

THREAT OF STRIKE BACKS UP DEMAND

Miners' Union Appeals to
President in Behalf of
Deported Workmen.

MEN NOT I. W. W., IT IS SAID

Strike Is Blamed on New Company,
Which Is Charged With Rescind-
ing Agreement With Union
Before Time Is Out.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 1.—Following receipt of word today that about 80 members of the United Mine Workers of America had been deported from a tent colony at Gallup, N. M., William Green, secretary of the organization, telegraphed President Wilson demanding that the Federal Government intervene and return the men, saying in his message:

"Unless this is done quickly, I will favor a strike of coal miners in the United States until this outrage is righted."

Deported Men Not I. W. W.

Mr. Green stated, when he reported to him as deported were not Industrial Workers of the World, but were members in good standing of the United Mine Workers of America.

Following is a statement given out by Mr. Green late today:

"We were advised today that 80 or more members of the United Mine Workers of America who were on strike at Gallup, N. M., were deported from their homes without cause or justification whatever. These men had been working under a two-year contract with the Victor American Fuel Company, which contract had been made by the United Mine Workers of America with the aforesaid coal company."

Men Ejected From Homes.

"Recently a copper mining company purchased the mine and notified the men they would not operate as a union mine. The men were discharged and ejected from their homes. When this was done they were supplied with tents by the United Mine Workers of America. All was quiet when suddenly the coal company's representatives and others who claimed they were supplied with authority loaded the men on cars and deported them."

Machine Gun on Coal Company's Truck Menaces Miners.

GALLUP, N. M., Aug. 1.—W. H. Hanna, United States Commissioner here, who yesterday called before the local Council of Defense and instructed as to what sort of news he might not print in a paper he owns here, today made the following statement:

"Gallup was enjoying peace and prosperity at the time the Gallup-American Coal Company took possession of the property of the Victor-American Fuel Company. I believed the men were right in their contention not to go to work for the new company unless the contract with their labor organization was recognized, it having been made with the previous owners."

"As editor of the Gallup Independent I gave my readers a statement of the facts as I considered them fair from the labor side, and what I could learn from the employers' side."

"The gunmen of the new company took possession of Gallup, three miles from the coal camps, and apparently the whole country."

"I was arrested yesterday by two coal company gunmen and placed in a room with 27 other persons, mostly miners. We were guarded by 19 gunmen, armed with rifles and pistols. A machine gun mounted on a coal company automobile truck was pointed at our room."

trained on us. I remained there about three hours, after which I was called before the Council of Defense and given certain instructions. Then I was released."

Miners employed at the Gallup Southwestern Coal Company and 40 days Diamond Coal Company mines here quit work this morning, except for about 75 men employed at the Diamond. Several hundred men are out. Union official yesterday assured the County Defense Council that no strike would be called in any of the Gallup mines today, but had been reported to the Council that men of all shifts here would be ordered to quit work.

This is the only development of note since the Defense Council last night deported 32 alleged members and sympathizers of the Industrial Workers of the World.

Leadville Wages Are Advanced.

LEADVILLE, Colo., Aug. 1.—Mine operators of the Leadville district late today announced an increase of wages of 50 cents a day, making the scale \$4 a day. This probably will result in ending the strike which has tied up metal mine operations for 10 days.

Committee of union and non-union strikers agreed Monday night to accept an increase of 50 cents a day. Their original demands were \$1 a day.

8-HOUR DAY IS GRANTED

TEN HOURS' PAY AGREED TO BY EIGHT TACOMA MILLS.

Twenty-one Firms Reducing Working Time: Retail Clerks Are Organizing Into Union.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 1.—(Special.)—Up to tonight eight lumber mills and woodworking establishments and four furniture factories in Tacoma and vicinity had granted the eight-hour day with ten hours' pay, and they began working on that schedule today. The last to come in was Murphy & Co., general mill work manufacturers.

The list complete follows:

Wheeler Osgood Company, 620 men; Danaher Lumber Company, 100 men; Local Lumber Company, 40 men; Northwestern Woodware, 200 men; Murphy & Co., 25 men; Keystone Lumber Company, 35 men; Leley Lumber Company, 30 men; Builders' Manufacturing & Supply Company, 15 men; F. S. Harmon & Co., 180 men; Gregory Furniture Manufacturing Company, 125 men; Carman Manufacturing Company, 200; West Coast Chair Company, 20 men.

Twenty-one Tacoma firms in all have granted the eight-hour day. Of this number six are department stores. A union of retail clerks is being formed.

YOUNG OFFICERS ASKED General Pershing Puts 45 as Limit of Age for Commanders.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—(Special.)—No officer in command of regiment, brigade or division who is more than 45 years old will be sent to France. General Pershing called the War Department today not to send regular Army or National Guard officers over this age.

Pershing said that from observation and conference with French and British commanders he does not believe older officers can do the work at the front. The War Department undoubtedly will observe Pershing's request. Older officers of the National Guard thus will be barred from European service.

CITY REWARDS PATRIOTS

Employees in Officers' Training Camp Not to Lose by Change.

City employees who have joined the Officers' Reserve Training Camp are to be paid by the city the difference in their city pay and the pay received from the Government while in the service. An ordinance covering this was presented to the city council by Mayor Baker and was passed by unanimous vote.

Several employees went to the training camp and by so doing have forfeited their city salary. The ordinance will make up to them the loss. The same relief is being given all city employees enlisting in other branches of the Army or Navy.

JITNEYS WOULD CONTINUE

Tacoma Operators Plan to Get Bonds in Compliance With Order.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 1.—(Special.)—With announcement made today by Chief of Police Harry Smith that unlicensed jitneys would not be allowed to operate when streetcar service was resumed, many of those who jumped in the transportation breach in the last week declared that they would get bonds and continue in the traffic field.

Several hundred jitneys have been operating during the strike.

The jitneys operated here until their chief bonding company went out of business several months ago and when no other concern would accept the risk they were forced to suspend.

SHIP LOSS IS REDUCED

Britain Loses 18 Vessels of More Than 1600 Tons in Week.

LONDON, Aug. 1.—Some falling off in the loss of British merchantmen by submarines noted in the official summary issued tonight. Eighteen British vessels of more than 1600 tons were sunk by submarines or mines last week. Three vessels under 1600 tons were sunk, while no fishing vessels were lost.

According to the Admiralty report of the previous week, the losses were 21 British vessels of more than 1600 tons each, three of less than 1600 tons and one fishing vessel.

\$911 SEWED IN CLOTHING

Exhausted Fire Fighter Discovers Wealth at Hospital.

When Matt Dugan, aged 66, was taken to the Emergency Hospital yesterday morning suffering from exhaustion, he had with him all his worldly wealth sewed in his clothing.

The nurses were preparing to put Mr. Dugan on a cot when they discovered a bank roll containing \$900. Mr. Dugan disclosed in the lining of his shirt another \$11.

Mr. Dugan fell exhausted fighting forest fires Tuesday and was compelled to come to this city for medical treatment.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Regular Army recruits accepted yesterday number 2335, bringing the total since April 1 to 173,266. The army now is slightly more than 10,000 short of war strength.

DOCTORS GO TO WAR

Portland Is Sending 79 Physicians and Surgeons.

PER CENT OF LIST IS 18

With Few Exceptions Volunteers Have Given Up Established Practices and Will Suffer Certain Financial Loss.

Seventy-nine Portland physicians and surgeons have already been called or have volunteered for service in various branches of the United States Army and Navy, representing about 18 per cent of the 375 doctors in the city. Dr. House has compiled a list of doctors now in or ready for the service and points out that it has been stated that 20,000 American doctors will be needed, or about 12½ per cent of the total number in the United States. If all cities had given as generously as Portland doctors have offered their services there would be 25,300 in the service or ready to serve.

The record thus made by Portland doctors, compares well with the excellent showing made in the liberty bond campaign, the Red Cross campaign and the general enlistment. The list as compiled by Dr. House is obtained from varied sources and may not be entirely complete, as there is no general headquarters for registration. All listed have volunteered and none is represented in the conscription. Many are married and have children and all are making sacrifices in one way or another.

ALIEN DRAFT PLAN UP
SENATE ASKS PRESIDENT TO NEGOTIATE WITH ALLIES.
France Adopts Bill Requiring All Residents of Military Age Must Serve or Go.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Senator McCumber's resolution requesting the President to negotiate with the allies for an agreement to allow drafting of their alien nationals in this country was adopted late today by the Senate.

PARIS, Aug. 1.—The Chamber of Deputies, without discussion, today adopted a bill providing for military service in France of citizens of allied countries residing here. Under the terms of this law, a foreigner desiring to serve will no longer be compelled to enter the foreign legion, but may enter a French regiment.

The law provides, however, that every alien in France liable for military service in his own country must serve here or be regarded as a deserter.

POTSDAM MEETING DENIED
Berlin Issues Official Statement Challenging London Times.

BERLIN, via Copenhagen, Aug. 1.—An official statement issued today by the German government says: "The Times (of London) and the enemy agencies following it are spreading a report about a conference alleged to have been held in the presence of the Emperor at Potsdam July 5, 1914, at which the political and military personages in Germany and Austria-Hungary took part and at which a plan was proposed to let loose the war."

"The Wolff Bureau is authorized to declare the statement with all their details pure inventions. Neither on the day named nor on any other day in July did such a joint conference occur, either with or without the participation of the Emperor."

ALLIES LEAVING GREECE
Last of Franco-British Troops Evacuate Piraeus.

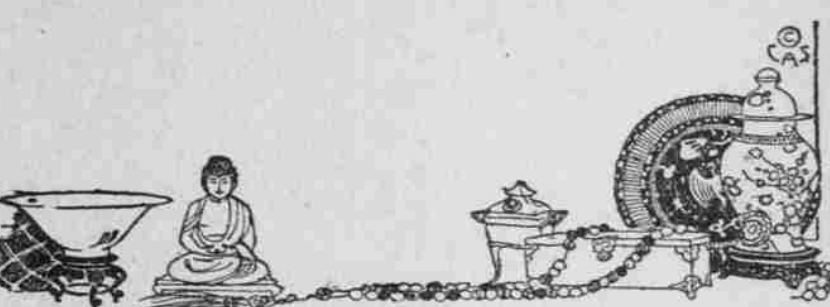
ATHENS, July 30.—(Delayed.)—Withdrawal of the allied forces from Old Greece, Thessaly and Epirus, in accordance with the decision of the Balkan conference at Paris, is being rapidly carried out. The last Franco-British troops left Piraeus today. The withdrawal from Corinth and other occupied points was previously executed.

The Italians are similarly preparing to leave Janina and other sections of Piraeus, retaining only a small triangle near Avlona in Albania.

Preparations are under way to call out the classes of 1916 and 1917, aggregating 60,000 men.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 1.—The retail price of milk was raised here today to 11 cents a quart and 6½ cents a pint by practically all of the dairy and creamery companies in the city. The former price was 10 cents a quart and 5½ cents a pint.
