

COMMISSIONS WILL AWAIT GRADUATES

Many Not Appointed From
Training Camps to Be
on Reserve Lists.

SERVICE WILL BE FOR WAR

Fifty-Two From First Presidio
Camp Selected to Attend Second
Session—Twenty-Two of the
Guardsmen Commissioned.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Officers of the graduated class from training camps, the War Department announced last night, will be appointed to the officers' reserve corps where their age permits and they are otherwise satisfactory.

Such officers will be detailed for service with the regular Army or National Army during the war and at the conclusion of hostilities will go on the inactive list, subject to call in later emergencies.

Service Is for War.
Officers appointed directly from the training camps to the National Army will be mustered out at the end of the war.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.—Fifty-two men who attended the first camp of the Officers' Reserve Training Corps at the Presidio here were today selected to attend the second camp because they gave definite promise of becoming competent officers. These men will be authorized to attend the camps in addition to the regular state quotas heretofore announced.

13 ALTERNATES ARE NAMED

Four Portland Men Included in Possible Student Officer List.

Thirteen alternates for the Second Reserve Officers' training camp were named yesterday by the regular Army officers in charge of the selections.

These men will be called into the camp only in the event any of the principal selections are unable to go.

Oregon is entitled to 131 principals at the second camp, which opens on August 27. The men are to report August 24. The principals as well as the alternates were selected from more than 3000 applicants.

Captain L. L. Pendleton, at Vancouver Barracks, worked until late Thursday night preparing the lists of principals from the reports made by the Army examining boards at the Presidio. He canceled a social engagement so that the host of applicants might learn their fate on Thursday instead of being required to wait until yesterday.

Four of the 13 alternates are from Portland and the others from scattered parts of the state.

Claude M. Bristol, one of the Portland men, is City Hall reporter for the Journal. He recently graduated from the University of Oregon law department and successfully passed the bar examinations. He is fourth on the list.

F. E. Manning is an attorney and P. B. Corder is a carpenter.

Percy S. Brown, one of the principals named Thursday, already is a member of the hospital unit now at American Lake. It is probable that he will have the option of entering the officers' camp, however.

CHECK IS FOR \$96,111,111

J. P. Morgan & Co. Pay for Canadian Bond Issue.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—A check for \$96,111,111.11, the largest ever recorded in the New York Clearing-House, drawn by J. P. Morgan & Co. for the credit of the Minister of Finance and Receiver-General of Canada in settlement of the \$100,000,000 loan recently floated for the Dominion by a syndicate headed by the Morgan house, was paid here today by the Liberty National Bank.

O. A. C. IS "DISTINGUISHED"

War Department Gives College High Military Rating.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Aug. 10.—(Special.)—

The Oregon Agricultural College has been rated by the War Department as of "distinguished rank."

When the report of the inspection officer, Major C. B. Smith, of the U. S. Army, was received it was noted that he had recommended the institution for distinguished rank, but what action would be taken by the department was not even indicated until yesterday, when President W. J. Kerr received a telegram from Adjutant-General McCall tersely stating: "Institution under your charge rated as distinguished college for year 1917."

The recognition granted by the Government carries with it the right to name in 1917 the graduates for commissions as Second Lieutenants in the United States Army without further test than the required physical examinations. The list of 10 men with alternates has been tentatively made up, but, due to possible changes, will not be announced before the first of next week.

SPIES USING WIRELESS

MESSAGES RECEIVED READILY
THROUGH SPAIN SOURCES.

Rapid Service at Nominal Rate Delivers Information at German or Austrian Points.

CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—(Special.)—Herbert Corey, in a special cable from Madrid to the Daily News, says, in part, that "Germany's principal means of wireless communication with the United States is through Madrid. There can be no doubt that the army of spies which is active in the United States depends upon the great wireless station 20 kilometers outside of Madrid for the rapid exchange of news with Berlin."

"This station advertises that it accepts messages for delivery in Germany through the German wireless station at Nauem and messages for Austria-Hungary through the Austrian station at Pola. It is asserted that the communication is very rapid."

"Nor are the rates exorbitant. For 50 centimes—the equivalent to 10 cents in United States money—the station will deliver messages cost only 58 centimes a word. No one of the 30,000 Germans more or less actively engaged in espionage in the United States would complain at paying these prices."

"So far as is known here, the plan of the German spies in the United States is to send messages either directly to Spain by way of the constant steamer mails from New York, Cuba or Mexican ports, or to relay them through the wireless on the Canary Islands."

TOMATO TRUST CHARGED

FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION HAS
EVIDENCE OF CONSPIRACY.

Three Big Packing-Houses, It Is Said, Have Made Attempt to Corner Entire California Crop.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Evidence of a conspiracy among large packing interests to corner the entire tomato output of the Pacific Coast has been discovered, it was said today, at the offices of the Federal Trade Commission.

The commission's investigators in California reported today that three large packing concerns are involved—Armour & Co., Morris & Co. and Libby, McNeil & Libby. These companies, they declared, have conspired to purchase the entire California tomato crop from local canners and prices consequently are jumping.

Although at 25 cents a dozen local canners are assured of a good profit, the three packing companies, according to the trade committee, have sent the prices up to \$1.25 and higher. The retail prices, investigators report, also are taking an upward turn.

Trade commission officials are of the opinion that the California situation should not appreciably affect prices in other parts of the country, as the total California output is only one-twelfth of the entire country's pack.

REGULAR ARMY FILLED

WAR STRENGTH OF 300,000 MEN IS
COMPLETE.

Oregon and 22 Other States Fill Their
Quota With Volunteers; Recruiting
Is to Continue.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—With the war volunteers of yesterday the regular Army was raised to its full strength of 300,000. Since April 1 more than 152,338 volunteers have been enlisted. Twenty-two states filled their quotas and 25 did not.

The states in the roll of honor are: California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

Recruiting will continue, however, without any letup, as the War Department expects to receive a steady flow of volunteers into the reserve.

HEART IN WRONG PLACE

Bend Candidate Is Rejected by Examining Board for Defects.

BEND, Ore., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—Laurin H. Reifer was on the right side, but in the wrong place, Or. B. Ferrell, of Bend, declared today after examining Reifer for the draft. Reifer, who is from Redmond, Ore., had always believed his heart to be on the left side, until the misplacement was revealed in the examination. His rejection, however, was not other defects. The cardiac misplacement is most unusual.

Ten men were certified as qualified. To complete Deschutes County's quota of 37 the County Clerk was ordered to issue calls for 180 more to appear for examination beginning August 16. Twenty-one exemption claims are to be considered by the board.
