SMALLER PERCENTAGE CLAIM EXEMPTION FROM DRAFT.

Two Ministers of Gospel Are Among Registrants Offering Cause for Being Excused From Army.

Only one-half of the young men called up yesterday for examination before local exemption boards sought to evade war duty through claims of dependency and occupations. Out of 10 young men examined, five signified their willingness to serve in the new draft army, if successful in passing the required physical tests.

This is by far the best record of any day thus far in Multnomah County, and exemption officials believe it is due to the fact that the widest publicity is being given the proposed rulings of the local boards to the effect that all dependency claims must not only be genuine in every respect, but must likewise be imperative before exemptions will be granted.
