Evangelist to Launch "Drive" on "Hosts of Darkness" at Los Angeles.

TRIP TO FRANCE UNDECIDED

"Ma" Sunday Says Spouse May Not Make Journey With Gomers. Arrangements for Portland Meeting Yet Unsettled.

"T've the same old punch," said Billy Sunday, as he swung aboard his Pullman, "Rogue River," attached to the Shasta Limited at the Union station at 2:50 P. M. yesterday. He drew "Ma" and little Paul aboard after him and then the engine puffed a warning for the start to Los Angeles. The noted evangelist, wife and son were off, amid the "good-byes" of a gathering of friends.

Sunday in Los Angeles the big fight between Billy and the devil will be on full blast, and, judging from the evangelist's appearance and his self-assurance as to physical trim, it will be a sorry day for his satanic majesty. "The same old punch," so proudly claimed by Billy, means more grief for the evil ones, whose bailiwick is about to be invaded in the city of the angels.

Lack of Rain Is Mourned. It's some punch, as will readily be admitted, and Billy said, "I'm going to hammer the old devil like blazes after my fine rest at Odell farm. I feel great; but I waited all summer long for an Oregon rain, all in vain.

By George, I wanted to have the treat of lying in bed and hearing the gentle patter, patter on my roof, but nothing doing—it didn't come, and we're off in a bunch for Los Angeles. Billy and Ma came down from their Hood River ranch yesterday in time to catch the Shasta Limited over the Southern Pacific and at the Union Station they were met by a party of Portland ministers, who had come to bid them God speed in their work, for the Sundays will not return for ten months, in all probability.

In the party were: Dr. S. W. Seeman, Dr. T. W. Lane, Dr. A. L. Hutchinson, Dr. W. W. Youngson, Rev. A. B. Calder, Dr. W. J. Montgomery, Rev. Charles W. Hayes and Rev. Boydnot Seeley. They greeted Billy, "Ma" and their son, Paul, upon arrival at the depot and remained with them until the Shasta Limited pulled out for the south.

Fresh from their beautiful ranch, the Sundays looked the picture of health and it was no wonder that Billy felt himself equal to entering the ring against his ever-present opponent. "Ma" Treats Ministers to Peaches. "Ma" hated to leave the ranch, where she has been busily engaged in various outdoor pursuits and part of the time in canning fruit, also. She fetched down a nice tin full of luscious peaches of a fine variety and Billy felt the mistake of exposing them to the gaze of the ministers, who, when caught eyeing the fruit, were treated to one each by the team of Sunday and Sunday.

"Well," said Billy, "I'm off again for the conflict, feeling great. Had the most wonderful time, you know, on the ranch; worked hard lots of the time; had lots of sleep and plenty of good, ranch-cooked meals. You bet, I feel great and I've got the same old punch." "Have you changed your mind about letting Billy go to France?" "Ma" was asked.

"Oh, I never said he couldn't go," she replied, "I only said he couldn't go with Gomers. It's hard to tell what is best to do; he may yet go, but we now expect to keep our regular engagements for the year."

Butterfield Is Surveyed. All is in readiness for the big drive in Los Angeles, where the Sunday advance agents, all experts in their line, have been at work for three months getting things in shape. When Billy steps into the tabernacle there Sunday morning, he need not worry about a single item, so perfect is his organization, and he can devote all of his steam, pep and punch to battling the devil abroad.

Billy, "Ma" and Paul were preceded to Los Angeles 10 days ago by George and William A. Jr., the older sons, and Mr. and Mrs. William Butterfield shipped the Sunday automobile to San Pedro by steamer, going with it themselves. Mr. Butterfield is the official chauffeur, having been with the evangelist and family for more than three years. The Sundays have not yet fixed the definite date upon which they will invade Portland, Billy said yesterday.

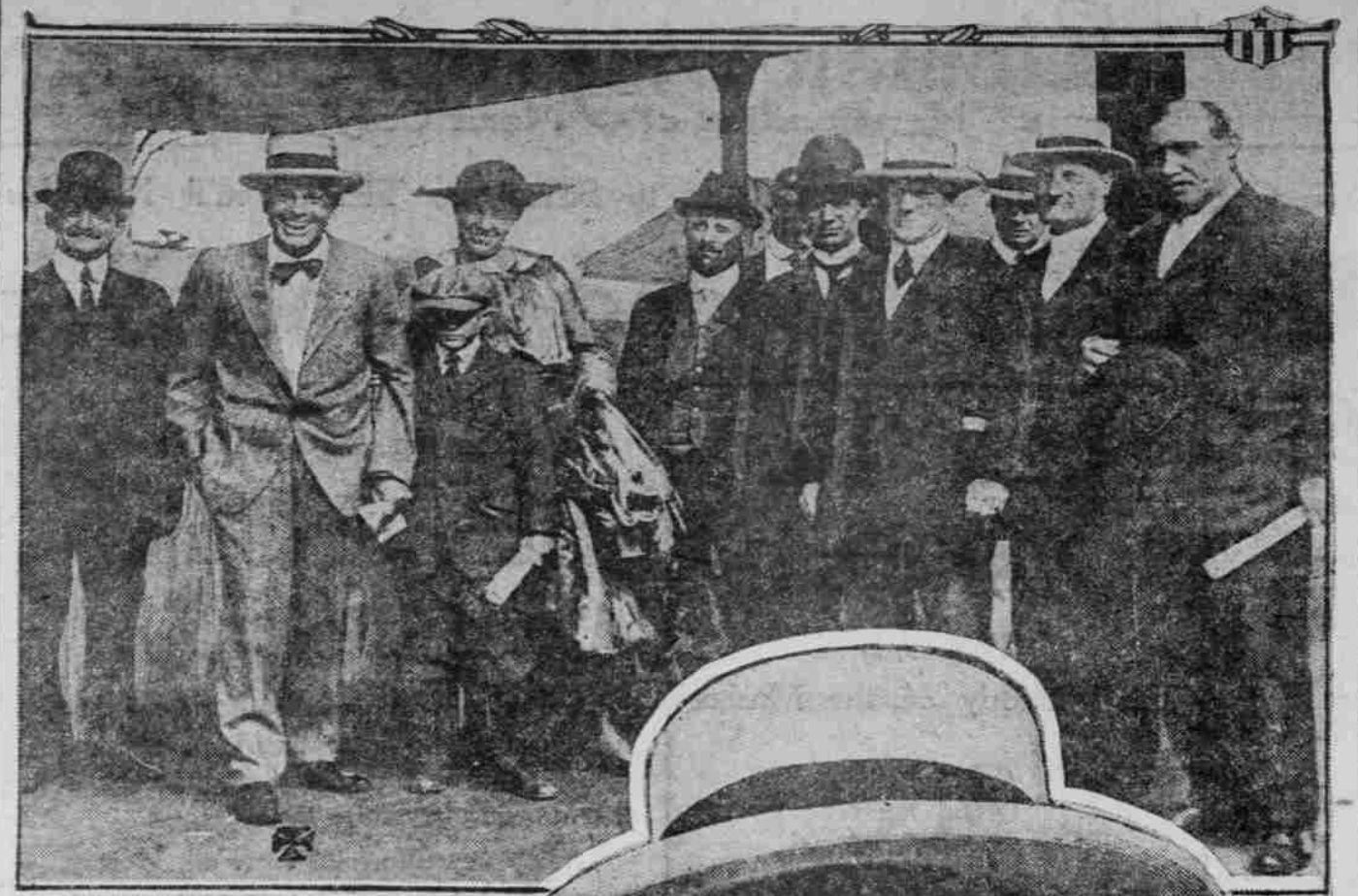

ROCKEFELLER, JR., SENDS GIFT Billy Sunday Gets Chest Full of Clippings About Meetings.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—When Rev. William A. and "Ma" Sunday arrived from their Odell ranch today bound for Los Angeles they found at the local express office a 100-pound wooden chest which had been forwarded to the evangelist by John D. Rockefeller, Jr. The chest was filled exclusively with newspaper and magazine clippings on the recent New York campaign. While Billy and "Ma" were interested in the thousands of clippings as children in a Christmas box, they had no time to investigate the newspaper comment and the chest was expressed to Los Angeles, where Sunday the evangelist will fire his initial volley at Satan for a season following his annual rest on the Hood River ranch. "My vacation has been a tonic and by some hard work in the hayfields and a lot of open-air play and resting, I have recuperated," he said. "I have just one regret and that is that we haven't had a good rain before we left, but the Lord is pretty busy in these troublesome days. We may rest assured that he will send a good rain when he gets around to it."

MILL EMPLOYES ON STRIKE Palmer Plant at Chehalis Is Made Idle by Walkout.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—Nine men from the plant of the Palmer Lumber & Manufacturing Company, of this city, asked for their pay today and several others refused to go to work, consequently the plant is tied up. A small crew is working, loading cars. The plant in normal times works from 50 to 60 men. The strike is the result of the organization of a timber workers' union here the first of the week. The men ask for eight hours' work with the same pay as they have been getting for ten hours' work.

ASTORIA DEPOSITS LEAD Savings in Proportion to Population Exceed All Other Cities.

ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—Astoria is jumping into the lead of all the cities in the United States in the amount of postal saving deposits proportionate to population. She even outranks such cities as Spokane and the deposits are climbing daily at a rapid rate. During the present month the deposits have been exceptionally heavy and they now exceed a quarter of a million dollars. Butte, Mont., and Astoria have been racing neck and neck for months for the leadership.

Shipping Board Asks Figures. TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—The fir emergency committee, of which George S. Long and J. T. Gregory, of Tacoma, are members, has been asked price quotations on 22,000,000 feet of Douglas fir for the Federal Shipping Board, to be used in the construction of 50 ships of the emergency fleet on the Atlantic Coast.
