

SLAYER RECOUNTS MARITAL CRUELTY

Mrs. De Saulles Says ex-Husband Kept All His Good Qualities for Public.

INSANITY MAY BE PLEA

Mother Alleged to Have Been Worried by Fact Son Is Kept by Father Longer Than Expected. Attorney Offers Explanation.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—(Special).—Sitting in her cell in the New York County Jail at Minotola L. L. Mrs. Blanca De Saulles, who killed her former husband, "Jack" De Saulles, Yale football hero and ex-diplomat, for fear that he would get their child away from her, told the story of her sufferings which had led to the act she committed on Friday night.

She painted him in the blackest colors. He was a man, as she described him, who kept all his good qualities for the general public and displayed only his bad ones in his home. A few, she said, were acquainted with the reverse side of the picture, the side which was presented mainly by his wife.

Money Was Lure, Ex-Wife Says.
De Saulles married her believing she had millions, she said, neglected her when he found she had less than he expected, returned to his Broadway favorites when their honeymoon was hardly over; obtained \$47,000 from her by stealth and false pretenses; introduced his mistress into his own home in her absence; drove his baby boy about the city in automobiles with his mistress and took the boy with him into harems.

The young woman told her story in a low unemotional tone, without change of expression, as if stunned into a sort of apathy by her act. She used no bitter language in talking of her former husband, but spoke as if she were reciting the merest commonplace.

Fortune Divulges to \$50,000.

John R. Bleckman, an acquaintance of De Saulles' who called at the Nassau County Jail to offer his services to Mrs. De Saulles, said he could prove that De Saulles had boasted in 1911 that he was going to Europe to marry a rich woman for her wealth and that he borrowed money with which to go to Paris to marry her.

Mrs. De Saulles said today that when she married she had about \$100,000, which has now been reduced to a little over \$50,000 by the inroads of De Saulles. The family possessed but a shell of its former wealth when she met him at Santiago in 1911. On the other hand, Mrs. De Saulles and her family were led to believe that De Saulles was wealthy.

The first inkling that she had, that "Jack" De Saulles was not wealthy, was when she discovered that he had sold stock belonging to her worth \$10,000 and pocketed the money without telling her about it. She told of her return to this country with her husband and of his cold treatment that developed, she said, when he found she was not as wealthy as he supposed.

Belief that Mrs. De Saulles was temporarily insane when she shot and killed her former husband, at his Long Island home last night, was expressed yesterday by Henry A. Uterhart, counsel for Mrs. De Saulles. Fear that Mr. De Saulles would insist upon keeping their 4-year-old son longer than he is said to have agreed was assigned by Mr. Uterhart as the cause of the mother's demerita.

Mother Grants Request.

Mr. and Mrs. De Saulles had an agreement under which custody of the child alternated each month. Mr. Uterhart said Mrs. De Saulles kept her son from June 1 to July 6, six days after the agreed period, and that account he agreed that the boy should remain with Mrs. De Saulles from July 6 until August 8.

Desiring, however, to have the child at his home during a visit of his parents and other relatives yesterday, Mr. De Saulles sent for the boy with the request that he be permitted to spend the afternoon at his home, the attorney said.

The mother granted the request from the understanding that the boy was to be returned in the evening. Mr. Uterhart said Mrs. De Saulles told him when 3 o'clock came and the boy had not been returned, Mr. Uterhart believed, the mother brooded over the fact until she became "temporarily demerita."

AUTO PLUNGE WITNESSED

Portland Motorists See Machine Go Over Near Tongue Point.

Dr. J. F. Drake, member of the Portland School Board, and R. H. Thomas, school clerk, returned to Portland yesterday by automobile from Seaview, Wash., and brought with them a brief account of a thrilling but apparently harmless automobile accident which they witnessed just as they were leaving Astoria yesterday morning.

Their party saw a large touring car loaded with passengers leave the road near Tongue Point and plunge several hundred feet down an embankment. Dr. Drake halted his machine and hurried to give assistance, but as they neared the spot they saw the occupants of the disabled car leaving the wreckage. One man in the party seemed to be hurt, but the others escaped apparently without serious injury.

Another automobile party on the lower level of the road at that place gave assistance, and the Portland party, unable to be of aid, came on to Portland.

Seven Taken in Raid.

Seven men were arrested last night at 23½ North Fourth street in a raid on an alleged gambling game by Patrolmen Schad and Long.

HERD OF BLOODED GOATS BROUGHT BY PORTLAND MEN FROM ARIZONA TO BE PLACED ON LARGE GOAT FARM NEAR BELLINGHAM.



GOATS GOING NORTH

Cypress Island, in Sound, to Be Home of Arizona Herd.

LAND OF GRASS LOOKS GOOD

When Animals Leave Cars at Union Stock Yards They Take One

Look Around and Fall to Feeding With Delight.

A comparatively new industry in the Northwest will be launched this week by Portland capital at Bellingham, Wash., when the final formation of the Cypress Island Goat Company will be completed.

Dr. J. W. Morrow, a Portland physician, is at the head of the company. His partners are Dr. H. D. Parker, of Arizona, and J. Z. Nelson, of Bellingham.

Dr. Parker arrived from Arizona and other Southwestern points yesterday morning and brought with him a herd of 200 blooded goats. The entire herd will be taken to the company's island today.

Island Comprises 6000 Acres.
The company's ranch is located on an island in Puget Sound out from Bellingham, and comprises 6000 acres. It is the intention of the company to breed thoroughbred goats for milking purposes, and it is stated that the island is far more than the production.

Dr. Parker stated yesterday that, while the industry has thrived in other parts of the United States, it has never been attempted on a large scale on the Pacific Coast.

Milk 25 Cents a Quart.
The average production of milk per head is three quarts a day. The present price for the milk is 25 cents a quart. Dr. Parker said that the animals propagate at the rate of 150 per cent a year. Eight months of the year the herd will produce milk.

Dr. Parker is considered an expert in the raising of these animals, and for the past 25 years has been engaged in the work in Arizona. He said yesterday that conditions in the south, and especially in Mexico at the present time, were such that the large goat raisers were making every effort to sell their herds.

On the Mexican border he was offered the highest-grade animals at a low price, but was told by the authorities that it would be impossible for him to get the animals out of the country without paying for them several times, it being a habit of the Mexican bandits to claim the animals and accuse the possessor of stealing them, at the same time demanding a high price before turning them loose.

Mexicans Charged With Murder.
According to Dr. Parker, many Americans have lost their lives in Mexico in trying to bring their herds across the line. The natives accuse them of theft and hang the owners, after which they would steal the herds.

The company will bend every effort during the coming year to increase the herd with more blooded stock and it will be feeding 500 animals. The present herd consists of Grade Toggenburg, Sannans and Nubians. The Sannans originate from the valley of Sannan, in Switzerland, and are known to be the best producers of milk over any other animal of their kind. In the herd brought from Arizona by Dr. Parker is a Sannan buck, called the original "Doc Yak." The animal weighs 352 pounds and is said to be the best of his breed in the United States.

Goats Know "God's Country."
Dr. Parker was en route from Arizona since July 25 and experienced much trouble in getting feed for the herd. The heat was intense, no rain having fallen in that part of Arizona for the past 12 months.

"When the goats were taken from the car this morning, I could not help but notice the change that seemed to come over them," said Dr. Parker yesterday. "They took one look around and started eating everything that was in sight. Most of them have had nothing to eat during the past year but what they could find on the barren hills in Arizona." That part of the country may be all right for some things, but even the goats know when they are in God's country.

FOUR KILLED IN WRECK

Milwaukee Passenger Trains Meet Head On Near Milwaukee.

MILWAUKEE, Aug. 5.—Two engine-men and two unidentified men were killed in a head-on collision between two passenger trains on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad here tonight. One of the unidentified dead was a U. S. Army uniform. One woman was thrown from a coach window. She is believed to have been the only passenger hurt, although all were badly shaken up.

Y. M. C. A. HUT OPEN

Billy Sunday Speaker at Vancouver Dedication.

TEARS AND CHEERS DRAWN

Noted Evangelist Declares Kaiser Cannot Insult Our Flag and

2000 Hear Address—Secretary Offers Building for Use.

VANCOUVER BARRACKS, Wash., Aug. 5.—(Special).—"Say, boys—slut till the gong sounds; keep dealing cards as long as the game lasts; a knockout in the last round is as good as in the first, and four aces are good at any stage of the game," said Rev. William Sunday, noted evangelist, here at 4 o'clock today to 2000 soldiers and civilians at the dedication of the Young Men's Christian Association war hut, the first such building to be dedicated on the Pacific Coast.

The programme began in front of the building, under the shade of the tall fir trees, with a soldier in uniform leading a chorus in singing "When the Roll Is Called Yonder." And a solo by Mrs. W. E. Wright, W. W. Dillon, secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association in the post, said as an introduction that it was not necessary for any soldier to take out a membership in the organization—the building being for the use of all, and an invitation was extended to them to make the greatest use possible of the facilities.

Sallies Provoke Laughs.
Mr. Sunday spoke for nearly an hour, and he had his large audience laughing at large part of the time. He began by telling "that no gang on the Pacific Coast had enough drag with him to get him to leave his ranch at Hood River except the soldier boys."

With a fusillade of slang, humorous stories and earnest pleas, Mr. Sunday kept the interest of the crowd, drawing laughter, cheers and tears in quick succession.

"When you guys think about a sky pilot you draw a mental picture of a tall fellow in a long black coat, with a tombstone under one arm and a Bible under the other—but that's not the kind of fellows they are. It takes a strong man to be a Christian and stand up for what he knows is right in spite of the devil," he declared.

Emperor Called Liar.
"Bill Hohenzollern is a liar, and he can't split on our flag all these days. If it wasn't for the British fleet New York would be a rum, Boston and many of the Atlantic Coast cities would be destroyed, but we are going to win. We did not start this war, but by the grace of God, we're going to finish it," he said.

His prayer ended with "Amen, amen. God bless you and good-by."

Mrs. Sunday spoke a few minutes after Mr. Sunday, telling of the part her father took in previous wars.

LABOR PROBLEM SEEN

RUDOLPH SPRECKLES URGES AFTER-WAR PREPAREDNESS.

Reconstruction Work Will Not Absorb Millions Now Engaged in War, San Francisco Banker Contends.

"America today is just as unprepared for peace as she was unprepared for war. If peace were to come tomorrow the conditions which would ensue would undoubtedly engulf this country and the system of capital and labor into such chaos the unending would be one of the most painful and troublesome periods we have ever had."

This theory is advanced by Rudolph Spreckles, of San Francisco, banker and a student of the relations of capital and labor, who is in Portland on a tour of the Northwest. He is accompanied by his son, Howard, and Cyril McNeer. Mr. Spreckles financed San Francisco's famous graft prosecution.

"This Nation today should be preparing for the days after the war just as zealously as it is preparing for its part in the war. The chief problem will be that of unemployment. Men acquainted with conditions know that reconstruction activities will not absorb the millions now engaged in war. "Workers today are getting big wages. Will they be able or willing to go back to the wages that peace operations can pay?"

"Many of these men have been led into extravagant ways and it is doubtful if they have saved enough to carry them over even a short period of readjustment."

AMERICANS GET GAS MASK
Soldiers to Be Put Through Lethal Chamber While Training.

AMERICAN TRAINING CAMP IN FRANCE, Aug. 5.—The American soldiers have received gas masks and steel shrapnel helmets, the former being French pattern and the latter British. During the week all the men will be put through a lethal gas chamber, after being given drills in rapid adjustment of the fearsome-looking headgear. Home-made bread will be supplied tomorrow for the first time, field bakeries having at last begun working.

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GOMPER'S EXPLAINS VIEW
Working People Aid Own Nations. Making Conference Useless.
NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, issued a statement here today amplifying his reasons for opposition to the proposed international Socialist conference at Stockholm. "The working people of the United States," he said, "are now doing everything within their power to help their country in its war against imperialism and autocracy. The working people of England and France are doing the same for their own countries. The working people of Germany are doing all they possibly can to help Germany and her Kaiser with the war. If Germany does not win, as she will not win, it will be due to no fault of the German working people. It is therefore, in my judgment, impracticable and positively injurious for any conference of representatives of labor to take place in which the representatives of all the countries would be present."
