TRADE EXPERT TO VISIT

PORTLAND MERCHANTS TO MEET GOVERNMENT REPRESENTATIVE.

Problems With Reference to South American Commerce to Be Viewed by J. W. Sanger.

Portland manufacturers of export goods are to have opportunity to present their problems with reference to South American trade to one of the foremost advertising experts of the country, who has received a special commission to visit Latin-America in the name of the United States.

J. W. Sanger, representative to Central and South American nations, appointed under the supervision of the Department of Commerce, is touring the principal cities of the United States. He will arrive in Portland next Wednesday.

The tour of America's business centers is made to gain information relating to the various phases, present and prospective, of commerce with Latin-American countries. Having availed himself of this information, Mr. Sanger will introduce American advertising methods in the various countries of Latin-America, remaining at the disposal of the manufacturers, exporters and importers, to be advised as to the amount of export materials available now and in the future, and will, in addition, serve the Nation as a business ambassador and herald of increased trade relations.

Mr. Sanger will be in Portland under the auspices of the Portland Ad Club.

INSPECTORS TO FEEL AX

COMMISSIONER BARBUR TO LAY OFF SEVERAL MEN.

Three in Building and One Each in Electrical and Plumbing Departments May Go.

In continuance of his policy of cutting to the limit the forces in the various offices under his jurisdiction, Commissioner Barbur yesterday laid off several men in the Building Department, today will announce the names of inspectors of the bureau of buildings who will be laid off, effective September 1, and the names of the men who will be laid off by the electrical division, with a possibility of the plumbing division.

Commissioner Barbur held a conference yesterday with the Building Department Plumber, and together they decided that it will be possible to lay off three and perhaps four inspectors. It is probable that the names of the men to be laid off will be announced by the bureau of buildings and probably one from the electrical division, with a possibility of the plumbing division.

"There is not so much doing in the building lines at present as formerly," said Commissioner Barbur, "and it is necessary for me to reduce the force to the lowest possible operating minimum. He will be ready tomorrow to announce his decision as to who shall be laid off."

TWIN ROCKS IGNORED

LAND COMPANY SUES RAILROAD THAT PASSES BY TOWN.

Sale of Townsite Lots Declared to Be Injured by Alleged Failure to Maintain Agreement.

Some of the sorrows of the townsite promoter are revealed in a \$5000 damage suit filed yesterday by the Southern Pacific and the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company by the Twin Rocks Land Company. The plaintiff holder of something like 600 town lots in the new-born town of Twin Rocks, in Tillamook County.

The plaintiff company asserts that it platted the townsite with the agreement that the railroad from Hillsboro to Tillamook would establish a flag station at the townsite. As a result, the company declares it has failed to sell a large number of lots still on the market, while other lots have diminished in value. The agreement also contains a clause that the railroad would sell tickets to Twin Rocks, which it now refuses to do, it is alleged.

CIRCLE TOUR IS DEAR

Phil Norton, of Globe, Ariz., Engaged on Big Plan.

COAST STATES TO UNITE

Great Attractions of Western Sections Would Be Made to Furnish Entertainment and Instruction for Tourists Throughout Year.

A big circle tour of the whole West, Northwest and Southwest is the ambitious plan of Phil Norton, enterprising secretary of the Globe, Ariz., Chamber of Commerce, who is today in Portland, and is engaged in an effort to unite the tourist associations of all the Pacific Coast states.

Mr. Norton points out that the Eastern traveler should begin his sight-seeing expeditions by passing through the El Paso Gateway, the real entrance into the great Southwest. From there he should go to Phoenix, Ariz., to see the wonderful fields of Egyptian cotton, an industry in its infancy, which is supplying tough fiber for manufacture of automobile tires.

Roosevelt Dam to Be Feature.—Thence the tourist would go over the historic Apache trail to the famous Roosevelt dam, which forms the largest artificial lake in the world for irrigation. A modern hotel is being built whence tourists can set out for nearby fishing and hunting resorts.

Another interesting attraction will be the cliff dwellings, long the scene of scientists' explorations and proving the antiquity of civilization on the Western hemisphere.

Mr. Norton would, of course, have the tourist stop at Globe, where one of the largest copper mines in the world is in operation.

COLUMBIA HIGHWAY TO BE CLIMAX

The natural and artificial attractions of California would be next in order. Then the traveler would cross the great southern gateway, stopping at Klamath Falls, Crater Lake, Medford and the Josephine caves on the way to Portland and the Columbia Highway, the climax of his trip.

Mr. Norton's plan contemplates the tourist traveling the Northwest and passing the early Spring in the Southwest, starting northward with the approach of Summer.

Mr. Norton could be reversed, the tourist first visiting the Northwest and proceeding to California with the approach of Winter.

Mr. Norton conferred yesterday with Mark Woodruff, secretary of the tourist bureau of the Chamber of Commerce, and took a train for the Columbia River Highway, becoming more enthusiastic than ever.

NEW BOND VOTE POSSIBLE

Eastern Attorneys Disapprove of Tillamook Issue.

Tillamook County probably will re-submit to its voters the question of bonding itself for \$200,000 to build good roads.

Leading bond attorneys of Chicago and Boston have held the legal proceedings incident to the recent authorization of the County of Tillamook. Telegraphic opinions were received here yesterday from Wood & Oakley, Chicago attorneys, and from Storey, Thorndike, Palmer & Doe, of Boston, who have declared the proceedings invalid. In bond-buying circles the opinions of these firms are held as of great importance.

The Eastern attorneys did not say on what grounds the issue was held invalid, but their full reply, on the subject probably will come by mail.

Hazel Clark and Evelyn Stewart, who were arrested a short time later, were placed in the county jail. They were in yesterday, pending further investigation of their cases.

ONE-ARMED ORGANIZER FAILS TO REGISTER FOR DRAFT.

Wearer of American Flag on Coat Lapel Held to Be Ineligible to Membership in Order.

On June 5, it was found, Lihto had been in Tacoma, Wash., and was accordingly was telegraphed to that city, and Federal officers will take him back for trial on a charge of evading the draft.

PRAIRIE FIRE IS FOUGHT

Blaze Started by Boys Near Vancouver Gets Dangerous.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 23.—(Special.)—The Vancouver fire department put in a busy afternoon today fighting a fire which threatened to destroy a number of homes on the outskirts of Vancouver, along the Pacific Highway.

The fire, started more than a week ago by a group of boys, spread over a 20-acre tract of underbrush and, impelled by a strong wind, crossed the highway into North Coast Addition.

Several lines of hose were used in stopping the progress of the fire and in keeping it from jumping across the unimproved streets in that part of the city. The fire is still burning, but apparently is under control. All traffic on the Pacific Highway was held up for several hours due to the fire and smoke.
