

BANTAM CHAMP IS ON HIS WAY HERE

Charley Moy, Titleholder of Coast, to Meet Mascott on Labor Day.

PHENOM DUE TOMORROW

Portland Boxer Hits Old Stride and Expects to Give Good Account of Himself—All-Star Card Planned.

According to a telegram received by Fred T. Merrill, manager of the new Rose City School of Boxing, from Charley Moy, of San Francisco, bantamweight champion of the Pacific Coast, the boxer and his manager, John Burdick, left for Portland yesterday and will arrive here tomorrow for his bout with Billy Mascott on Labor Day. They will go six rounds, with the bantamweight championship of the Pacific Coast at stake.

The main event between Moy and Mascott will be backed by an all-star card of bouts with the best boys in Portland and the Northwest appearing. The show will be held in the Baker Theater on the evening of Labor Day, September 2. The Baker has been chosen by Manager Merrill after a careful survey of all of the available locations in the city and he decided that it was the most centrally located and best equipped building for the attraction.

Since he has gone back to his former manager, Bobby Evans, Billy Mascott seems to have hit his old stride, and as a victory over the clever Californian will mean a match with Pete Herman, bantamweight champion of the world, he will leave no stone unturned in order to get in the best possible condition for Moy. Billy has started training for the bout and is working daily with Alex Zambitas.

As soon as Moy arrives he will start training at Mike Butler's School of Physical Culture in the Northwest building. The San Francisco boy comes to Portland with a string of victories over the best bantams in California, many of the bouts being won by the knockout route. Out of the 46 battles he has taken part in he has won 13 of them by knockout.

The rest of the bouts on the card are being arranged and will be announced as fast as they are clinched.

Irish Patsy Cline, lightweight championship contender, won every round of the ten from Johnny Lustig in New York the other night.

Red Watson, the Oakland lightweight who has grown into the middleweight class, lost to Willie Webb in San Francisco last Friday night. Not so very long ago Watson would have stopped a boy like Webb in a couple of rounds.

"Licorice Ball" Is Taboo

FRESHMEN TO BE ON ELEVEN

Dartmouth Makes Change Because of War Conditions.

HANOVER, N. H., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—Owing to war conditions, Dartmouth has decided to play freshmen on its football eleven this fall. It gave up the freshmen football schedule, so something had to be done for the freshmen, and the college athletic authorities determined to let them play on the varsity team. Most of last year's varsity football eleven have

enlisted in the war, and some of them now are in France.

Clarence W. Spears, of Kewanee, Ill., a Western boy, will coach the eleven. Last year Spears coached the Dartmouth freshmen team and had the championship freshmen team of the East, not being defeated at all. Spears was an all-American guard and graduated last June.

Princeton has canceled its game with Dartmouth. In fact, Harvard, Yale and Princeton will not play football at all, and the big game in the East this fall seems to be Dartmouth versus Pennsylvania, at Boston, on November 17.

Military Athletic Director Finishes Tour South.

ARMY SPORT DEVELOPED

Former Y. M. C. A. Physical Tutor Comes to Complete Arrangements for Athletics at American Lake.

A. M. Griley, ex-physical director of the Portland Y. M. C. A., who is directing athletics in the military posts and cantonments in the Western Department of the Army under the auspices of the National War Work Council of the Y. M. C. A., will arrive in Portland today to complete arrangements for the athletic activities at Camp Lewis, American Lake, Wash.

Mr. Griley has just completed a tour of the southern section of the Western Department, appointed physical directors for all the military posts, naval stations and cantonments there, and is now in the Northwest preparing to receive the new American Army at Camp Lewis, where his scheme of athletics to include every member of the Army is to be put into effect.

That the enlisted men are keen for athletics and that it will be one of the most important branches of Army Y. M. C. A. work, is the assertion of Mr. Griley, after two months' active work among the soldiers at various encampments.

His plan is to make the sport interesting for those men who have never before taken much interest in athletics because they did not understand it, or felt that they could not measure up to the standard which is set by some for an athlete. It is these men that Mr. Griley's method reaches. They are made to feel their place in the activities and to strive to keep the enlisted men physically fit, and men in this condition are what the Government is seeking at this time. That the Government is heartily in sympathy with the movement is shown by the helpful manner in which it assists the Y. M. C. A. physical directors in their undertakings.

DEER SEASON STILL CLOSED

Governor Issues Another Proclamation to Hunters.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—The deer hunting season, which was closed by Governor Withycombe August 21, to remain closed indefinitely, or until the ban is suspended by the executive offices by the terms of a proclamation issued by the Governor today.

Conferences between Governor Withycombe, Adjutant-General White and others in Portland today were responsible for the proclamation.

BIG MEET ASSURED

Most of Best Athletes to Compete at St. Louis.

TITLES TO BE DEFENDED

Nearly All of Champions Crowned Last Year Who Are in Army Obtain Furloughs—Walter Hummer to Attend.

For the past three months athletes following have been wondering whether the war would leave enough athletes in the United States to make the National Amateur Athletic Union championships, to be held at St. Louis on Friday, Saturday and Monday, a success athletically. According to a statement issued from A. A. U. headquarters at New York by Secretary-Treasurer Frederick W. Hubben, he feels confident that the meet will be the equal of any held so far. His statement follows:

"Judging from the entries that have been received during the past week, the championships at St. Louis, I feel sure, will prove a great success. Practically all of the champions crowned at Newark last year will defend their titles. One or two have retired from athletics; one has been working on a farm all summer and has not had time to train, and Tom Halpin, the quarter-mile champion, had the misfortune to pull a tendon while training for the championships.

"Only one or perhaps two will be kept out of the championships on account of the war. Do not mean by this that our athletes have not volunteered their services to their country, because they have. Almost one-third of the prominent athletes who will compete for championship honors are in the service of Uncle Sam and have obtained furloughs in order to either defend their titles or win one.

"Walter Hummel, of Portland, the quarter-mile hurdle champion; Don Scott, of New Orleans, the half-mile champion; Ted Meredith, the Olympic 800-meter champion and world's record holder for the half mile; John W. Overton, formerly of Yale and the present intercollegiate cross-country champion and National champion, and record holder for 1000 yards indoors, and Andy Ward, of Chicago, the National sprint champion, are a few of the most prominent athletes who are in the service and have obtained furloughs so as to take part in the championships.

"The Chicago Athletic Association and Illinois Athletic Club expect to take large teams to St. Louis, as they are anxious to carry off the club championship and also a few of the relay championships. Although the New York Athletic Club and Irish-American Athletic Club are not sending teams, all of their athletes of championship caliber will make the trip. The Boston Athletic Association will send a small team, and the Meadowbrook Club of Philadelphia will be represented by a strong team, on which will be many of the University of Pennsylvania star athletes.

Comekey Gives to Red Cross.
