CITY POSTER SUGHT BY 202.—Two hundred and two written applications for positions in the city service have been received by Mayor Baker since he was elected June 4, according to a tabulation of the names made yesterday. Of the applications 89 are for jobs in various parts of the city, some specified and others not. There are eight applications for Chief of Police, six for Deputy City Attorney, eight for Municipal Judge, ten for health work and 21 for employment at the public Auditorium.

VISTA HOUSE FINE PAID.—Payment of \$2000 to Edgar M. Laasrus as architect for the construction of the Vista House at Crown Point on the Columbia Highway was ordered yesterday by the County Board over the protest of Calvin Holman. The claim was approved by Roadmaster Yeon and Commissioners Holbrook and Muck authorized payment on Mr. Yeon's recommendation.

AUTO VICTIM DIES.—Henry Koehn, who was struck by an automobile driven by Harold Moffet, near Springfield, Tuesday, died from his injuries at the County Hospital yesterday. It is not known whether he has relatives in this country or not, but he is thought to have a sister in South America. Coroner Smith has charge of the body.

MAX STEIN HOME DESTROYED.—The home of Max Stein, 175 Hamilton avenue, and contents were destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Stein had been to a nearby store and when she returned the house was a mass of flames. Engine companies 5, 10 and 22 and truck 2 responded to the alarm. The house and contents were valued at \$2500 with \$500 insurance.

CHARGE MADE LIGHTER.—Harry Bailey, under indictment for larceny in a dwelling, was allowed to plead guilty to a charge of minor larceny and was sentenced yesterday to three months in the County Jail by Circuit Judge Phelps.

MULTNOMAH COMPANY FILMS CAMPAIGN STATEMENT.—The Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company spent \$5972.32 in fighting the telephone merger measure which appeared on the ballot at the city election June 4. A statement of expenditures was filed yesterday with City Auditor Funk. The money was expended for advertising principally.

AUXILIARY SERVES DINNER.
 Result is \$3500 Ambulance Ordered for Third Oregon.

The members of Company A Auxiliary, Third Oregon Infantry, served a regulation Army dinner during Wednesday and Thursday, for the purpose of raising funds to supply an ambulance to the company. The dinner was cooked by regulation Army cooks, detailed especially for the occasion, and was served as a regular Army mess under a big canvas fly erected on a vacant lot on West Park and Stark streets.

A \$3500 ambulance has been ordered and is on the way here. Besides the dinner raised by the company, Mrs. Nina LaRoe, of the Mallory Hotel, contributed \$500 to the cause.

SUIT FILING ANTICIPATED.
 Claim of Edgar E. Frank Estate to Be Reinstated by Insurance Company.

Anticipating a suit expected to be filed by Henry J. Frank, administrator of the estate of Edgar E. Frank, deceased, the Hartford Accident & Indemnity Company yesterday petitioned the Circuit Court for permission to perpetrate the testimony of Dr. R. C. Yenney and A. S. Frohman, an employee of the insurance company, both of whom have been called into the Federal service.

It is set forth in the petition that the estate will bring suit for \$15,000 on an accident insurance policy issued by Edgar Frank about six months before his death, which occurred in Chicago March last.

N. E. A. TALKS INTERESTING.

E. O. Sisson NAMED

Ex-Portlander to Be President of Montana University.

POST HELD AT REED IN 1912

Time Also Served With University of Washington and Important Idaho Post Given Up to Avoid Political Tangle.

The appointment of Dr. Edward O. Sisson, former pioneer member of Reed College faculty, as president of the State University of Montana, at Missoula, was announced yesterday in this city, where Dr. Sisson is in attendance

at the National Education Association convention.

The appointment, which has been pending for some time, was made by Edward C. Elliott, chairman of the University of Montana, also present at the N. E. A. convention.

"We feel that we are extremely fortunate in procuring Dr. Sisson," said Mr. Elliott, "and while Montana already is on the map, believe that he will add to her renown."

Dr. Sisson was a member of Reed College faculty, holding the chair of education, in 1912 and 1913. Prior to that time he was for several years head of the department of education, University of Washington. In 1913 he removed to Idaho, where he became State Commissioner of Education, a position he recently resigned because of his disapproval of certain political policies of the State Board of Education.

He studied at Kansas State Agricultural College, the University of Chicago, and received his Ph. D. degree at Harvard University. Later he studied for a year in Germany and France.

FOUR ROADS APPEALING

HEARINGS SCHEDULED FOR MINOR LINES SEEKING RATE INCREASES

In One Case, Patrons of Company Join With Petitioner, Conceding Need If Service Is to Be Given.

Four of the minor railroads operating in Oregon have failed to follow the lead of the major roads in withdrawing their applications for a horizontal increase of 15 per cent in freight rates, and the Oregon Public Service Commission has arranged the following schedule to hear their respective pleas:

July 17, at Baker, for the Sumpter Valley Road.

July 23, at Hood River, for the Mount Hood Road.

July 24, at The Dalles, for the Great Southern.

August 1, at Cottage Grove, for the Oregon & Southeastern.

These roads contend that they are forced to ask for the advance because their business has not increased in the same proportion as their expenses. The call of R. L. Peterson, president of the Great Southern, between The Dalles and Friend, in Wasco County, have joined with the other lines in petitioning for the advance.

The farmers maintain that the road cannot afford to operate under its present rates, and provide the service that patrons of the line propose to demand.

When the Interstate Commerce Commission rejected the application of the carriers for a 15 per cent increase in interstate rates, all the major roads, and some of the minor, operating in Oregon withdrew their applications for a corresponding increase in state rates.

PORT'S FACILITIES TOLD

Representatives of Galveston Grain Men in Portland.

Galveston's advantages as a grain shipping port were laid before the porters of this city yesterday, when Julius W. Jockusch, representing the Galveston Cotton Exchange and Board of Trade, and H. A. Wickstrom, chief grain inspector of Galveston, appeared before the Merchants' Exchange. At the call of R. L. Peterson, president of the Great Southern, between The Dalles and Friend, in Wasco County, have joined with the other lines in petitioning for the advance.

Mr. Jockusch, who acted as spokesman, explained in detail the grain shipping facilities of Galveston, its system of elevators, its private elevators, its arrangements for cleaning grain, charges, insurance and such matters, and the adequacy and regularity of its steamship service. The point was brought upon it, so that men from other ports might be barred.

Another interesting Navy note is that enlistments for service aboard submarine chasers will now be considered. Four hundred submarine chasers are available for service, and a crew of 20 men each is required. The age limit for service aboard these craft is 44, as compared with the limit of 38 in the regular Navy. Boatwains' mates, coxswains, gunners' mates, quartermasters, seamen, electricians, machinists' mates and second-class cooks are some of the positions open.

AUTO HITS MOTORCYCLIST

R. E. Knight Sustains Fracture of Leg in Accident.

R. E. Knight, 1176 Delaware street, suffered a fracture of the left leg yesterday when the motorcycle on which he was riding was struck by an automobile driven by A. D. Carter, of 1104 Mallory avenue. He was taken to the Sellwoy Hospital by the ambulance Service Company and his injuries were treated by Dr. Laird.

Mr. Knight was riding on Mallory avenue and Mr. Carter turned right at the intersection of the two streets. Mr. Knight was struck squarely by the car and carried several feet.
