

CANADIANS MOVE LINE UP 200 YARDS

French Make Progress in Region Northwest of Bixchoote in Flanders.

HEAVY ATTACKS REPULSED

Rain Clouds Disappear and German Airplanes Become Active. Religious Services Are Held in Field.

BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE AND BELGIUM, Aug. 5.—The Germans at 5 o'clock this morning launched a heavy attack against Hollebeke and the British line just north of Ypres-Comines canal in an attempt to regain these important positions, which they lost in the opening day of the battle in Flanders. The latest reports concerning the fighting indicate that the British are holding out strongly against the onslaught.

This attack with the advance of the Canadians along 1000 yards front before Lens, which took them into the environs of the town, are the outstanding features of the most recent activity along the British front.

In the operations at Lens last night the Canadians pushed forward to a depth of about 200 yards to a line between the Lens-Grenay railway and the Cite Du Moulin, directly south, and since have consolidated their positions among the buildings.

Sun Shines Again.
The deluge of rain which had lasted since Tuesday evening ceased during the night, and by noon the sun was shining brightly, making observation work and the movement of troops much easier.

The attack on Hollebeke and Viry was preceded by a tremendous artillery fire from the enemy's batteries. The Germans began to shell Battle Wood and the canal zone just north of Hollebeke last evening, and continued a concentrated fire throughout the night. The British guns replied vigorously, and at times the duel assumed the intensity of drum fire. It shook the country for miles about and sent great waves of deafening thunder rolling far back of the British lines under the confining cover of the low-hanging, water-laden clouds.

The British coup which resulted in the further tightening of the lines about Lens was carried out with only slight opposition from the enemy. The Canadians advanced in parties toward their objectives among the houses in the outskirts of the town.

No Counter Attacks Made.
Some resistance was encountered from machine guns concealed in buildings, but the Canadians advanced steadily until they had acquired the entire line sought. Here they installed themselves in buildings and cellars suitable for defense and set up machine guns. No counter attacks followed from the Germans, and the Canadians continued consolidation until this morning, when they had linked up the whole line with barbed wire and were prepared to meet any enemy advance.

The German artillery was active along most of the front last night, shelling the forward areas newly occupied by the allied troops. There also was considerable shelling of the back areas with gas shells. Witches and the section south of Messines especially being selected for this work of hate.

German Airplanes Active.
The British continued to make progress on the left flank and pushed their posts forward to the east side of the Steenbeke River along a front of approximately a mile, beginning in the neighborhood of Tulle, and running northwest. The ground in this section has been among the most hotly contested places in the zone of the new offensive.

North of Bixchoote the French, too, made further progress under heavy fire from the enemy guns, which were pounding the French positions steadily since the first day of the push.

The lifting of the clouds brought large numbers of German airplanes, which were very active last night at low altitudes over the British lines.

Special religious services on the occasion of the beginning of the fourth year of the war were held today throughout the British army camps. Wherever possible large bodies of troops and officers gathered to give thanks and reconsecrate themselves to the task they have undertaken. In one place 15,000 soldiers collected for the open-air services.

The Germans worked up a heavy bombardment of the entente lines last night in the Hollebeke region. Only raiding operations are reported from other sections of the front.

PARIS, Aug. 5.—Early today a heavy attack was made by the Germans on the French front to the south of Juvincourt, northwest of Rheims. The French line was preserved intact, the Germans being ejected from the single trench element which they had succeeded in entering, the War Office reports.

The artillery activity in Belgium is described as intermittent. It was somewhat more violent at points in the Verdun region. Minor attacks on the Casemate plateau, on the Aisne front, were readily warded off.

BERLIN, via London, Aug. 5.—There was no infantry activity on the Flanders front yesterday, army headquarters announced today. The weather in the Aisne region and in the Champagne was unfavorable for operations and only one action was reported, nearly 100 prisoners being taken in a raid on the French lines near Juvincourt.

SOLDIER IMPALED ON POLE
Motorcyclist Collides With Wagon of Mexican Wood Hauler.

EL PASO, Aug. 5.—Edward Taylor, of a motorcycle machine gun company, was almost instantly killed today when he was impaled on a pole.

"I appeal to you to remember the girls and babies during this canning season, and put up a little extra to ship to the Louise Home and the Albertina Kerr Nursery Home, where we are caring for abandoned mothers and babies, and we assure you that whatever you can do in their behalf will be greatly appreciated.

"Why not form a club in your town and ship a barrel of canned fruit or canned vegetables at Thanksgiving?"

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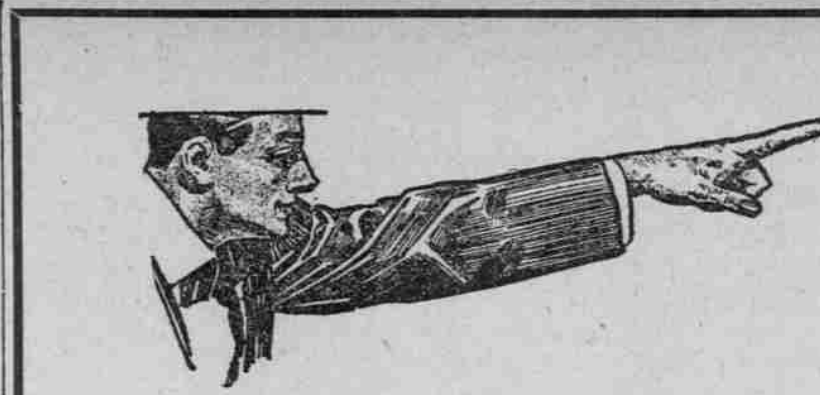
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AVIATORS ARE INTERNED

NEW PAPER SPARKLING

NEWSPAPER MEN OF OREGON HAVE OWN PUBLICATION.

24-Page Periodical Put Out by Department of Journalism Devoted Solely to Men of Craft.

It is published by the University of Oregon department of journalism and limits its field strictly to subjects of interest to the profession.

The second number has just made its appearance. X-RAY LUNG TEST IS USED

NEW YORK DISCOVERS TUBERCULOSIS IN SOLDIERS.

Out of 600 Men, Passed by Ordinary Examinations, 22 Are Found Definitely Tubercular.

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 5.—One of the most advanced steps known to science for the detection of pulmonary tuberculosis among soldiers has been taken by New York state in a series of X-ray photographs of 1130 members of the Sixty-ninth Regiment, the object being to demonstrate the usefulness of this method as applied to large bodies of troops whose examinations for this disease must be necessarily thorough if the United States is to avoid the experience of the Canadian and French
