IMMORALITY IS CHARGED

ANONYMOUS LETTERS APPRISE OFFICIALS OF WRONG-DOING. Call Issued for Meeting of Theater Managers to Probe Alleged Illegal Organization.

Since the arrest of three young men on criminal charges preferred by a 16-year-old girl last Monday, District Judge Dayton has received a number of anonymous letters reciting instances of other young girls whose questionable conduct has been the subject of serious neighborhood comment.

Based on the reports that have reached him and the preliminary investigation he has conducted, Mr. Schumann says he is satisfied that an organization of chauffeurs, with the assistance of ushers and candy salesmen in some of the downtown theaters, is chiefly responsible for the mistreatment of young girls.

At this conference, which may be held today, Messrs.
