

'LOYALTY LEAGUE' TO EXPAND SCOPE

Copper Operators to Americanize Labor of Arizona Districts.

GERMAN MINERS ARRESTED

Allen's Trunk Contains Shotguns, Ammunition and Certificate of Registration as German Reserve Officer.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 19.—Claims of representatives of employers, and representatives of striking shingle weavers, mill workers and loggers in Western Washington differ still as to the success of the strikers.

The breakup of the strike in the shingle mills within a week is predicted by E. S. Grammer, chairman of the Lumbermen's Protective League. Mr. Grammer admitted that the situation among the loggers and mill workers controlled by industrial workers of the world was not so encouraging. He declared that fear of intimidation by industrial workers was responsible for this.

President Jay G. Brown, of the Shingle Weavers' Union, declares that 20,000 men are out approximately 275 shingle mills closed and that 75 mill owners have gone on the eight-hour basis since Monday.

Leading lumbermen today declared that they had found it impossible to find head or tail to the strike, much less to deal with the strikers.

Strike Declared Complex.

"We do not know and the strikers themselves do not know what the strike is all about," declared a representative of the lumbermen's committee.

"Our reports inform us that even where mills have agreed to the eight-hour day and conceded other demands, the workers have struck or remained on strike. The strike seems without leadership and to be a general unrest fomented by some influence in the background."

Strikers attach great importance to a resolution adopted by the Seattle Central Labor Council last night, demanding a Federal investigation of alleged coercion exerted by large logging interests to prevent small millers from yielding to the strikers by threatening to cut off the supply of logs.

L. W. W. Affiliation Denied.

J. G. Brown, president of the International Shingle Weavers' Union, declares that a large majority of the shingle manufacturers strongly desired to grant the eight-hour day and the other demands of the union, but had been whipped into line by a combination of 25 large logging companies that supply the tidewater mills with shingle timber.

Brown denies that the strike is in the hands of the industrial workers of the world, although the latter organization called out its men after the shingle weavers and timber workers had made their demands.

I. W. W. GET 60 DAYS EACH

Costs Also Imposed on Men Picked Up at Chehalis.

CHEHALIS, Wash., July 19.—(Special.)—Judge Reynolds, of the Lewis County Superior Court, passed sentence of 60 days each in jail and costs on the eight men recently picked up by the soldiers at Chehalis in cleaning up the I. W. W. in this section.

This means the men who gave their names as George Kraft, Harry Musser, E. Cobb, Charles Andrews, Andrew Bonns, Ainkala, E. L. Daugherty and W. J. Quinn, will break rock at Meskill rock quarry for the county for a few weeks to come.

IDLE WILL BE PUT TO WORK

Idaho Falls Insists That I. W. W. Get Jobs or Break Rock.

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho, July 19.—Following a meeting of citizens, at which industrial workers of the world agitators, resulting in scarcity of labor, were discussed, city authorities decided that all unemployed men must go to work, leave town or else be placed under guard in a detention corral and made to break rock.

Mayor George W. Edgington this morning issued a proclamation calling on the entire city to respond to the government call for production by helping the farmers harvest their crops.

Governor Lister Sends Troops.

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 19.—Governor Lister today notified the Federal Government that he is sending a small

tachment of troops to Aberdeen, where a sawmill strike is in progress, also a guard for the bridges over the Skagit River near Sedro-Woolley and at Mount Vernon.

DEFENSE BODY IS ORGANIZED

Grants Pass Citizens Get Ready to Deal With I. W. W.

GRANTS PASS, Or., July 19.—(Special.)—As a result of the recent I. W. W. disturbances in the neighboring county of Klamath, the citizens of this city have organized a group of 60 men into a home defense company under the command of Sheriff George Lewis. The men agree to hold themselves subject to instantaneous call by the Sheriff. Most of the men live in this city, but a few are scattered among the mining camps in the hills.

TROOPS NOT TO FIGHT FIRES

Guardsmen Needed to Meet War Emergency, Medford Is Told.

MEDFORD, Or., July 19.—Military authorities in Portland refused to allow members of Company I, Third Oregon Infantry, to aid in the fighting of forest fires in the Prospect district Wednesday. Lincoln McCormack, secretary of the Jackson County Fire Patrol Association, telegraphed Colonel Denton, of Portland, who replied: "Cannot authorize use of troops for fighting forest fires. As in present emergency they must be instantly ready for military duty."

The fires, however, were gotten under control Wednesday night by a force of 60 volunteer fighters under the direction of Martin Erickson, Federal forest supervisor, and W. T. Grieve, of the State Forest Service.

TWO TOWNS ASK FOR HELP

Winlock and Bunker Appeal to Sheriff at Chehalis.

CHEHALIS, Wash., July 19.—(Special.)—The Sheriff's office has received telephone messages for help from Winlock and Bunker, where striking men were trying to intimidate workers. Threats to do bodily harm were made at Winlock and a posse was sent there at once with orders to arrest anyone making threats.

Little trouble is reported on the South Bend branch line. There are no indications of trouble in Chehalis plants.

TROOPS TO GUARD MILLS

Attempts May Be Made to Renew Operations on Grays Harbor.

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 19.—(Special.)—Attempts to reopen some mills and camps of the county may be made this week as a result of the expected early arrival here of Federal troops. Millmen believe men can easily be obtained if assured they will be protected. There has been no disorder to date.

The Anderson & Middleton plant closed today, leaving only three sawmills in operation on the harbor.

I. W. W. to Be Kept in Stockade.

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., July 19.—Governor Lister telegraphed Sheriff Murphy today that he had instructed the highway department to turn over to the Yakima County authorities the stockade at the state quarry at Selah. The Sheriff asked for the quarry for safekeeping Federal industrial workers of the world prisoners, the County jail being filled.

FREIGHT LESS CONGESTED

Railroads War Board Reports Improvement in Situation.

NEW YORK, July 19.—Efforts of the country's railroads to speed up transportation as an aid to the nation's war activities has resulted in extraordinary improvement in the amount of coal handled and marked gains in other classes of freight, according to a statement tonight by Fairfax Harrison, chairman of the Railroads War Board. "Reports to the United States Government," Mr. Harrison said, "show that in June the railroads of the country handled 750,323 cars of bituminous coal, an increase of 25.2 per cent over June of last year."

Unfilled car orders, or what is called the "car shortage," the statement declared, showed a reduction on June 30 of nearly 50 per cent from the situation on May 1.

DRAFT INTERCHANGE FIXED

England and Russia Will Force Subjects to Serve in Armies.

LONDON, July 19.—A convention made between the British and the provisional Russian government was laid before Parliament today to the effect that British subjects of military age in Russia and Russian subjects of military age here must either return to their own country or serve in the army of the country in which they are residing.

STRIKE VIEWS VARY

Chairman of Protective Association P. dict's Victory.

CONCESSIONS OF NO AVAIL

Strikers Attach Importance to Action by Seattle Labor Council

Demanding Investigation of Alleged Cases of Coercion.

BISBEE, Ariz., July 19.—A meeting of operators of copper mines in Arizona is to be held within the next week, it was announced today, for the purpose of initiating a movement to extend the "loyalty league" movement to most of the camps in this section and for the Americanization of the industry.

The stand against employment of foreign miners was first taken by the copper companies. The Old Dominion plant at Globe, it was declared here today, has taken a similar stand.

Approximately 50 men, charged with ore of such a class that no attempt will be made to supplant foreigners with Americans here as yet, it was said. The move to organize "loyalty leagues" is described as the operators' effort to offset the activities of the industrial workers of the world.

GLOBE, Ariz., July 19.—Two Miami miners, both of German birth, were arrested today by special officers of the Department of Justice and brought to the County Jail in this city as alleged alien enemies.

In the trunk of one of the prisoners was found two shotguns, a pistol, a considerable amount of ammunition and a certificate of registration with the German Consul as a German reserve officer. Neither has been naturalized.

Approximately 50 men, charged with rioting here July 4, were placed on preliminary hearing here today before a Justice of the Peace. The men were charged with the crime of rioting at the time of the alleged riot.

The court denied separate trials to the defendants.

BISBEE, Ariz., July 19.—The investigation committee of miners and citizens, which is examining all applicants for work and any others whose records are not known, was in session all day today examining 113 applicants.

Miller Merrill, a miner and president of the Workmen's Loyalty League, conducts these examinations, assisted by Bassett Watkins and others. All applicants are given an opportunity to state their cases, spectators are permitted to ask questions and a decision is then arrived at as to the disposition of the case and consideration.

Armed guards—some of them dressed in khaki and wearing leggings so that they look like soldiers to the uninitiated—are posted at strategic points along the highways and railroads entering the district. These outposts are manned night and day and are visited daily by Sheriff Wheeler. Every automobile is stopped and inspected, and the occupants questioned closely. The various outposts are in communication by means of telephones and signals.

A fund of more than \$70,000 is said to have been raised to defray the expenses of this elaborate system of picketing.

Sheriff Wheeler has warned the guards to keep a close watch for persons attempting to bring liquor into the district.

"Whiskey" said the Sheriff, "is as bad as the wobbles" for stirring up trouble."

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., July 19.—With the arrival of an industrial workers of the world agitator in Bakersfield, the "wobblies" of "wobblies" in the oil fields of California became a known fact today. The men are migrating here from Arizona and other states.

Progress of the War.

HAVING brought up heavy reinforcements all along the line, the Germans and Austro-Hungarians in Eastern Galicia have started what apparently is a tremendous offensive against the Russians. From Brody, near the northern end of the Carpathians, southward to below Kalusz, the operations are in full swing, but particulars of the battles are not available.

The latest German official communication announces that the Germans have defeated the Russians over a wide front near Zloczoff, which lies on the

Tarnopol-Lemberg railway line about 40 miles distant from the capital.

To the north in Volhynia and still further north on various sectors to the Baltic Sea, especially around Smorgons and Dvinsk, heavy artillery duels are being fought. Near Lutsk the Germans report the capture of many Russian prisoners.

Apparently the Germans are intent on breaking the French line in the region between Soissons and Rheims, having delivered another tremendous assault from northeast of Craonne to the east of Hurtleuse. In the fray were thrown picked troops, who were mown down everywhere and the attack, like others that had preceded it, failed. Near Soissons the Germans delivered attacks on a front of about half a mile. Here they succeeded in penetrating French first line positions only to be expelled by a counter attack.

There has been no diminution in the artillery duels between the British and Germans in Northern Belgium, nor in the attacks the British have been making against German trenches. Around French Le Prieux these infantry attacks have resulted in the British regaining all the ground they lost to the Germans east of Arras July 11.

British forces operating against the Turks have made a 13-mile advance up the Taurus range, disclosed dozens of the situation now is well in hand. The latest reports from Petrograd indicate that the disturbances of the last few days have been quelled and that the situation is now well in hand. The streets of the capital are being patrolled by cosaks and other mounted troops.

The accident occurred about 9:30 o'clock and he was taken to his home. His injuries include a sprained hand and probable injury to his spine and hip. It was announced at his home.

BERLIN BANK ACCOUNTS INCREASE.

BERLIN, July 17, via London, July 19.—Savings deposits in Berlin banks increased 10,000,000 marks last month. There are now \$55,000,000 deposits, with a total deposit of 422,000,000 marks.

GERMAN AGENTS BLAMED

I. W. W. Activity Rouses ex-Senator Clark.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 19.—(Special.)—W. A. Clark, president of the Salt Lake Railway and ex-Senator, is convinced that the present I. W. W. disorders and strikes are due to German spies and German money in the attempt to embroil the productive interests of value to the allies, particularly those regarding metals and lumber.

He gains this decision from talks with Secret Service men and Government officials and from the fact that the I. W. W. now have more money in the hands of their leaders and gain more members than ever before.

DEATH CLAIMS TO BE PAID

Merger of North American and Fraternal Aid Unions Prevented.

CHICAGO, July 19.—Payment of mortuary claims against the North American Union which have accumulated during the four months it has been in the hands of a receiver, is made possible by a decree signed today by Judge Foell in the Superior Court in the suit of the State Attorney-General to prevent the merger of the North American Union and the Fraternal Aid Union, both fraternal organizations.

The claims aggregate \$500,000 and, according to officials of the Fraternal Aid Union, will be paid within the next few days.

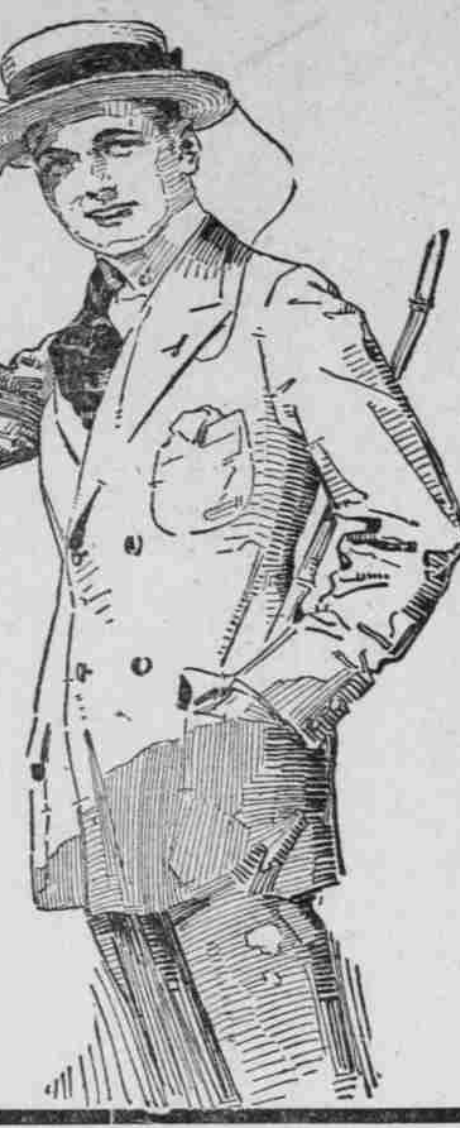
Test of Army Draft Law Will Reach Supreme Court.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—Associate Justice Brandeis today granted Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman, now serving sentence in Federal penitentiaries for conspiracy to impede the work of the Army draft law, permission to appeal their cases to the Supreme Court from the District Court in New York.

He also granted such permission to Morris Becker and Louis Kramer, convicted on similar charges. These are the first cases involving the draft law to reach the Supreme Court.

Alaska Spruce to Be Mapped.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 18.—Government Forest Service men are said to be mapping and estimating the timber in the region of Skimp Bay and Traitor's Cove, Alaska. The timber is Sitka spruce, and this area is said to contain a billion feet of timber. The United States Government has already announced its intention of building a pulp and paper mill in Alaska, and intimations have been received that the mill will be situated at Ketchikan.
