

MRS. DE SAULLES' FREEDOM IS AIM

Effort Will Be Made to Show Jail Confinement Would Injure Woman's Health.

OLD SUNSTROKE RECALLED

Charge That Husband Was Fortune Hunter Refuted by Friends of Family, Who Cite Offer to Provide Another Servant.

MINEOLA, L. I., Aug. 6.—Physicians late today examined Mrs. Bianca de Saulles at the request of her attorney, Henry A. Uterhardt, to determine if her health was being impaired by confinement in the Nassau County Jail here, where she is waiting action by the grand jury on the charge of killing her former husband John L. de Saulles. If the physicians' report, expected tomorrow, shows the woman's health to be endangered, Mr. Uterhardt said he would immediately go before the Supreme Court in Brooklyn in an endeavor to have her admitted to bail. He said he feared Mrs. de Saulles was near a physical breakdown.

Search Made for Child.
Meanwhile search is being made in Mrs. de Saulles' behalf for her little son, as her counsel believes her enforced separation from the boy is responsible for her extremely depressed and nervous condition.

Since the shooting the boy has apparently been sequestered, according to H. A. Uterhardt, Mrs. de Saulles' counsel, who intimated he knows where the child is.

A new angle in the defense plans for Mrs. de Saulles was revealed today by the woman's maid, who told of her mistress having suffered a sunstroke some years ago in Chile, which had affected her mind and memory. The extreme heat of last week, said the maid, seemed to have brought a recurrence of the trouble.

Mrs. de Saulles will not be without friends when she is called for trial. Relatives in Valparaiso, it was learned today, were not only ready to aid her in the forthcoming trial, but were planning to obtain permanent custody of her 14-year-old son, John Longer de Saulles, Jr.

It was because of Mrs. de Saulles' devotion to her son and also the fear that the husband she had divorced on the ground of infidelity was planning to keep the child from her that she killed him, according to her attorney.

Fortune-Hunting Charge Denied.

Following the statement given out by Henry A. Uterhardt, Mrs. de Saulles' lawyer, that Mrs. de Saulles was a fortune hunter, whose love cooled after he had used about half of his wife's fortune, G. Heckler, a cousin of the murdered man, today made public a copy of a recent letter which he said De Saulles had written his wife. The letter, which was dated June 30, speaks of the good the country life had done for the child and suggests that he be allowed to remain at the cottage Mr. de Saulles occupied. The letter also offered Mrs. de Saulles the use of a servant to take care of the child, should he remain at his father's home, and said that he would be ready to be taken away by his mother at the time appointed by the court.

When the case of Mrs. de Saulles is called for trial, according to statements of her attorney, Mr. de Saulles will be pictured as a man who had had his infidelities forgiven many times by his wife because of her devotion for the child. It was also learned the defense would attempt to show the murder was not premeditated, but that Mrs. de Saulles carried the revolver, a gift of her husband, for her own protection.

NEW WAR BOARD MEETS

Allies to Have Equal Advantages With U. S. in Buying Here.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—The new war industries board held its first conference with President Wilson today and took up in general the problems it must face in the purchase of war supplies for this Government and the allies. The President indicated his idea of the board's functions.

One of the points decided was that the allies of the United States should be given the same advantages in the purchases of war materials as this country enjoys. The board will meet again tomorrow to discuss its plans in greater detail.

Members of the board are Frank Scott, Bernard M. Baruch, Hugh Frayne, Robert S. Brookings, R. B. E. Pierce and Rear-Admiral Frank P. Fletcher. Secretary Daniels also attended the conference.

FIVE SHIPS' CREWS SAVED

German Submarine Captain Gives Men Time to Take Boats.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Aug. 6.—A steamer arriving here today reported that five crews of five vessels, all of which had been sunk by German submarines off St. Maria, Azores. The vessels sunk were: American four-masted schooner John Twoby, Norfolk, Va., to Algiers, Captain J. B. Moorehouse.

Norwegian steamer Allen, Captain John Lothe, from Philadelphia to Marseilles. Norwegian steamer Hansent, from Italy to Hampton Roads.

Newfoundland schooner Conqueror, St. John's, N. F., for Cadix. Norwegian steamer Sorland, Stockholm to France.

Captains and crews declared in each case vessels were stopped and boarded by the submarine captain, after which the men were put into lifeboats and given plenty of time. Mines or bombs were placed in the ships and exploded after all hands had left. Then the submarine towed the lifeboats toward shore and gave them the right direction before submerging. The men report that the submarine commander gave them every consideration and that no torpedoes were used in destroying their ships.

Wanted, One Perfectly Gentle Grizzly as Mascot.
Anyone Possessing Pet of Good Habits May Sell Same to California Artillery.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—The California Field Artillery, now organizing, wants a grizzly bear for a mascot. It detailed a man to catch or buy one, and he reported that the only grizzly bear he could find in California was the one on the state seal.

Officers of the Grizzlies gave out this statement today and supplemented it by asking that anyone who has an extra grizzly bear on hand will kindly communicate with them at San Francisco.

The bear scout reported that he could find plenty of other varieties of bear, but no grizzly. He is extending his search, the officers reported, into the wilds of the Northwest, but in the meantime if California can produce a home-grown grizzly, the soldiers prefer such a one to an imported specimen. The soldiers expect to go to France soon and want a mascot to accompany them.

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GRANT WOMEN PITCH HAY
Exodus of Men to War Forces Fair Sex Into Fields.

BAKER, Or., Aug. 6.—(Special.)—A shortage of men caused by the exodus to enter the war is forcing Grant County women into the hayfields. The women are driving rakes and bucks and some are even forced to help pitch hay.

A hay shortage is threatened in the Long Creek section and farmers are even cutting the growth in fence corners and other places where mowers cannot operate. Some are cutting rye grass to feed with what hay they have. The Baker County crop is coming up to that of last season, but sales are being made at \$15 and \$16 a ton in the stack.

GOATHAM HAS U-BOAT SCARE
Gate in Net at Harbor Entrance Closed for Few Hours.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—A report that a U-boat had been sighted near the trans-Atlantic lines off this port caused the War Department authorities to close the gate in the net protecting the harbor mouth here at 1 o'clock this morning. The gate was opened again at 6 A. M.

It developed that an inbound passenger steamship sighted what was believed to be the periscope of a submarine Saturday night. The steamship's gunners fired five shots at the object.

According to some of the passengers, the submarine was again sighted yesterday, 18 miles off shore.

AFRICANS KEPT SUPPLIED

Two Ships Operated by Germans to Carry Munitions.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—Two ships, supposedly operating from a base somewhere in the Dutch East Indies, have supplied the German armies in German East Africa with munitions, according to Carl Raymond Davis, manager of gold mines in Johannesburg, South Africa, who was here yesterday. One of these vessels returned to Java in a shell-riddled condition.

A sprinkling of British white troops, strengthening forces from India and 20,000 negro Askaris are conducting the campaign against the Germans in their East African possessions, said Davis.

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DETECTIVE'S SON DIES
Carroll Tichenor, Aged 7, Succumbs to Attack of Diabetes.

Carroll H. Tichenor, aged 7, son of C. H. Tichenor, detective in the Portland Police Bureau, died last Sunday of diabetes. He is survived by his parents, a brother, aged 4, and a baby sister. The lad was well known at police headquarters, and his death cast a gloom over the station last night.

Funeral services will be held at Lerch's chapel at 2 P. M. today. The boy died at his home, 314 Bryant street.

ARMY NEEDS ONLY 4500

1400 Enlisted in Two Days and Total Is 179,350 Since April 1.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Less than 5000 men are needed to complete the quota of all the states for the regular Army.

Recruits accepted Saturday and Sunday numbered 1400. The total since April 1 is 179,350, leaving 4548 to be enlisted.
