HOQUIAM, Wash., July 18.—(Special.)—Despite the ruling of the Supreme Court yesterday barring picketing, striking industrial workers of the World continued today to picket mills and logging camps of Hoquiam and the Grays Harbor district. During the day, however, the forces of pickets were smaller.

At closing this evening large forces of pickets were out and in some cases at the mills women with infants in their arms or in baby carriages were among the pickets.

One mill operated in Hoquiam its entire plant today and reported a number of new men showing up for work. All other mills of the city are shut down, as are the camps of the district, but the mills are running planing mills and loading crews. Practically all reported more men showing up for work than yesterday. Men were sent to several camps today.

No disorders have occurred thus far in Hoquiam or the Harbor district. The strikers are peaceable, except for threats and intimidation used to keep men out of the mills.

Until the camps are running again the mills now down are not able to start or could run only a few days on account of the loss of labor. This will not be serious as soon as the camps can start, but the loss of supply in the booms is sufficient for only a few days.

I. W. W. ACTIVITY HINTED

Fire Near Sheridan Not Proved to Be From Spark.

SHERIDAN, Or., July 18.—(Special.)—The fire which broke out this morning prevented the forest fire in the timber of the Sheridan timber company, 12 miles west of here, from making any progress, but, according to a report to night, the breeze had come up fresh again and the flames were again leaping over the burned territory and had crossed from Pine Creek to Cedar Creek. It still covers about two sections of ground and a little uneasiness is felt by the mill men that the fire may veer and send the flames down the creek and endanger the mill.

Deputy fire wardens and employees of the company are guarding the fire. A statement was made from the head office here of the company said: "There is no more reason to believe the fire was the result of a spark than that it had been started by a spark."

Gross negligence is denied and an investigation is being made to see where the blame lies. This is the first indication of I. W. W. trouble about here.

STRIKE IS LITTLE CHANGED

Most of Seattle Mills Are Closed. Mediation Is Blocked.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 18.—The status of the lumber strike in the state of Washington is about the same today, in spite of statements of progress made by the unions and the lumbermen's defense committee. Steam and operating engineers have been called out in several Seattle and Ballard mills. Most of the mills in Seattle are closed, but the lumbermen say the streetcar strike is responsible.

Federal mediator Henry M. White, who has been seeking to bring about a conference of union representatives and manufacturers, received a letter from the lumbermen today saying the matter of hours was not subject to conference, the manufacturers insisting on the ten-hour day.

EMBRYO ENGINEER OFFICERS END WEEK AT TARGET RANGE

Combat Problem Is Worked Out Before Departure From Camp of Third Oregon—Guardsman Gets Dishonorable Discharge.

THE THIRD REGIMENT OREGON INFANTRY, July 18.—(Special.)—Major Edmund L. Daley and Captain Gillette, commanding the 135 student officers of the 16th provisional regiment of the Engineer Corps, returned to Vancouver Barracks today after a week of successful target practice and training.

The week of target practice resulted in more than 60 of the student officers qualifying as sharpshooters and expert riflemen. Still a greater number will have qualified, for up to the time of going away not all of the records had been completed. Sunday night, just about the sounding of taps, the engineers gave an exhibition of night illumination. A number of illuminating bombs were shot into the sky and their brilliancy illuminated the surrounding country.

One of the last things the engineers did before marching to the train was to work out a combat problem, which had been prepared by Colonel Vernon A. Caldwell and Captain Francis C. Endicott, of the Forty-fourth, the two regular Army officers conducting the examination of officers of the Third Oregon. While the problem was being worked out by two squads of the student officers, that of advancing across a field of fire, the engineers of the Oregon paused in their drill and watched the proceedings with interest. The examination was a stage fright that besets soldiers new at the war game, the work of the student officers was remarkably well done. A noticeable feature developed was the accurate shooting by the men in each squad.

MORTON, Wash., July 18.—(Special.)—A fire, attributed to I. W. W., is raging in the timber of the West Fork Logging Company, north of Morton. It has burned a large quantity of felled timber and is now burning in the standing timber. A crew of men is fighting desperately.

IDAHO SHERIFF MAKES HAUL

Latah and Clearwater Counties Are Clear of Disturbing Element.

MOSCOW, Idaho, July 18.—(Special.)—When Sheriff Sullivan, of Clearwater County, arrived in Moscow tonight with 23 members of the I. W. W. from Elk River, the authorities felt they had Latah and Clearwater practically cleared of this disturbing element.

When the sound-up began the officers expected to arrest 200 in the two counties, but so many took warning and slipped away that this number is reduced to 25 or 30.

The leaders are held in cells at the County Jail, the others at the Fair Grounds, with Sergeant W. P. Abendroth, United States Army, and a squad of Deputy Sheriffs guarding them. Today all visitors were barred and no conversation is permitted with the prisoners except by permission of the commandant.

Sheriff Campbell says he now has every I. W. W. in Latah County under arrest. There is no trouble of any kind.

CAMP WAGES ARE DISCUSSED

Activities of I. W. W. at American Lake Are Investigated.

TACOMA, Wash., July 18.—(Special.)—An investigation of the activities among the workers at the American Lake cantonment site was reported to be the cause of a call put in by officers in charge of the work for a conference with United States Marshal John M. Boyle and Sheriff Robert Longmire.

The call for the officers was made following a conference between Army heads, contractors and superintendents. A discussion of wage rates for laborers was held, it is said, as well as the activities of the I. W. W. in stirring railroad laborers to mutiny.

TROOPS ROUND UP STRIKERS

GEN. HSUN ONCE ON VISIT

RICH CHINESE IN PORTLAND ON MAY 28, 1915.

Conduct When With Trade Commission Far Different From That as Manchus Dynasty Leader.

CHANG HSUN, the man who almost "spilled the beans" for the Chinese republic a few days ago when he tried to restore the Manchus dynasty to the throne, the man who has been one of the biggest figures in China for many years, has maintained his own army and carried things with a high hand generally, was a quiet, inoffensive, unobtrusive visitor in Portland on May 28, 1915.

So out of keeping with his performance of the past few weeks was the manner of his visit to the city of Portland, that local people did not recognize him as the same individual.

Sold Back, Jr., and other prominent citizens of Portland, however, give assurances that the Chang Hsun who is in Portland heading the Chinese Trade Commission on its visit in May, 1915, and the General Chang Hsun who tried to tip over the Chinese republic with his own private army, are one and the same man.

Chang Hsun, when he visited Portland, was dressed in a western suit, but adhered to the provincial Chinese costume while the other members of the Commission adopted Occidental dress, talking little and seeing a great deal, and known as "the Rockefeller of China."

His private fortune is estimated at \$50,000,000, and nobody knew just the extent of the financial power which he controlled in China. He was identified in so many business ventures in China that they could not be enumerated.

FIRE THREATENS FARMS

Felida District Asks Assistance in Fighting Blaze.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 18.—(Special.)—The Sheriff's office today was appealed to by residents in the Felida district for assistance in fighting a fire which started in a slash near the M. H. Anderson place, four miles north of this city. The fire was threatening the destruction of several farm buildings.

The fire was beyond control and the buildings were in the direct path of the fire. Numerous small fires have been reported in logging camps in the county, but none have developed into fires of any seriousness as yet.

WEEK'S LOSS 26 VESSELS

British Reports Sinking of 14 Ships of More Than 1600 Tons.

LONDON, July 18.—Fourteen British ships of more than 1600 tons were sunk by submarines or mines in the last week, according to the official report tonight. Four British vessels under 1600 tons were sunk and eight fishing vessels.

PETROGRAD IS QUIET AFTER SPREE FIGHT

Council of Soldiers and Workmen Rejects Attempts to Influence Action.

SIX KILLED; 238 WOUNDED

Organization of New Cabinet Is Interrupted by Uprisings, to Be Kept Down in Future—All Night Session Is Held.

PETROGRAD, July 18.—The outbreak named more soldiers yesterday was a repetition of those the day before, except that they occurred at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, whereas the first outbreak occurred around midnight.

The manifestations were grouped along the same part of the Nevsky Prospekt. A number of stray shots were heard, followed by the firing of rifles against upper windows and roof tops at a seemingly imaginary foe.

For the first time since the revolution Cosacks appeared and patrolled the streets. Companies here and there carried machine guns strapped to their saddles, the men leading their horses.

Session to Last All Night.

The Council of the new body of Soldiers, Workmen and Peasants of all Russia, the extremists abstaining from participation, adopted a resolution today after an all-night session rejecting "with indignation all attempts to influence the attitude of that body."

It is the intention of the council to seek to impose the will of isolated military elements upon the whole of Russia. Blood has been shed in the streets of Petrograd. All these acts toward our revolutionary army, which is defending the conquests of the revolution at the front, are acts of treachery and felony.

Whoever attacks the recognized democratic order, whoever sows discord in their ranks, is striking a dagger's blow in the back of the revolutionary army, which is fighting against the troops of William."

City Is Quiet After Storm.

Following the series of clashes between patrolling forces of the government and Maximilists last night, the city today was quiet and a continuous downpour of rain. Yesterday's list of casualties, so far as ascertained, comprises six persons killed and 238 wounded.

Most of those killed yesterday were in sight of the Nadezhdinskaya when the Moscow Bolshevik troops opened fire on unarmed Cosacks passing in the Nevsky Prospekt. Their own firing started a panic, in which five of their number were killed and 20 wounded.

The Maximilists have asked for more help from Kronstadt, most of the Kronstadt contingent having returned home last night. It was rumored today that a second influx of Kronstadt sailors might be expected before night.

The St. Peter and St. Paul fortress, although commanded by a Maximilist, apparently is not in sympathy with the Insurrectionists. The garrison at the fortress refused the demand of a machine-gun contingent of the Maximilists to fire on the army.

Hostage Is Seized. M. Tcherno, Minister of Agriculture, was arrested at the Duma by Maximilists, who started to take him away from his home. He was taken to the steps of the building. The Minister was roughly handled by the crowd, but he was released after a short time. He was recognized by Trotsky, one of the agitators, Lenin's, Lieutenants, who protested and harangued the Minister's captors and obtained his release. The taking into custody of M. Tcherno is accounted for by yesterday's rumor concerning the arrest of M. Tcheldze, president of the central executive committee of the council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates.

A group of Maximilists were arrested by patrolling forces of the city police. A group of the telegraph and cable office.

At a conference of ministers and workmen and soldiers' delegates, even to the point of placing the city under martial control. General Polovtsev, Governor of the military district, was ordered to put down the insurrection. As a result he ordered out the Cosacks and several companies of infantry to patrol the streets.

Premier Lvoff today sent the following telegram to all the provisional governments: "In reply to your inquiry, the Minister of the Interior informs you that the reports regarding the arrests of members of the provisional government are false. The appeals to overthrow the government by force of arms and transfer all powers to the soldiers and workmen have the character of irresponsible acts on the part of the members of an extreme minority, and were received in an unfriendly manner by the people."

Cabinet Formation Interrupted. "At the same time the government, in full agreement with the soldiers' and workmen's delegates, has decided to take measures to avert the occurrence of incidents which might be inimical to the state. The events of yesterday and today have for the time being interrupted the negotiations which are in progress for the completion of the Cabinet, but as soon as the disorders are at an end the negotiations will be resumed."

TWO JAILED AS SLACKERS

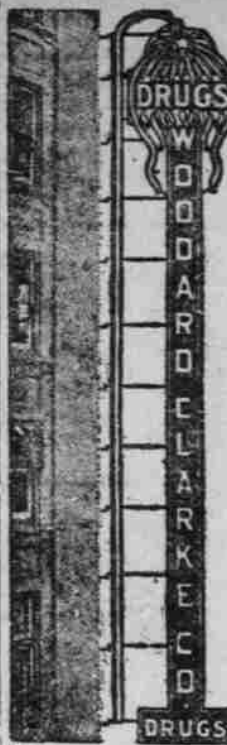
Man Giving Home as Portland, and Sailor Held at Astoria.

Campbell has been here about three months, and obtained an absentee's registration card at the County Clerk's office, but did not forward it to Multnomah County.

Henry Marko, who was arrested last night on a similar charge, has been taken to Portland to appear before the Federal grand jury. Marko is a sailor and was away on June 5, registration day, but he returned on June 25 and did not register within the following five days, as the regulations require.

TOM WORD HELD AT BAY

MRS. RUTH ABBOTT CHARGED WITH THREATENING TO TAKE LIFE.

Party of Portland Men, Claiming Ownership in Mine, Are Stood Off at Point of Revolver.

SALEM, Or., July 18.—(Special.)—Sheriff Needham and Constable Varney returned from the Santiam country late last night with Ray Graves and Mrs. Ruth Abbott, charged with threatening the life of ex-Sheriff Tom Word, of Portland, along with other persons who went with Word to claim ownership to the Black Eagle mine near the Breitenbush.

It is alleged that Mrs. Abbott held up Word and a party of six others at the point of a six-shooter and "frisked" their clothes to see if they were armed. The trouble arose over a dispute as to the ownership of the Black Eagle mine which was sold at sheriff's sale. Thinking they had some claim as former owners of the mine, Word with his party started for the mine Saturday. They met two forest rangers who wanted them not to go into the mine armed, or there might be trouble, so they dropped their arms, it is said, and went on. They were met by Graves, Mrs. Abbott and her husband, who warned them to keep off the property. At that time, it is charged, Mrs. Abbott, fearing that they were not armed, drew her revolver and threatened the men with six-shooters and searched them for arms.

Graves and Mrs. Abbott are charged with threatening to take life, the complaint being sworn to by M. M. Shire.

Stuttgart Factory Blown Up.

AMSTERDAM, June 18.—The Neues Tagblatt, of Stuttgart, Germany, reports that on Saturday a great explosion occurred at the Wilhelm Weiffenbach factory. The building was destroyed, neighboring houses were damaged greatly and windows were broken in the nearby village of Suedheim.
