

ELLA FLAGG YOUNG STIRS UP TROUBLE

Tranquillity of National Education Convention Is Seriously Disturbed.

DEBATE LIVELY FOR TIME

Resolution "Hoping to See President Fighting for Woman Suffrage" Causes Excitement Until Ruled Out of Order.

(An effort by Mrs. Ella Flagg Young, noted lecturer and educator, to force the N. E. A. convention to express itself on President Wilson's suffrage stand stirred up a lively debate at the Auditorium yesterday morning and injected the only discordant note into an otherwise harmonious and tranquil session.)

The convention diplomatically avoided going on record on the question when President Alvey gave a commendatory ruling Mrs. Young's motion out of order.

It must not be understood, however, that the N. E. A. stands opposed to woman's suffrage, for the contrary is true. The formal resolution, unanimously adopted, "reaffirm the previous recommendations of the association on the justice and educational value of manhood and womanhood suffrage."

Mrs. Young Stirs Up Trouble. But after these resolutions had been adopted Mrs. Young got up and recalled President Wilson's widely quoted speech delivered before a convention of suffragists at Atlantic City a few months ago. She quoted the President as saying, "I am with you women, and I'll fight for you," or words to that effect.

"I wonder," she continued, "whether it would be out of order at this time to propose a resolution strengthening the President's hand."

She then offered, verbally, a resolution substantially as follows: "Be it resolved, That the N. E. A. endorse President Woodrow Wilson's statement to the suffrage association that he is with them, and going to fight for them, and that this association hopes to see him elected President."

Kate Devereaux Blake, of New York, quickly seconded the motion.

President Alvey Quotes Rules. President Alvey reminded Mrs. Young that the rules of the association prohibited the introduction of a resolution from the floor of the convention.

"Well, I offer it as a hope, then," quickly responded Mrs. Young, amid the laughter of the crowd.

"I second the hope," followed Miss Blake. Miss Sarah H. Fahey, of New York City, urged the association to endorse the strongest possible language. She pointed out that the recent registration of the women of New York state for "war purposes" destroyed the last hope of the anti-suffragists that "we are useless in time of war."

Several delegates objected to the phrase in Mrs. Young's motion, "to see him fighting," and she agreed to have it stricken out.

Up to this time the measure seemed to have smooth sailing ahead.

Mr. Minkler Uses "Wrench." But E. H. Minkler, a militant young educator, of Portland, expressed the proverbial wrench into the machinery.

"This is too serious a matter to add to the responsibilities of the man who is fighting for civilization," he protested. He was greeted with a generous shower of applause.

"It only means that when he is through fighting Germany, he can fight for the women," insisted Mrs. Young.

"I can't see how a motion endorsing something that the President has said can add to his responsibilities," added Miss Blake.

Dr. E. O. Sisson, newly-elected president of the University of Montana, paved the way for disposing of the whole issue.

"Call it a hope or a motion or what you will," he asserted, "it is a resolution, nevertheless, and as such, a resolution is entirely out of order. If it is not a resolution, I want to ask what it is?"

The shower of applause that greeted Mr. Minkler's utterance proved a storm following Dr. Sisson's expression.

"If it isn't an endorsement of the President," answered Mrs. Young, "I want to ask what it means."

Dr. Sisson Wins Convention. Dr. Sisson replied that he is not opposed to suffrage; that he has voted for it in two states and that he is decidedly for it.

"But I object," he continued, "to dragging in the name of the President of the United States in expressing my attitude on the suffrage question."

A great majority of the delegates by this time apparently were lined up behind Dr. Sisson's Secretary Sprague, sensing the spirit of the meeting, suggested that the entire proceedings on the subject be eliminated from the records.

Mrs. Young declared it was impossible to eliminate it.

Dr. Sisson asked the chair to rule whether the motion was in order.

President Alvey ruled it out of order, prefacing his ruling, however, with a declaration that he is personally in favor of woman's suffrage.

His ruling automatically expunged the motion and all its attending discussion from the records.

FOLEY IS AGAIN IN JAIL

Man Who Woke to Find Woman Dead by His Side, Faces Larceny

E. F. Smith, Acting Coroner, turned detective temporarily yesterday and Donald Foley, of precarious occupation, again is in the City Jail, charged with larceny. Foley woke up one morning to discover that Bessie Warner, a fellow follower of gay and easy paths, had died of acute alcoholism during the night. After an investigation he was released from custody.

The Warner woman's affairs were placed in the hands of the Acting Coroner, who discovered yesterday that Foley had been visiting the house at 86 Park street, where the death occurred July 3. He says Foley took pawn tickets for three diamonds valued at \$110.

JAPANESE SEEKS DIVORCE

Various Reasons Assigned by Ill-Matched Mates in Court.

A romance which had its inception in far-off Japan will have its culmination in the Portland divorce courts by reason of the suit filed yesterday by Kotaro Sato, who wants a divorce from his wife, Yoshi. They were married in Okayama, Japan, in 1912, but

the little almond-eyed bride left her husband after they had come to this country, he asserts. He wants a decree.

Marie Lamar says that she supported herself and husband as long as she was physically able to work, but after she grew sick and was unable to work her husband left her, she said yesterday, in starting suit for divorce. They were married in 1911, and she charges cruelty.

Frank Hatcher was too familiar with other women, complains Florence Hatcher in her divorce complaint, which was filed yesterday. Norma Green wants a divorce from William Green and also wants a division of property valued at \$6500 which they own, she asserts in her divorce suit. They have been married 12 years, and she accuses her husband of both cruelty and desertion. Thomas Gray charges Adelle Gray with cruelty and desertion in his suit for divorce. He wants a decree and the custody of a minor son.

2 FREED TO HARVEST HAY

Baker Justice Thinks Men Will Do More Good at Work.

BAKER, Or., July 13.—(Special).—Upon an order by Justice of the Peace P. L. Hubbard, Frank Sizemore and Virgil Roberts, who were serving sentences in the county jail for the illegal possession of liquor, were released today and told to go to work in the hay fields. They both live in the vicinity of Haines. The men were under three months' sentence, which they had served.

They had been fined \$250 each, and were serving out their fines when released. Each had a little more than a justice. Hubbard gave as his reason that the men, who are farmers, will do more good working in the hay field than in jail.

TWO DROWNED IN UMPQUA

Victims Are Lad of 15 Years and Rancher Aged 60.

ROSEBURG, Or., July 13.—(Special).—John Wesley McGee, 15-year-old son of Mrs. Malinda McGee, of this city, was drowned while swimming in the Umpqua River yesterday afternoon. The body was recovered by Ralph Lane, a Southern Pacific conductor, and Lola Stephens within ten minutes after the drowning. The physicians worked over the boy for an hour without success.

James B. Brown, aged 60 years and for several months employed on the ranch conducted by B. K. Lawson, at Round Prairie, was seized with cramps while swimming in the Umpqua last night and drowned. His body was recovered this morning.

Goldendale Logger Injured

GOLDENDALE, Wash., July 13.—(Special).—John H. Vickrey, a logger employed at the Lindberg & Johnson sawmill, near Waukegan Station, on the Goldendale branch of the North Bank Road, had his right leg so badly crushed Wednesday while unloading logs from a wagon that it is feared amputation will be necessary. Mr. Vickrey was taken to a Portland hospital.

Motorcycle 'Cop' Likely

Albany Prepares to Move Against Reckless Drivers.

ALBANY, Or., July 13.—(Special).—Albany may soon employ a motorcycle policeman to catch violators of the city speed laws. At a meeting of the City Council this week the charge was made that automobiles "run wild" in this city.

Chief of Police Catlin reported to the Council that the police force is making an effort to enforce the law, but has no adequate means of apprehending violators.

The death of a young man who, while riding a motorcycle at a high rate of speed, ran into an Oregon Electric train here last Tuesday evening, was cited as showing the need for more stringent enforcement of speed laws.
