

SMELTERS CLOSED BECAUSE OF STRIKE

15,000 Men Affected When
Union Radicals Reverse
Vote and Quit Work.

COPPER OUTPUT CUT OFF

Electricians Strike Because New
Demand, Following Signing of
Agreement With Their
Union, Is Rejected.

BUTTE, Aug. 24.—Following notice that the smelters at Anaconda had gone on strike, the mines of the Anaconda Copper Company in Butte are closed tonight for an indefinite period. The closing of the mines means the shutdown of the smelter of the company at Great Falls, as well as the big plant at Anaconda. It is estimated that 15,000 men are directly affected by the action of the company.

Practically no copper property in the Butte district is working. Independent copper producing properties which had been shipping their ore to Anaconda were compelled to shut down, owing to lack of smelter facilities. None of the mines of the district has facilities for storing ore.

Electricians employed at the Anaconda smelter went on strike at noon today after demands for an increase to \$6.50 a day had been refused by the company. The committee was told that the company had already entered into a contract with the metal trades, which include the electricians, and that it could not reopen a discussion of the wages, the scale having already been agreed to by the metal trades and the company.

More than 10,000 men were employed in mining operations around Butte and about 3000 tons of ore were being sent out daily, and it was held by the operators that the strike called by the metal mine workers' union last June had lost its effect. Troops have been patrolling streets used by miners who desired to follow their occupations and only minor trouble had resulted. The miners in Butte were paid on their last payday a minimum rate of \$5.25 for eight hours, with \$6 a day for men working in shafts. The smeltersmen at Great Falls were paid on their last payday a minimum rate of \$4.50 for eight hours. The Anaconda smeltersmen had not accepted the new scale.

Today's developments followed the action of radicals in the Mill and Smeltersmen's Union, who announced their intention on Wednesday night to break away from the union and go on strike.

This morning only 110 men reported at the Anaconda smelter for work. These were at once put to work taping the furnaces.

Shooting Begins at Camp.

"Corporal Wheatley, Corporal Brown, Corporal Moore, Corporal Snodgrass and Corporal Tillman and about 100 privates were in the crowd that had started toward town. I was in the crowd. They started shooting. Sergeant Henry was in front and he hollered to everybody to lay down. They all laid down but myself and two more fellows, and we ran down the side street. As we ran I heard shooting that sounded like all of them were shooting together. I tried to get back to the camp, but was afraid and stayed in the woods all night and was arrested this morning after daylight when I tried to get back to camp.

officer arrested a negro woman and in doing so I am informed, slapped her face. A soldier of the Twenty-fourth who had been drinking remonstrated with the patrolman for what he considered his unnecessary violence in striking her. The officer then began beating the soldier with his pistol.

"The man's face and head were badly cut by the pistol butt. He was arrested by the same officer and taken to the station where he is now held. "Thursday afternoon, according to reports made to me by Corporal Baltimore of my military police force, a soldier of my command was arrested by an officer, Corporal Baltimore, who was wearing his military police badge, asked the policeman purely for information, he says, why the man was arrested.

"The policeman told him it was none of his business. He then, Corporal Baltimore and the arrested soldier both state, hit Baltimore over the head with his pistol butt. Corporal Baltimore ran up the street, the policeman firing at him as he fled. He took refuge in a house under a bad net. The policeman followed, dragged him out, used further abusive language to him and struck him twice more with the pistol.

Killing of Captain Cruel.

"When the men in camp heard of these occurrences Thursday afternoon it excited them greatly and they made open threats of retaliation. "The revised list of dead totals 17 men. Included is a negro sergeant, Vida Henry, believed to have been the ringleader in the uprising. Henry's body was found, riddled with buckshot, about a quarter of a mile distant from the camp limits.

Honore Moody, one of the wounded police officers who suffered an amputation of the leg, died this morning. E. J. Meineke, another police officer, was found dead at 3 o'clock this morning. "The killing of Captain Joseph W. Matthes, of the Illinois Second Field Artillery, accompanied by extreme cruelty on the part of his slayers, according to early reports.

Wounded by a rifle bullet, Captain Matthes was surrounded by the mutinous soldiers, riddled with buckshot and his body hacked and stabbed in many places with bayonets. Shots fired evidently at close range tore great sections of his skull to bits, and the body when discovered was almost unrecognizable.

W. A. Wise, while trying to save an unknown wounded man, was shot three times in the left arm and right arm. Telling of his shooting Wise said:

SECRETARY DEFERS ACTION

Punishment for Rioting Likely to Be Severe in War Time.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—Secretary Baker will take no action on the rioting in Houston, Tex., in which negro regular troops were concerned, until the report of the board of inquiry into the incident has been received. Whatever is done, he said late today, would be based upon the findings of that body.

Mr. Baker would not discuss in any way the question of the policy of training additional colored troops in Southern states. Senators and members of Congress from Texas and other states in the South called on him during the day to discuss the subject. There had been protests before against the department's policy of sending negro guardsmen of those drafted for the National Army to the training camps designated for the troops from their states.

Only a brief report on the Houston incident had come tonight from Major-General Parker, commanding the Southern Department, and officials professed ignorance of General Parker's order transferring the troops involved. Governor Manning, of South Carolina, saw Secretary Baker a few days ago to submit a formal protest against the sending of colored units of the National Guard or National Army to camps in that state for training, and the Southern Department officials who were at the War Department held similar views.

Senator Sheppard, of Texas, said he would recommend that no colored troops be sent into Texas other than those raised in the state.

REMOVAL OF NEGROES ASKED

Resolution Will Be Considered Today by Texas Legislature.

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 24.—A resolution declaring that it had been fully demonstrated that negro soldiers in Texas cities have become a serious menace to the safety and welfare of white citizens and requesting Texas Senators and Congressmen immediately to confer with President Wilson and Secretary of War Baker with a view to having the negroes removed from the state was introduced in the upper house of the Texas Legislature today.

DRAFTED MEN ARE AIDED

TRADE RIVALRY IS BLAME FOR WAR

England Declared Jealous
of Growth of Commerce
From German Ports.

FAITH STILL IN U-BOAT

Lloyd George's Assertion Danger
Will Pass With Summer Denied
by German Vice-Chancellor.
Long Nights to Be of Aid.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 24.—Vice-Chancellor Hefferich, during debate before the Reichstag, said the real reason why Great Britain entered the war was the fact that Germany's trade would in 1917 presumably have reached a level of the trade of Great Britain.

"This war," the Vice-Chancellor said, "is the result of tension created by the fact that Great Britain was constantly feeling the glaring and increasing disproportion between her superior world and naval power and Germany's increasing economic strength."

"One ought clearly to recognize that Great Britain's object was her economic oppression. To abandon one's self to any illusion in this respect would be fatal."

Dr. Hefferich repudiated as unjustified the reproach that he ever had made any prophesies respecting the efficacy of the German submarine warfare.

Lloyd George's Figures Questioned.

"Prophesying," he said, "I leave to Great Britain. Premier Lloyd George's statistics, in his latest speech, are more humbug. If the British Premier, contrary to his declarations in April, now draws a favorable picture of the situation—although it certainly has not become favorable—this proves first that public feeling in Great Britain urgently needs to be comforted; and second, that Lloyd George considers it necessary to play upon German public opinion."

"This impression is confirmed by the obvious consideration that Premier Lloyd George's words can only be explained by the same direct menace which operates, despite the prospect of American aid, in the tremendous dash on the western front, with an immense concentration of men and material."

"This menace is not so much on land as in the air as it is on the water. The opinion, shared by Mr. Lloyd George, that fine weather is particularly favorable for U-boat activity is a mistaken one. Small seas and calm in the wind are very disagreeable for U-boats, especially in view of the enemy's defensive measures, regarding aircraft in particular. Some commanders are of the opinion that submarine warfare can be carried on with still better results when the weather is not too fine and the nights are longer."

ENGLAND CALLED ARCH ENEMY

Kaiser Declares Foe Spreads Hatred Over Whole World.

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 24.—England, the arch enemy of Germany, must be beaten down at whatever cost, Emperor William told his troops on a visit to the Flanders front on Wednesday. An official statement issued in Berlin says the Emperor addressed deputations from all detachments which have had a share in meeting the British attacks. He said he felt impelled to express his thanks and his full recognition of the heroic gallantry shown by troops from all parts of Germany in the hard fighting of the last week. The Emperor referred to the marked contrast between the German and Anglo-French points of view and continued:

"It is in God's hands whether His wisdom will give us victory. He has taught our army a hard lesson and now we are going to pass the examination. With the old German confidence in God we shall show what we can do. The greater and mightier the problem the more gladly we shall grapple with it and solve it. We shall fight and conquer until the enemy has had enough of these struggles."

"All Germans have realized who is the instigator of this war and who is the chief enemy—England. Everyone knows that England is our most spiteful adversary. She spreads the hatred of Germany over the whole world, filling her allies with hatred and eagerness to fight. Thus everyone at home knows what you know still better, that England is particularly the enemy to be struck down, however difficult it may be. Your relatives at home who, too, have made great sacrifices, thank you through me."

"A difficult struggle lies ahead of us. England, proud of her stubborn resistance, believes in her invincibility, but you will show that you can achieve still greater things for the prize of the war is the German people's freedom."
