

FANT WELCOME GIVEN MINISTERS

German Press Not Greatly
Pleased by New Men
Called to Cabinet.

MICHAELIS HELD WEAK

"Making of History Appears to Be
Sole Privilege of Army," Says
Tageblatt—Other Comment
Is of Similar Strain.

BERLIN, via London, Aug. 7.—Germany's press is decidedly lukewarm today in its welcome to the new occupants of the ministerial bench, and characterizes the 14 newcomers to executive and minor posts as a Cabinet constituted of officials whose appointment does not betoken a change in system.

"It cannot be denied that the events occurring in our internal politics lack historic dimensions, as compared with our present military achievements," says the Tageblatt.

"The great German nation, which is the only 'kultur' people in the world, exercises neither direct nor indirect influence in the selection of its servants."

"The present reorganization of the governmental personnel, which is of little moment as regards the internal development of the empire, shows Chancellor Michaelis for the present facing the question of democratization or parliamentarization with the same bewilderment as though he stood in the presence of some exotic sea-monster. With us the making of history appears to be the sole privilege of the army."

Time Not Ripe for Rebuilding.

The Lokai Anzeiger says: "If parliamentarization has assumed but modest proportions on this occasion, we can but welcome the circumstances, inasmuch as we do not deem it prudent to reconstitute one's dwelling at a time when a world of enemies is trying to break in. The selections prove that the emphasis has been placed not on principles, but on money, as is evidenced by the appointment of two chief magistrates and a Social Democrat."

The National Liberal Goerens Zeitung, in its comment, says: "Is the result which we are now permitted to contemplate that which we want, with us, many others have looked forward to? The question may promptly be answered in the negative. We have again a Simon Pure ministry of officials. Two parliamentarians, Dr. Spahn and Dr. von Krause, cannot be considered an evidence of a sincere desire for parliamentarization. While their appointments are a compliment to their parties, the fact remains that the widely heralded change in personnel is not wholly satisfying."

Selection National in Scope.

Official circles point out that the selection of the new men has been solely prompted by their personal qualifications, and that the roster of the newcomers shows that the government has reached out in every direction to obtain the best men available, the selection being national in scope.

The Zeitung Am Mittag gives the following view of the changes: "One will look vainly for a new method in this system of ministerial appointments. The new government does not even suggest a definite programme, and the only positive guarantee the newcomers offer is a pledge to carry out the terms of a pre-English current in German foreign policy, and further charges him with having delayed and then discredited the U-boat campaign."

RUSSIAN GAINS FEW

Germans Occupy Heights at
Molot After Battle.

TEUTONS HARVEST CROPS

Austro-German Troops Are Repulsed
Near Chotin and South of Grijmalov and Berlin Reports
Taking 1300 Prisoners.

PETROGRAD, Aug. 7.—In the direction of Kimpolinsk, in Bukovina, Austro-German forces, after a battle with the Russians, occupied the heights at Molot, says the official announcement issued today by the Russian War Department.

In the region of the River Bystritsa two Russian regiments voluntarily left their positions, causing the Russian troops to retire a few miles.

South of Grijmalov the Russians drove back the Teuton advanced posts. In the region west of the River Zbrocz on the Russian Galician frontier Austro-German troops, the statement adds, have hastily gathered the harvest.

KISHINEV, Russia, Aug. 7.—Austro-German troops between the Dniester and the Pruth, have been thrown back on the front 10 miles from Chotin, according to news from the battle area reaching here. Chotin is at the junction of the Zbrocz and Dniester rivers on the Galician-Russian frontier.

BERLIN, via London, Aug. 7.—Austro-German forces yesterday began an offensive against the Russo-Roumanian armies in Moldavia, on the Roumanian front. Russian positions north of Fokshani were stormed, according to the official statement issued today by the German General Staff, and 1300 prisoners were taken. Thirteen guns and numerous trench mortars also were captured.

PETROGRAD, Aug. 7.—Premier Kerensky has completed the formation of his new Cabinet. The official announcement of its composition contains several changes in the list of portfolios made public yesterday as follows:

Lieutenant Lebedeff is made acting Minister of Marine, a post held up to the present by Premier and Minister of War Kerensky.

M. Bernatzky is appointed acting Minister of Finance, a portfolio that has been assumed by M. Nekrasov in addition to the Vice-Premiership.

M. Yefremoff, Minister of Justice, is transferred to the Ministry of Public Affairs, replacing M. Astrov, the Mayor of Moscow.

Professor Kokoshkine, a leader of the Constitutional Democrats, is appointed State Controller, a position which had been given to F. A. Golovine.

M. Yureneff is named Minister of Public Works.

M. Yaroudny takes the office of Minister of Justice, vacated by M. Yefremoff.

M. Takhtamsheff, the Minister of Communications, is not mentioned in the new official list.

forced to descend, and with ringing orders the Captain formed them into lines at the point of his revolver. Now the masses rushed forward on foot were halted by the newly reforming army, the tatarish yielding to the

began entrenching on both sides of the road. Enemy airplanes were flying low overhead.

"Leaving the Captain in command there, I continued with a detachment of the Death's Head battalions, which had been sent with machine guns in motor-trucks to help check the panic. These were all brave, devoted men and they inspired new hope. We turned toward Tarnopol, where the panic was the worst and soon encountered thousands of tatarish trucks going to the rear, whereupon the Lieutenant commanding the handful of Death's Heads ordered the soldiers to halt and descend.

Name of Agitator Learned.

"Then he formed them into lines and said he would shoot each 15th man until they told who was the agitator that started the retreat. Before he had counted ten the 15th man called out the agitator's name.

"The Lieutenant, insisting upon receiving general confirmation of his act from the men themselves, ordered the agitator taken to the crossroad nearby and commanded the firing squad to shoot. He laid the body beside the road with a paper pinned on the breast reading:

"Shot as a traitor to Russia! Then the Lieutenant ordered the tatarish to turn back toward the battlefield and they obeyed.

Thin Line Holds Panic.

"There were similar scenes everywhere, the Death's Heads with Cosacks forming a thin, determined line behind the panicky tatarish."

"The Austro-German advance in Galicia was one of the easiest ever made, the distance between the retreating Russians and the advancing Teutons often being five to 10 miles. The retreat taught the futility of letting the soldiers have councils to discuss orders of their officers, but with all its disgraceful scenes the retreat was needed to prove the absurdity of these councils."

"Under the power of the Death's Heads and the Cosacks such meetings are now forbidden, these brave men controlling the masses in the army who do not know why they run."

RULE IS IN DOUBT

Struggle Expected Between
Kuehlmann and Helfferich.

CATHOLICS WIN 3 PLACES

Radicals and Socialists of Germany
Displeased at Reichstag Being
Ignored and Opposition
Has Grievance, Too.

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 7.—Will Dr. von Kuehlmann or Dr. Karl Helfferich, vice-Chancellor, be the real director of foreign policy under the administration of Dr. Michaelis, the Imperial German Chancellor? This is the political problem of the hour in connection with the shake-up of the Cabinets in Germany.

It is known the versatile Dr. Helfferich desires to have a hand in steering Germany's new course in world politics after the war, and it is rumored that the new Chancellor, unacquainted as he is with international affairs, desires to retain the ex-bank director (Dr. Helfferich) as his special adviser and mouthpiece, particularly for this field.

In fact, one of the avowed reasons for Dr. Helfferich's retention, despite his present unpopularity, in the Reichstag was that his services are indispensable in peace negotiations. The Berlin Tageblatt, the Lokai Anzeiger and the Vossische Zeitung all refer to the possibility of a conflict, as Dr. von Kuehlmann, it is understood, is disin-

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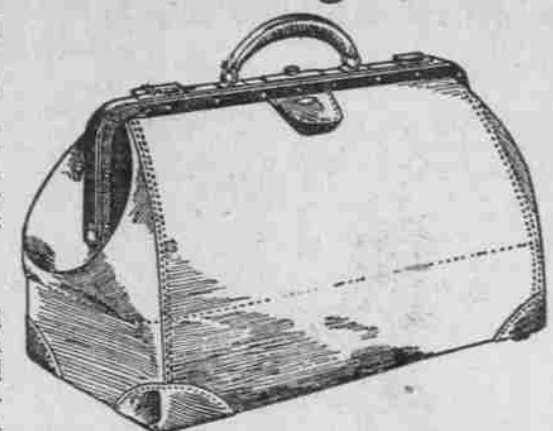
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clined to permit himself to be relegated to a subordinate place.

A second feature of the shake-up is the consideration shown the Catholic Center party, whose demand for representation in the Imperial and Prussian Cabinets for the Roman Catholic population was recognized by the appointment of three Roman Catholics, Spahn, Waldow and Kuehlmann. With a revocation of the anti-Jesuit and Polish expropriation laws, also part of the Centrist programme, that party is considered to have done very well as a result of the parliamentary crisis.

While the radical and Socialist press is dissatisfied at the absence of any marked concession to Parliamentarism in the new Cabinets and at the failure to consult the Reichstag in any way on the appointments, newspapers of the opposite camp are aggrieved at the shelving of Dr. Bessler, Prussian Minister of Justice; Count Loebell, Prussian Minister of the Interior; Baron von Schorlemer, Prussian Minister of Agriculture, and other standpatters on Prussian franchise reform.

RANK WILL BE ACCORDED

Honors Promised Red Cross and Y.
M. C. A. Workers at Front.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Officials of the Red Cross and probably those of

the Young Men's Christian Association serving with the American Army in Europe will wear the American uniform.

Henry P. Davison, chairman of the Red Cross War Council, and William H. Taft, chairman of the central committee, will be recognized as Major-Generals should they cross the Atlantic. Lesser rank will be conferred upon lesser officials. Members of Mr. Davison's committee and Mr. Taft's committee will be given rank of Brigadier-Generals.

ARMY IN FRANCE TO VOTE

Plan Used on Mexican Border to Be
Applied Again for Soldiers.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—American citizens in France as members of the expeditionary forces will be privileged to vote at the Fall elections, provided their respective states establish the necessary overseas voting machinery.

Provost Marshal-General Crowder, in a ruling on the subject, holds that there is no bar to any citizen's participation in any election because of his absence from home while on duty with the troops, following the process used on the Mexican border last year, soldiers at National Guard mobilization

Land Grant Being Surveyed.

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 7.—(Special.)—Practically 100 men will soon be encamped in various parts of Linn County surveying and classifying the lands of the old Oregon & California Railroad land grant. The work is being done for the Government under the direction of L. L. Sharpe, of the General Land Office. Mr. Sharpe is establishing headquarters and the base of supply in Albany.

8994 Examined in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—Reports of 47 of the \$6 draft exemption boards in Chicago showed that 8994 registrants had been examined up to today, of whom 6588 were regarded as physically fit. In the 47 districts 4507 registrants have made exemption claims.

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
