STRAND PLAY POWERFUL

"GOD'S LAW" BRINGS MANY TEARS FROM AUDIENCE. Patriotic, Classic and Comic Song Feature Vaudeville Numbers Which Are Encored Repeatedly.

One cinema-drama that has powerful leverage on American thought is "God's Law," written and produced by Lois Weber, whose every contribution to the silent stage has been notable for the high plane of thought and vividness of visualization. "God's Law" opened yesterday at the Strand Theatre.

It is a brief against capital punishment and against the Middle Ages barbarity of the "third degree." Its indignation is directed against the web of monstrous injustice, nears the electric chair. There are scenes and terror in its tragedy. The Bridwell Sisters are winsome maids of winking costume and charming song. In black lace picture hats and black lace bodices and white they sing some very tender songs. And the one with the dark curls avers that she is happy for her "brother" and sister of the lighter locks is just as tenderly certain that her joys arise from captivity. They have a song in Red Cross costume, a patriotic number, that is echoed with long applause.

In black and cardinal is Marie, when first she appears in classic dances. Then she is Grecian, a robed maiden dancing at dawn before the temple, with the birds tuning in a prelude. And at the last, like a pictured poem on papyrus, Marie is a dancing girl of ancient Egypt, such as trod before the "blue-eyed sorceress of the Nile."

Howard Hough, sweet singer, is lovely and serene, and her progress is a rapture of delight. But the Southern mammy's lullaby and that rollicking song of service, "Godby Broadway," the favorite of her eager listeners. In songs and dances none excel the three-delightful partners, Lloyd and Behan. And there is keen drama and comedy in their talking act, when the girl meets the importunate insurance agent while the rag-time grand opera is a confident success, and the patriotic song number, "What Kind of an American Are You?" brings responsive cheering.

The Tivoli Trio have conceived a simple and effective setting for their opening song and instrumental number. It is nothing more than the gifted three in a quiet parlor at evening, and they sing, "Just a Song at Twilight," their singing and instrumental number of the night are of a later vintage, altogether new and novel and classic.

BOULEVARD TO BE PAVED

County Will Take Over Terwilliger Part of Capital Highway. A public hearing to determine whether it is proper for the city to open Terwilliger boulevard to commercial traffic will be held on Friday of next month by the City Council.

Mayor Baker explained that the county is willing to take over the road, provided commercial traffic may use it. The county will pave the north half of the boulevard between Portland and Salem. The city has no money with which to pave and the county has ample funds. The cost will be about \$25,000. Under the contract with the donors of the property the paving must be completed within the next year and a half.
