WEEKS WINS BRIDE

Reed College Boy Marries, Becomes Officer and Aviator.

BRIDAL COUPLE VISITS CITY

Former Student at Reed College and Oregonian Correspondent Makes Satisfactory Record During Summer Months.

Harold M. Weeks, former Reed College student, accomplished three distinct things since leaving Portland last May for the Officers' Reserve Corps training camp at Presidio—won a Second Lieutenant's commission, got himself transferred to the aviation corps and was married.

The bridegroom is visiting at the home of his brother, Dr. E. Weeks, 626 East Tenth street. Dr. and Mrs. E. B. Weeks, parents of the bridegroom, are also visiting there from Litchfield, Minn.

Mr. Weeks was attending Reed College and had finished his junior year when the officers' training camp was announced. He remained there until July 16, winning a Second Lieutenant's commission, but, seeing the great opportunity offered in the aviation corps, asked for and was granted a transfer to that branch of the United States Signal Service.

He was sent to the United States School of Aeronautics, at Berkeley, where he was put through an eight-weeks' course in ground work. Upon his return, however, he will be assigned to some flying school, here or abroad, and, if successful in this course, probably will be given the rank of First Lieutenant.

James B. Rogers, Jr., who was formerly in Reed College and went to the Officers' training camp, transferred to the aviation corps one month before Mr. Weeks, and is now in training in a flying school somewhere across the ocean. Hugh Bromfield, another "Reed" boy, is still at the aviation school at Berkeley.

NOVEL FILM PROMISED

SERIOUS POSE OF CHARLIE CHAPLIN RED CROSS OFFERING. Lecture by Frederick Villiers Tomorrow to Include Pictures of Actual Warfare.

A screen feature never before enjoyed by the public and which perhaps never will be again is to be shown at the Helling Theater tomorrow night, when Frederick Villiers, who has been war correspondent of the London Illustrated News, delivers his lecture for the British Red Cross. It is in his interview with Charlie Chaplin, comedian, in motion pictures relative to the proposed enlistment of "Charley" in the British army on the western front.

According to a telegram, received by the local British Red Cross office yesterday, Mr. Villiers requests that a special announcement be made of his interview with Chaplin, and that Mr. Villiers will show a motion picture of his interview with the screen comedian. It will be of particular interest to the general public to see Mr. Chaplin in a serious mood in films, and this is the feature to be offered.

Mr. Villiers wishes the public to remain until after he has shown this film.

In addition to the lecture to be given by Mr. Villiers, he will show three full reels of film scenes of the battlefronts, taken with the sanction of the French government, and 100 slides, made from his own sketches.

Mr. Villiers will reach Portland today from California and will be met by a delegation and probably be taken over the Columbia River Highway before he leaves the city.
