

RUSSIAN DRIVE NETS 37,000 PRISONERS

More Than 800 Officers Are Included in Total Taken Since First of Month.

ENTIRE FRONT IN BATTLE

Germans Are Rushing Reinforcements From France and Shifting Troops Near Lemberg. Austrians in Flight.

PETROGRAD, July 16.—The Russians yesterday captured 16 officers and 900 Austro-Germans in the battle in Eastern Galicia, the War Department announced today. The Russians also took a number of machine guns.

From July 1 to July 12, the statement says, 834 officers and 35,809 men were captured by the Russians. General Brusiloff's forces also captured 93 heavy and light guns, 28 trench mortars, 403 machine guns, 43 mine throwers, 45 bomb mortars, three fire throwers, two airplanes and much equipment.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—The whole Russian front from the Gulf of Riga to Roumania is reported in official dispatches today from Petrograd to the Russian Embassy here to be alive with battle. The Germans are said to be rushing up troops from the Italian and French fronts and to be entirely rearranging their positions.

On the northern front, near Riga, German reinforcements are rushing up by sea transport. On the Lemberg front, the troops are being shifted back and forth by means of heavy automobiles in an attempt to prevent further advances by General Korniloff. On the southern front in the Carpathians the Austrians are said to be in full flight.

CARS HIT PASSENGER TRAIN

Seven Run Wild When Brakes Are Loosened.

MOJAVE, Cal., July 16.—Seven heavily-loaded freight cars, on which brakes were loosened in some manner, coasted out of the railroad yards here early today, jumped a derailing switch and went wild 12 miles down grade to Rosemead, where they crashed into the rear of the southbound Southern Pacific passenger train No. 8 from San Francisco, smashed the rear sleeper, overturned two other cars and piled themselves high in wreckage.

Passengers were in the damaged three cars but none was injured. A porter in the car which landed on the freight car was cut and bruised slightly.

TRAITOROUS ACTS ALLEGED

Drafted Men Urged to Shoot Officers and Surrender to Germans.

CHICAGO, July 16.—John Natchky was arrested by Federal agents today, charged with trying to form an organization pledging members if drafted first to shoot their officers and next to surrender to the Germans.

the present, it is probable Greece will be mentioned by the allies, who have stocks already on hand, but for the future and as far as general credits are concerned, it is probable the Athens government will wish to deal direct with this country.

Majority Pleaded by Decision. It is understood here that while among some pro-Germans anti-war spirit remains in Greece, a great majority of the people are happy that a final decision has at last been made and that the perils and uncertainties that have beset the nation's attempt to be neutral are ended.

It is realized that Greece has a splendid opportunity to strengthen her international position, which has suffered through her doubtful policy through-out the war. Bulgaria, her traditional enemy, has occupied an appreciable section of Greek territory and threatens to surpass Greece in her power in the Balkans, while Italy has sent troops into the Northern Epirus to connect with the allies at Saloniki and establish a shorter line of communication than the long sea route. Since Greece's entry into the war negotiations have been under way for abandonment of part of this section by Italy.

Greece also has further territorial ambitions in the Balkans and a solicitation for the 500,000 Greeks in Constantinople and the 2,000,000 Greeks which she claims in Asia Minor, particularly about Smyrna.

CURB ON N. S. FINAL

News Piracy Injunction Order Entered After Long Fight.

ALL COURTS FORBID THEFT

Efforts of International Service to Poll Protection for Associated Press Fail in Highest Tribunal in United States.

NEW YORK, July 16.—Although the United States Circuit Court of Appeals today rendered an opinion granting on every point submitted the injunction sought by the Associated Press to restrain the International News Service from pirating news belonging to the former organization, the entering of the order has been postponed by the attempts of the defendant organization, through their counsel, Samuel Untermyer, to obtain a stay, first, from the Circuit Court of Appeals; second, from the District Court, and third, from a Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States.

All three requests having been refused, the order has been entered by direction of Judge Augustus N. Hand, of the United States District Court of the Southern District of New York, restraining the International News Service from three practices:

(A) From inducing, procuring or permitting any telegraph editors or other employees or agents of the complainant or any of its members or of any newspaper or newspapers owned or represented by them or any of them, or any such members, to communicate with defendant or to permit defendant to take or appropriate, for consideration or otherwise, any news received from or gathered for complainant, and from purchasing, receiving, selling, transmitting or using any news so obtained.

(B) From inducing or procuring, directly or indirectly, any of complainant's members or any of the newspapers represented by them, to violate any of the agreements fixed by the charter and by-laws of the complainant.

(C) From copying, obtaining, taking, selling, transmitting or otherwise gainfully using, or from causing to be copied, obtained, taken, sold, transmitted or otherwise gainfully used, the complainant's news, either bodily or in substance, from bulletins issued by the complainant, or any of its members, or from editions of newspapers published by any of complainant's members, until its commercial value as news to the complainant and all of its members has passed away.

Although the court found that the Associated Press was not guilty of any such forms of piracy, it having voluntarily offered to submit to a like injunction to that contained in paragraph C, it is ordered that such a counter injunction also issue in that particular.

CATTLE AND HORSES POISONED

Mr. Reames Gets Reports Indicating I. W. W. Activities.

The poisoning of 25 horses and 200 cattle belonging to J. F. Adams, a rancher living near Klamath Falls, supposedly by I. W. W. agitators who are believed to have caused the fire there that destroyed property valued at \$150,000 Sunday morning, was reported yesterday to Clarence Reames, United States Attorney.

The report came from J. H. Carnahan, who was named special assistant

United States Attorney by Mr. Reames Sunday night to help handle the menacing situation at Klamath Falls.

Mr. Carnahan declared that, aside from the poisoning, the situation in Klamath Falls yesterday was much improved.

Forty I. W. W. were in jail, including the leaders, Mr. Carnahan said. The town was quiet, but more deputies were to be sworn in tonight.

United States Attorney Reames has sent William Bryan, special agent of the Department of Justice, to Klamath Falls to make a thorough investigation of conditions there. John W. Farnell also has been appointed special deputy United States Marshal.

GOVERNOR READY TO ACT

Organization of Defense Forces Will Be Hurdled.

SALEM, Or., July 16.—(Special.)—With reports of a small I. W. W. reign of terror in Klamath County coming into the executive offices today, Governor Withycombe offered the assistance of special agents to hunt down perpetrators of outrages and send them to the rockpile to remain until after the close of the harvest season.

The Governor this morning recommended the use of the vagrancy statute in connection with such I. W. W. as cannot give an account of themselves.

Governor Withycombe received word from United States Attorney Reames at Portland tonight that he had named a prosecutor as Deputy United States Attorney and also a Deputy United States Marshal for Klamath County.

Mr. Reames also suggested to the Governor the advisability of naming a special prosecutor to act for the state to assist the District Attorney in handling the Klamath Falls situation. The Governor attempted to get in touch with Attorney-General Brown tonight, but failed to find him, and said that he will take the question up with the Attorney-General in the morning.

The Governor also received word from Portland that two labor lawyers boarded the train there tonight for Klamath Falls, probably to act as counsel for the defense. He understands that steps will be taken to have any men now under arrest for complicity in the I. W. W. troubles released on habeas corpus proceedings.

The Governor believes that, as suggested, the vagrancy statute of 1911 will be used in handling the men in Klamath County, and from the activity taken in rushing lawyers from Portland apparently that law will have a good workout.

District Attorney Duncan, of Klamath County, telegraphed the Governor tonight of the appointment by United States Attorney Reames of a deputy prosecutor and deputy marshal acting for the Federal Government, and said: "With this assistance, believe me and Sheriff can handle legal situation."

Mr. Reames, however, suggested to the Governor that he believed a good trial lawyer should be added to the legal forces for the state, and it is to confer on this subject that the Governor will see Attorney-General Brown tomorrow.

The Governor will go to Portland tomorrow for a conference with representatives of the Chamber of Commerce, business and working interests to obtain co-ordinated effort to nip I. W. W. activities in the bud by the Klamath County outrages can be duplicated elsewhere in the state.

The Governor gave confirmation of reports coming from Klamath County of stock being poisoned there.

BISHOPS DE IN DUTY

Mexican Imposition on Church Related by Catholic.

WORK IS DONE IN SECRET

Government Virtually Is Lacking and People Would Improve Conditions if They Could, Says Rev. F. C. Kelly.

How the Mexican government organized a binder twine monopoly and increased the price from 3 1/2 cents a pound to 16 1/2 cents, and subsidized a press agency which sent out thousands of letters to make the American public think that special interests in the United States did the trick, was told by Right Reverend F. C. Kelly, of Chicago, at the Cathedral residence last night. He is head of the Catholic Church Extension Society of America, and is here in its behalf. He will leave for the East tomorrow.

Rev. Mr. Kelly is one of the most noted men in the Catholic Church of America and is recognized as an expert on Mexican religious affairs in particular and things Mexican in general. He declares that the condition exists in that revolution-torn country such as perhaps has never been known in history, as relating to the official action of the government affecting the churches, both Catholic and Protestant. He is spokesman for the exiled Catholic bishops.

Government Virtually Lacking. "There is virtually no government at all in Mexico," said Rev. Mr. Kelly, "and the situation there is of the most vital concern to the American people. While the action of the constitutional assembly in framing the law now in effect was aimed primarily at the Catholic church, it indirectly affects all of the others. It is a condition growing out of 70 years of turmoil and strife, culminating in the overthrow of things sacred and practically abandoning religion."

It is the result of military dictatorship, for the Mexican people of themselves have an inherent regard for culture, education and religion and, oppressed as they have been and ignorant as they have been, they would vote, restore order and pull out of the horrible misery and degradation into which they have fallen.

"The European war is the only thing which is saving the day for us as far as Mexico is concerned; but there will be no return to their religious devotion of property and the gross overriding of the civil and religious rights of foreign countries must be balanced. Meanwhile, should all that can be done is to await developments."

Hardships Kill Churches. "Since the Mexican government banished the clergy some of our brave bishops have died from hardships and privation; others are scattered here and there, while our priests are being carried off in our institutions elsewhere, except some who have recrossed the line and are working quietly and unknown to the authorities, plus some who have recently come into the country on oddest of experiences in the state of Yucatan. There the Governor, usurping the office of the bishop, ordered the priests to return to their parishes to proceed with their work. This is a most ludicrous situation, indeed—one of the most ludicrous of any denomination. It is in Yucatan alone that we are permitted to work."

The forbidding the presence of any foreign missionaries in any denomination in Mexico and even disfranchising Mexican clergymen. So you may easily see that it is very drastic."

Rev. Mr. Kelly came to Portland Saturday, accompanied by Rev. Joseph McElinchy, of Boston, secretary of the Catholic Church Extension Society. Together they are inspecting this field, in which the organization has assisted in placing about 100 new chapels in the past 12 years.

HOT WATER ROUTS MEN

WOMAN CHASES AGENTS OF GAS COMPANY FROM HOME.

Constable Holds Parley While Meter Is Taken Out After Employees Have Twice Been Driven Away.

Boiling water and a keen-edged ax constituted the first line of defense employed yesterday by Mrs. Matilda Dunn, 488 Grand avenue, in warding off the enemy, which consisted of deputy constables, lawyers and employees of the Portland Gas & Coke Company.

Mrs. Dunn is a recent divorcee and following the separation the gas company asked her to sign a new contract. Her spouse had paid the gas bills for 14 years and she felt that she should not be compelled to sign any kind of a contract.

The first gas company employee who went to her house was greeted with a kettle of boiling water.

A call for volunteers brought forth another employee, who went to the Dunn domicile with strong heart. He was met at the basement door with the sharp-edged ax. He left hurriedly and his tools followed him with reckless abandon from an open window.

Mrs. Dunn still held the trenches. Then the constable's office was asked to take out the meter. Chief Deputy Rennie, surrounded by attorneys and gas company employees, went forth. Rennie met Mrs. Dunn and the ax at the door and there was a merry chase around the basement before he had succeeded in bringing about a temporary peace pact.

While Mr. Rennie and Mrs. Dunn discussed the "battle" in one end of the basement, a gas man got busy and took out the meter. There were no casualties.

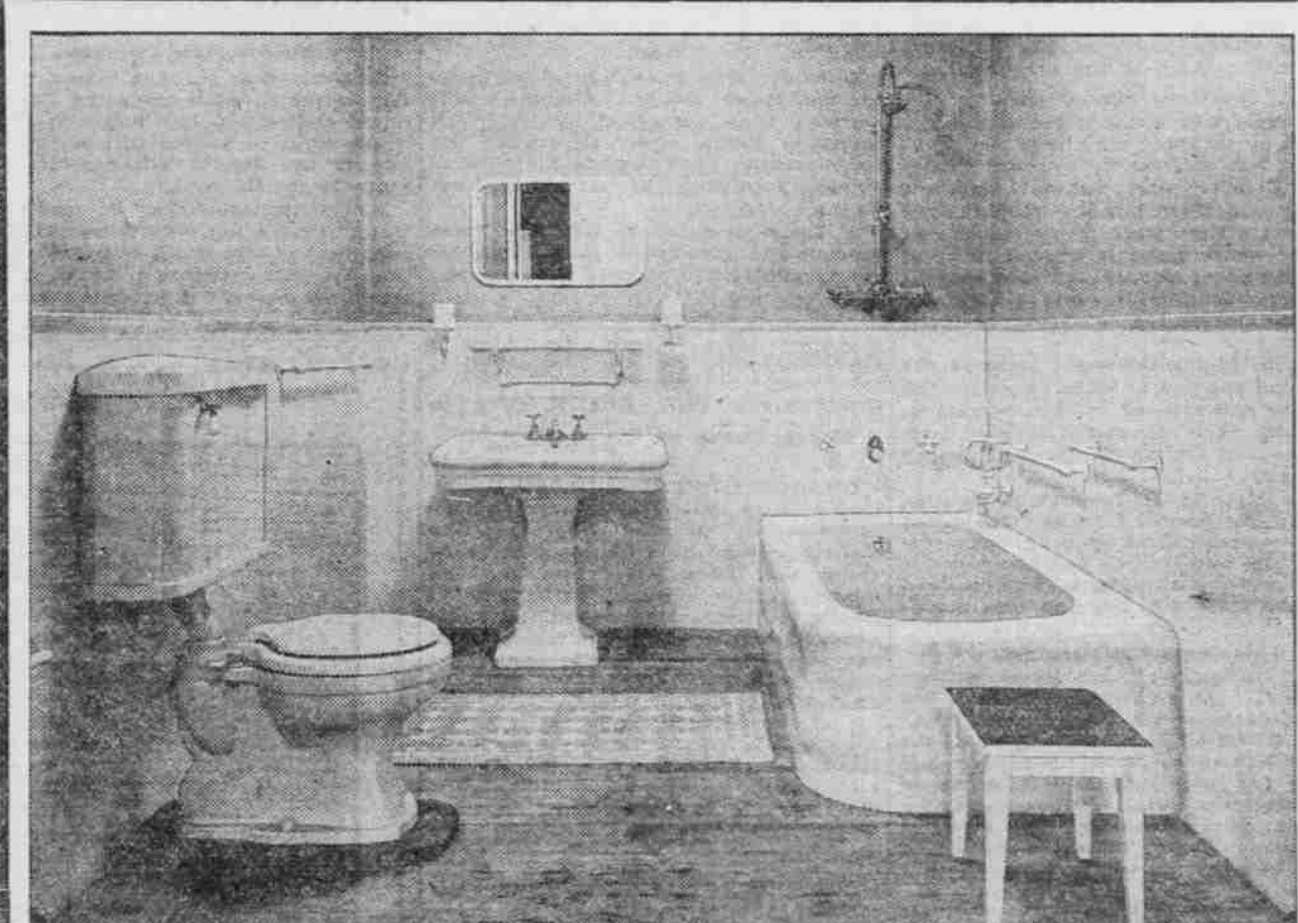
