri, Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah and Nevada.

#### President's Proclamation Given.

The President's proclamation follows: "Whereas, The United States of America and the Imperial German government are now at war and it is in view of the consequent danger of aggression by a foreign enemy upon the territory of the United States and the necessity for proper protection against possible interference with the execution of the laws of the Union by agents of the enemy, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States and through the Governors of the respective states, call into the service of the United States as of and from the dates hereinafter respectively indicated, all members of the National Guard and all enlisted members of the National Guard reserve of and from the following states, who are not now in the service of the United States and except members of staff corps and departments not included in the personnel of tactical organizations and except such officers of the National Guard as have been or may be specifically notified by my authority that they will not be affected by this call, to wit:

First Call Effective July 15.

"On July 15, 1917, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, West Virginia, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota and Nebraska.

"On July 25, 1917, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, District of Columbia, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Illinois, Montana, Wyoming, Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

"The members of the National Guard of the various states affected by this call will be concentrated at such places as may be designated by the War Department.

#### Draft Is Put Into Force.

"Second—And under the authority conferred upon me by clause second of section one of the act of Congress to authorize the President to increase temporarily the military establishment of the United States, approved May 18, 1917, I do hereby draft into the military service of the United States as of and from the fifth day of August, 1917, all members of the National Guard and all enlisted members of the following states, except members of staff corps and departments not included in the personnel of tactical organizations and except such other officers of the National Guard as have been or may be specifically notified by my authority that they will not be drafted, to wit:

#### Discharge From Militia Ordered.

"Third, all persons hereby drafted shall, on and from the fifth day of August, 1917, stand discharged from the militia, and under the terms of section 2 of the act of May 18, 1917, be subject to the laws and regulations governing the regular Army, except as to promotions, so far as such laws and regulations are applicable to persons whose permanent retention in the military service on the active or retired list is not contemplated by law.

"Fourth, the members of each company, battalion, brigade, division or other organization of the National Guard hereby drafted into the military service of the United States shall be embodied in organizations corresponding to those of the regular Army. The officers not above the rank of Colonel of said organizations of the National Guard who are drafted and whose offices are provided for in the regulations of the regular Army, are hereby appointed officers in the Army of the United States in the arm, staff, corps or department, and in the grades which they now hold, commissions as officers of the National Guard, such appointments to be effective subject to acceptance on and from the fifth day of August, 1917, and each of them subject to such acceptance is hereby assigned as of said date to the organization in the United States in which he is proposed of those who were members of the original of the National Guard in which at the time of draft he held a commission.

#### Non-Commissioned Officers Kept.

"The non-commissioned officers of the organizations of the National Guard, the members of which are hereby drafted, are hereby appointed non-commissioned officers in their present grade in the organizations of the army composed of said members and shall in each case have the same rank and status as heretofore and all other enlisted men are hereby confirmed in the Army of the United States in the grades and ratings held by them in the National Guard in all cases where such grades and ratings correspond to grades and ratings provided for in the regulations of the regular Army, all such appointments of non-commissioned officers and confirmations of other grades and ratings to be without prejudice to the authority of subordinate commanders in respect of promotions, reductions and changes in enlisted personnel.

"Fifth—Each organization of the military force hereby created will, until further orders, bear the same name and designation as the former organization of the National Guard of whose members it is composed.

"Sixth—Whenever orders for combining the organizations created by embodying therein members of the National Guard and National Guard reserve hereby drafted into the military service of the United States into complete tactical units will be issued by the War Department."

#### OREGON TROOPS ARE INCLUDED

##### All of Various Units to Be Drafted Into Federal Service.

Official notification was received from the War Department yesterday by George A. White, Adjutant-General of the Oregon National Guard, that all Oregon troops will be embodied preparatory to being drafted into the Federal service, on July 25.

#### Manchu Commander Resigns; Republican Takes Control.
