

FOOD BILLS READY FOR WILSON'S NAME

Senate Approves Conference
Report by Vote of 66 to
7, Late in Day.

LAWS EFFECTIVE FRIDAY

Opposition in Senate Delays Action
for Weeks — Prohibition Sec-
tions Chief Causes of Ex-
tended Debates.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The Food bill passed through the last stage of legislative enactment at 4 o'clock this afternoon, when it was finally adopted by the Senate in form previously approved by the House. President Wilson's signature will make it law.

The vote was 66 to 7. Those voting against the conference report were: Democrats—Hardwick, Hollis and Reed. Republicans—France, Gronna, La Follette and Penrose.

Immediately after the final vote on the control bill, the Senate by a viva voce vote also approved the conference report on the first Administration food bill, providing for a food survey and appropriating funds to stimulate production.

President to Sign Friday.

Both bills are to become laws on Friday with President Wilson's approval. Senate and House leaders tonight made plans to that end, the delay being caused by adjournment of the House until Friday and necessity for the signing of the bills in open session by the presiding officers of both houses. The Senate recessed tonight until Friday, so that after Speaker Clark signs the bills on reconvening of the House, they may then be signed by the Senate's presiding officer and immediately sent to the White House.

Prompt appointment of Herbert Hoover as food administrator and immediate operation under the legislation is expected to follow.

Prohibition Features Included.

In addition to its comprehensive provisions for control of food, fuel, fertilizer and farm equipment, the control bill carries drastic prohibition features. Thirty days after it is approved it will be unlawful to use foodstuffs in the manufacture of distilled beverages or to import distilled spirits for beverage purposes; and the President will be empowered to commandeer for military purposes distilled liquors now held in bond and to regulate or restrict the use of foods in the manufacture of wine and beer.

The final vote in the Senate was obtained by unanimous agreement to dispose of the bill late today, and after four days' discussion of the conference report. In addition to the seven Senators voting against the bill Senator Gore, chairman of the Senate agriculture committee, and Senator Sherman, Republican, were paired and did not vote. Both announced that they had been at liberty to vote they would have been registered in the negative.

No Delays Interposed.

Of the absent and paired Senators announcement of the bill in effect virtually all that they favored the final draft.

Contrary to expectations, no motion to reconsider the bill with instructions or other parliamentary objections were offered before the vote.

The Senate's action virtually concludes the work of Congress on the Administration food legislative programme initiated last May. It puts into the President's hands for personal use or delegation, the most unusual and comprehensive powers, and according to many members of Congress, marks the innovation of National socialistic experiment.

Consummation of the programme followed the most bitter opposition and acrimonious debate in many years, centered in the Senate, after the President had prevailed upon Congress to lay aside virtually all work and urged conclusion of the legislation by July 1 to deal with this year's crops.

Senate Considers Bill for Week.

The conference report on the food bill had been before the Senate since last Saturday and the bill itself since June 16. The House passed the measure June 23, 365 to 5, after a week's debate.

Opposition led by Senator Reed and others and the fight over the prohibition provisions delayed the Senate vote. It took 61 to 6, until July 21. Further conferences regarding a week during which the President caused elimination of Senate amendments for a food board of three members and a Congressional committee to supervise war expenditures.

The first food measure for a survey and stimulation of production also was contested sharply in the Senate. It was passed on May 28 by the House and on June 2 by the Senate. It then was held in conference to await the Senate's action on the measure.

FOE PAROLED TO PORTLANDER

Albert J. Capron Gained Release,
but Afterwards Starts Hunt.

Louis Hollweg Bettenhausen was paroled from Alcatraz prison January 31, 1917, to Albert J. Capron, 701 Tillamook street, Portland, a building material contractor and former paymaster of the Oregon Naval Militia. Mr. Capron is interested in the "big-brother" movement for prisoners.

Mr. Capron's interest in Bettenhausen was solicited by the latter, who, during his 15 months' sentence in Alcatraz, had won the coveted position of handling the mail and opening it. He learned of Mr. Capron's interest in prisoners that way and personally wrote to him.

When Bettenhausen arrived Mr. Capron obtained for him a position in the Peninsula Iron Works and arranged for board and lodgings at the home of Mrs. John Simond, 1176 Albina avenue. When his period of parole was almost up he suddenly disappeared and was not heard of until arrested in Seattle.

When Mr. Capron learned of Bettenhausen's breaking his parole he went before William Bryon, special agent of the Department of Justice in Oregon and explained the case. He was much worried, for the reason that it was known Bettenhausen was a native of Germany.

Mr. Capron adjusted a number of

small bills which Bettenhausen left in Portland, including one for his board. It has been learned that once prior to his disappearance, he had surreptitiously gone to Seattle, which in itself was breaking his parole.

Bettenhausen enlisted in the Nineteenth Company, Coast Artillery, December 26, 1915. He gave his residence at 1256 Franklin avenue, St. Louis, Mo., and in case of death or accident asked that Adolph Reif, Thinsville, Wis., be notified. He gave his birthplace as Kallispel, Mont., which was later disproved in the perjury trial which sent him to Alcatraz, after he had been acquitted of the charge of taking books and records from Fort Corcoran, Philippine Islands, whither he had been sent after enlistment.

In connection with this trial, which was conducted in the Federal court, papers of which he had been accused of stealing suddenly and mysteriously reappeared just as the trial got under way. It was when he perjured himself at this trial, however, that he was convicted of that charge and sent to the prison. At the trial it was proved he was a native of Germany and he was sentenced to 18 months' imprisonment.

While at Alcatraz Bettenhausen struck up acquaintanceship with a Dutch chaplain and worked himself into the good graces of the authorities to the extent that he was allowed to handle the mail.

When Bettenhausen enlisted he gave his age as 23 years.

FRAUD AND THEFT CHARGED

Officers of County on Hunt for Soldier Who Disappeared.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—Authorities at Alcatraz barracks here, where Bettenhausen was confined, tonight said he had been sentenced to 18 months in 1914 on charges of disobedience of orders, embezzlement and fraud. He was released on parole October 4, 1916, and his parole was suspended February 6. Since then, Federal officers all over the country have been seeking him.

He was originally sentenced, said prison authorities, from a unit in the Philippine Islands.

TWO WALK OUT OF PEN

"RED" BURNS AND "SHORTY" BURG
GO BY MAIN GATE.

Hole Is Sawed Through Roof and Rope Missed Week Ago Takes Men in Safety to Ground.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 8.—(Special.)—By sawing a hole through the roof of the State Penitentiary, dropping by a rope down the front wall of the building and climbing out, the two men escaped about 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning. Robert Burns and J. B. Burg, both serving from two to 20 years for forgery, effected their escape and have not been captured.

The alarm was given five minutes after the men left the gates. Burns was sent up from Multnomah County September 19, 1914, and Burg from Wasco County February 21, 1916.

Burns and Burg were employed in the shoe shop on the top floor of the building. In cutting through the roof the men used a piece of saw tempered for cutting metal. Where they obtained the saw is not known by the officials. The rope by which they swung to the ground was missed by the guards a week ago.

Several poses are looking for the convicts, one of them led by Warden Murphy. The men are believed to have gone toward Turner. Both men have previous prison records.

Sheriff Hurlburt yesterday received a telephone message to be on the look-out for "Red" Burns and "Shorty" Burg.

DRAFT RESISTER'S ARREST IS HISSED

Conference for Democracy
and Terms of Peace Is
Scene of Serving Writ.

WOMEN INVOLVED IN PLOT

San Francisco Attorney Charged
With Circulating Among Eligi-
bles Documents Denying
Right to Draft Men.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—Before an audience composed of members and friends of the "People's Council of America," a pacifist organization, gathered in the Golden Gate Commandery auditorium here, Attorney Daniel O'Connell was placed under arrest on a charge of conspiring to ob-

When served with the warrant of arrest by Deputy United States Marshal George Barnham, O'Connell read it to the gathering, which cheered him lustily. When the cheering had subsided United States Senator John D. Works, who was among the speakers on the platform, arose from his place and declared:

Pacifists File Protests.

"This arrest is a disgrace to the American people and is done for the purpose of intimidating thinking people."

David Starr Jordan and other prominent pacifists were present at the meeting. Dr. Jordan was not heard from, but Mrs. Alice Park, who was a member of the Ford peace party, Thomas Gray and others prominent in the work of the "People's Council" denounced the arrest of O'Connell before the meeting.

Fourteen others were named with O'Connell on the warrant, three of them being Christopher McCollough, Carl Wacker and A. D. Crown. The authorities would not make known the names of the others on the warrant.

DOED FIXED AT \$10,000.

O'Connell was taken before United States Commissioner Francis Krull and his bonds were fixed at \$10,000. His sureties were his wife, Mrs. Anna M. O'Connell, Dr. John A. Miller, of San Francisco, and Mrs. L. H. Coggin, of Berkeley. O'Connell attempted to have these sureties confined to Mrs. O'Connell and Dr. Miller, but was overruled on this point. As soon as the sureties were sworn the date for the Commissioner's hearing was set for Wednesday, August 15, and O'Connell was allowed to go.

"The battle is on and it will be a fight to a finish," declared O'Connell when the Commissioner's hearing was ended. "We do not fear the outcome in the slightest degree. We have every confidence of a complete victory on all points. We desire a speedy trial and a speedy verdict. Our case is complete."

More than 200 persons attending a meeting of the American Conference for Democracy and Terms of Peace hissed the Deputy United States Marshal, who made the arrest.

The arrest of O'Connell follows the receipt of a letter from former United States District Attorney John L. McNab by United States District Attorney Preston, calling attention to the circulation among draft eligibles of documents which denied the Constitutional right of the Government to draft men for military service.

CHARGES NOT PUBLIC.

The complaint against O'Connell and the others was prepared by Assistant United States District Attorney Mrs. Annette A. Adams, and sworn to by United States Attorney John W. Preston. The complaint was not made public, but, according to Preston, it charges O'Connell and the other names with conspiring to obstruct the operation of the espionage act which provides for a thorough and uniform operation of the selective draft.

According to a statement made by Preston a few days ago, the lawyer had been in visiting arrest for some time. The three others whose names have been given out with O'Connell are already in custody. The Federal warrant was sworn against them because they were arrested by the San Francisco police and have not yet been turned over to the Government authorities.

WOMEN ARE ON LIST.

The arrest of the 11 not yet in custody was expected tonight or tomorrow. Several women were among those taken into the Federal toils, it was said.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 8.—Thirty-five Molokans, members of a Russian religious sect colonized at Glendale, were sentenced to one year in prison by Judge Sawtelle late this afternoon for failure to obey the President's proclamation requiring aliens to register under the selective draft law.

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Tacoma Grocer Arrested When
Moonlight Party Dies.

SMALL BOAT CAPSIZED

Suspect, Thought to Have Been Under Influence of Liquor, Is Declared to Have Tipped Craft Over When Shifting.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 8.—(Special.)—After preliminary investigation into the drowning of Mrs. A. E. Peterson and her 20-year-old son, Albert, and Miss Agnes Anderson, as a result of the capsizing of a rowboat in the Narrows at Day Island late last night, Tacoma police today took into custody John Blomquist, a grocer.

The women were drowned when a rowboat in which they were seated was capsized when Blomquist was trying to shove the craft away from his cruiser, the "Ethel." He lost his balance and in falling tipped the rowboat over. Witnesses of the accident informed the police that Blomquist at the time was under the influence of liquor.

The victims of the accident were members of a moonlight excursion arranged by a church society.

Utah Legislature to Be Called.

SALT LAKE, Aug. 8.—That a special session of the Utah legislature will be called to act on the high prices of coal was indicated today by Governor Bamberg, when he declared that, if neces-

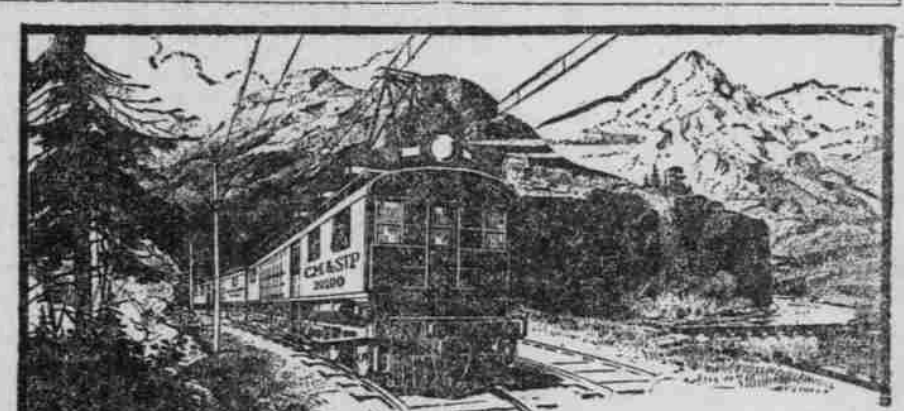
sary, he would urge the enactment of a measure to make coal a public utility.
