PENSION UP TODAY

Mayor Will Present Police Ordinance to Council.

Mayor Baker announced that he will
introduce his proposed ordinance, creat-
ing a police relief and pension fund,
at the session of the City Council this
morning. Whether or not it will be
passed is in doubt. It is probable that
the members of the Council will want
to have more time in which to study
it, unless the provisions for accident
and sick benefits are eliminated.

BUREAU CHANGES AWAIT

Creation of Fund to Care for Men
Retired on Half Pay Holds Up
Mr. Baker's Plans for Re-
organization of Force.

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ALL of the members of the Council
are favorable to the proposed pension
for the police at half pay for retire-
ment, but they question the wisdom of
attaching thereto at this time the pro-
visions for sick relief and accident ben-
efits. Commissioners Kellaher, Mann
and Barbur have expressed themselves
as favoring the assigning of those
features to the state under the com-
pensation act.

Mayor Baker, who had the ordinance
drafted for the chief purpose of en-
abling him and Chief of Police John-
son to work out their proposed re-
organization plans for the force, is
willing that the state shall have the
features named if it is feasible,
and has asked Chief Johnson to make
inquiry and report on the facts.

Whenever the Council passed an ordi-
nance creating a pension fund, the
Mayor and chief will proceed with their
reorganization plans by naming those
in the bureau who are to be retired
and making whatever other shifts they
deem necessary to the best efficiency
of the force. Much of the work of the
organization hangs upon the passage of
the pension feature.

SPROULE IS MENTIONED

SOUTHERN PACIFIC HEAD MAY GO
TO MILWAUKEE LINE.

President Earling Is Reported to Be
Stated for Chairmanship of Board
of Directors.

William Sproule, president of the
Southern Pacific, is considered as the
probable successor of A. J. Earling as
president of the Chicago, Milwaukee &
St. Paul road.
It is understood, it is to be-
come chairman of the board for the
Milwaukee system and several possi-
bilities are suggested as his successor
principal among them being Mr.
Sproule and H. E. Byram, operating
vice-president of the Burlington. The
Milwaukee directors will meet in New
York early next month and probably
make the selection.

Mr. Sproule has been president of the
Southern Pacific nearly six years, hav-
ing been president of Wells, Fargo &
Co. immediately before. His early ex-
perience, however, was in the traffic
department of the Southern Pacific,
whence he became traffic manager for
the smelter trust.

Should Mr. Sproule accept the Mil-
waukee presidency, the selection of his
own successor as head of the Southern
Pacific would be a subject of specula-
tion.

ILLEGIBLE SIGNATURES TO DOCUMENTS PROTESTED.
Health Officer Parrish Says Consider-
able Delay and Expense Is
Entailed.

AN ordinance requiring all physi-
cians handling papers which have
to be filed with the city to sign their
names in typewriting or in some other
printed form would be an excellent
thing, according to City Health Officer
Parrish.

"If we had such an ordinance," said
Dr. Parrish, "it would save a lot of the
time of our office staff. Being a physi-
cian, I realize how difficult it is to
write one's name so it may be de-
ciphered. I also understand that it is
regarded as an indication of superior
brain power to write an illegible name,
nobody can read my signature."

Frequently Mrs. Ruth Carter, chief
clerk in the office of Health, calls in
the entire office staff in an effort to
decipher some physician's name, writ-
ten in his own hand.

Y. M. C. A. SENDS \$12,000
Checks to Pay for Lumber for Camp
Buildings Received.

A \$12,000 check to pay for the lum-
ber supplies for Y. M. C. A. buildings
in the Northwest training camps was
received yesterday from the Y. M. C. A.
headquarters by J. B. Rhodes, sec-
retary in charge of the association
work in the six Pacific Coast States.
The check was signed by Lewis E.
Haas, auditor, and sent by F. A. Mc-
Carl, western secretary of the National
War council.

nearly completed.

MAN TWICE TRIES TO DIE
John Bretch Lies on Kings Heights
Car Tracks.

Twice in less than 12 hours, John
Bretch, aged 25, delayed traffic on
Kings Heights carline yesterday when
he lay on the track in front of an ap-
proaching car near the city limits, in
an attempt at suicide.

Bretch made the first attempt early
yesterday and it was necessary for
the train crew to pull him off the
track. He was taken to the police sta-
tion and turned over to Mrs. J. H.
Green, of 71 East Eleventh street.
About 9 o'clock yesterday he again
appeared on the heights at the same
place and it was again necessary
for the train crew to take him from
in front of the car. He was later taken
to the County Jail for examination as to
his sanity.

CITIZENSHIP PLEA DENIED
Farmer Grimshaw Too Busy to
Bother About Constitution.

American citizenship is not gauged
by a man's ability to procure three
square meals a day and his desire to
do about as he pleases.
This fact was imprinted indelibly
upon the mind of Miles Grimshaw,
farmer of Gresham, whose application
for citizenship papers was temporarily
refused by Circuit Judge Morrow after
Grimshaw had shown an apparent
difference as to whether he became a
citizen or not.

During his examination Grimshaw
showed a thorough lack of knowledge
of the United States Constitution.

When asked by the court why he had
not given more study he replied that
he was satisfied to get his three square
meals a day and didn't have time to
study such things as the American
Constitution.

Riddle Protests Elimination.
ROSEBURG, Or., Aug. 21.—(Special.)
—A meeting of citizens of Riddle was
held last night to protest against the
elimination of Riddle from the
proposed new Pacific Highway. Simon
Benson recently said the new road

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
