

THIRD CONTINGENT ON WAY TO CAMPS

Numbers Called Into National
Army Vary, According to
Equipment Ready.

SECOND CALL UNCERTAIN

All but Two Governors Favor Im-
mediate Examination and Clas-
sification of Men Registered
for Army Service.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—The third contingent of National Army men will begin moving tomorrow to the 10 cantonments, where approximately one-half of the 687,000 selected men called out by the President already have been mobilized. Quotas now ready to leave home vary greatly, ranging from 17 to 40 per cent of the full state quotas, with a general average of between 20 and 25 per cent.

Modification of previous quota plans was necessary because of the conditions at the cantonments and the availability of equipment.

Definite figures are still lacking as to the number of selected men to be transferred to the National Guard, aviation service, medical corps or other branches of the Army that will have to be filled up to the strength. It is certain, however, that the men remaining at the camps will not be sufficient to fill the 16 National Army divisions to full strength.

Secretary Baker indicated today that no decision had been reached as to when a second call will be made. There are many deficiencies to be filled up in the first draft, physical examination of the selected men by Army doctors at the camps having resulted in many rejections.

Decision of the War Department on the suggestion that the remaining 7,000,000 registered men be examined immediately and classified for service in order that they may have knowledge of when to expect a call to the colors and arrange their affairs accordingly, awaits action by Congress on the war deficiency bill.

Secretary Baker said today that of some 35 Governors who had been asked if they believed it wise and expedient to proceed with the examination of all registered men, only two had opposed the plan. These two did so on the ground that it would make too great a demand on the time of the examining boards, virtually all the members of which are serving without pay.

GOVERNORS APPROVE PLAN

7,000,000 Registrants All to Go Before Draft Boards.

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—Forty-five Governors have approved the plans to proceed at once with the physical examination of the 7,000,000 men registered under the selective draft act, who were not included in the first call.

The work will be done leisurely, two or three examinations being held each week. The accepted men will be included in the second call and will be used to fill gaps in the National Army as they occur.

TYPHOID IS ERADICATED

Serum Discovered by Dr. Vincent
Makes Soldiers Safe.

PARIS, Monday, Oct. 1.—Professor Charles Richet, of the French Academy, Nobel prize winner for medicine in 1913, declared before the Academy today that typhoid fever, which claimed many victims at the beginning of the war, had now been virtually eradicated from the Army through vaccination with the serum discovered by Dr. M. A. Vincent, of the Val de Grace Military Hospital.

YOUTH ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

Hunter in Hospital With Gaping
Hole in Right Lung.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Wesley Jones, 16, son of Mrs. F. E. Jones, was accidentally shot while hunting last night and is in the Montezano Hospital in a serious condition. Jones was dragging his gun through a fence when it was discharged. The charge of shot tore a hole as large as a gun barrel through his right lung.

NORWAY LOSES 30,800 TONS

Score of Seamen Killed When Ships
Are Sunk by Divers.

LONDON, Oct. 2.—The Norwegian legation announces that during September, 19 Norwegian merchant ships of an aggregate tonnage of 30,800 were lost.

Twenty Norwegian seamen were killed and 17 others are reported as missing.

RUSSIANS BREAK LINES

Germans Pushed Back Mile, Says
Petrograd Report.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 2.—Russian advance detachments in the Riga region yesterday broke through the German lines and pushed forward for a distance of one mile, says the official statement issued today by the Russian War Office.

CITY RETAILS POTATOES

Des Moines Buys and Sells and
Makes 20 Per Cent Profit.

DES MOINES, Oct. 2.—The city of Des Moines went into the potato business today and before noon more than 100 bushels had been disposed of at \$1.20 a bushel, or 20 cents more than was paid for them.

telephone service, together with house taxes on 1916 incomes and a general 10 per cent tariff levy were features of the evolution of the bill.

Both praise and criticism were given the conference report today in the Senate. Senator Simmons, heading the Senate conference, in a two hours' explanation of the conference work, said the bill had been decidedly improved,

though he was unable to defend certain provisions insisted upon by the House conferees, including the second-class mail and munitions taxes.

Senator Penrose, ranking Republican conferee, also said many objectionable features were included in conference compromises, and that the bill might work individual injustices, but that it had been improved in many respects. He said he would support the measure if only 50 per cent good.

LaFollette Reserves Comment.

Vigorous criticism of the bill, particularly the second-class postage provision, was made by Senator Smoot, of Utah. He said the Senate bill has been harmed in conference. Many publishers he asserted, would be driven out of business. He and other Senators expressed hope that before the new second-class rates became effective next July they will be repealed or modified. The closing speech was made by Senator La Follette, who reiterated his opposition to the small amount of taxation proposed compared to large bond issues and his demands for greater taxation of wealth. He said he would defer until some time later "some observations he had intended on the bill and matters connected with it."

Many members of Congress have been expecting the Wisconsin Senator to make an address in answer to petitions for his expulsion for alleged disloyal utterances and actions.

MEXICAN TRADE STAKE

TWO OFFICIALS DECLARE TIME
FOR AMERICA IS OPPORTUNE.

General Obregon Is on Leave and Government Purchasing Agent Is Also on Visit to States.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—America's hour for taking over the bulk of Mexico's trade is at hand, according to statements by General Alvaro Obregon, Mexican Minister of War on leave, and Baldermo A. Alameda, purchasing agent for the Mexican government at a luncheon of the Commercial Club here today. The luncheon was held in honor of General Obregon, Alameda and members of their staffs who are visiting here.

General Obregon declared he came as a private citizen and was traveling purely for pleasure.

Alameda in his address declared: "Ninety per cent of the trade developed in Mexico is going to European countries. There is no reason why America should not get this business. Germany is especially active at present in developing her trade interests in Mexico."

General Obregon and his party expect to leave here Saturday morning for Washington. General Obregon expects to meet Secretary of State Lansing and other high Government officials upon his arrival in the capital.

PLAY-TIME FADES FOR THIRD OREGON

Beaver Boys, Healthy and
Happy, Detrain at Camp
Greene, After 8-Day Trip.

HOME SOON PUT IN ORDER

Soldiers Pitch In With Vim and Es-
tablish Camp by Time Cooks
Are Ready With Evening
Meal; Two Wrecks Missed.

WITH THE ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SECOND REGIMENT, FORMERLY THE THIRD OREGON INFANTRY, Camp Greene, N. C., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Healthy and happy and glad that the long overland trip is over, the Third Oregon detrained today after eight days of train travel, missing two railroad wrecks and losing 20 hours en route. The contribution from the Beaver State consists of the Headquarters Company, the Band, the Machine Gun Company, the Sanitary Troop, Major M. B. Marcellus commanding, and Companies I and K, with Colonel John L. May to daddy to the whole bunch.

And now we'll have to quit calling them the Third Oregon. Henceforth they will be known as the One Hundred and Sixty-second Regiment, being designated such on their arrival here.

Oregon Soldiers Settle Down.

It was almost 1 o'clock before the soldiers, headed by their band, reached camp No. 7, the designated camp site. There they found the Second Battalion, Major Eugene Moshberger commanding, and as soon as famished stomachs were soothed the work of unloading began. Headquarters was established without a muddle and as quickly as the canvas arrived the squad tents went up. While this was going on the camp cooks were busy and by 5 o'clock camp was in order. Colonel May had paid his respects to the camp commandant and familiarized himself with the local regulations.

The last delay in the Third Oregon's progress hither came at Lowell, a little town 14 miles from Camp Greene. While waiting there Colonel May had the band visit the Lowell school, where he made a brief address to the children. When he finished Major Gilbert delivered a brief prayer, which concluded: "If I were a kid I wouldn't want to go to school when a band from Oregon was playing. All that don't want school to take up raise their right hand."

Playtime Is Over.

The school superintendent was "human," so there was no school until the troop train left.

This is a large camp, some 14 miles of it, and from all accounts, borne out by a glance at the camp schedule, which says reveille at 5:45, and eight hours' drill with a half a day Wednesday and Saturday afternoons, and Sundays off, the playtime of the Oregon soldiers is over. In spite of the half-finished condition of the camp, the hard work and all, the squadron, Major Charles E. McDonnell commanding, and Batteries A and B are as fit as a fiddle. I paid a rush visit to the squadron this afternoon and Major McDonnell reports all are well and getting into the best of condition. As yet none of the troops excepting Troop A have horses, although about 700 animals are in the corral.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Destructive typhoons in interior Japan are reported in a cable message received here today by the Commercial Cable Company from the Japanese telegraph administration. The interior wire service is badly disarranged, the cablegram says.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 1.—(Delayed.)—The Helsinki correspondent of the Bourse Gazette says the Socialists of Finland are losing hope of carrying the election for the new Landtag, which began today. It is said the peasants are opposing the Socialists.

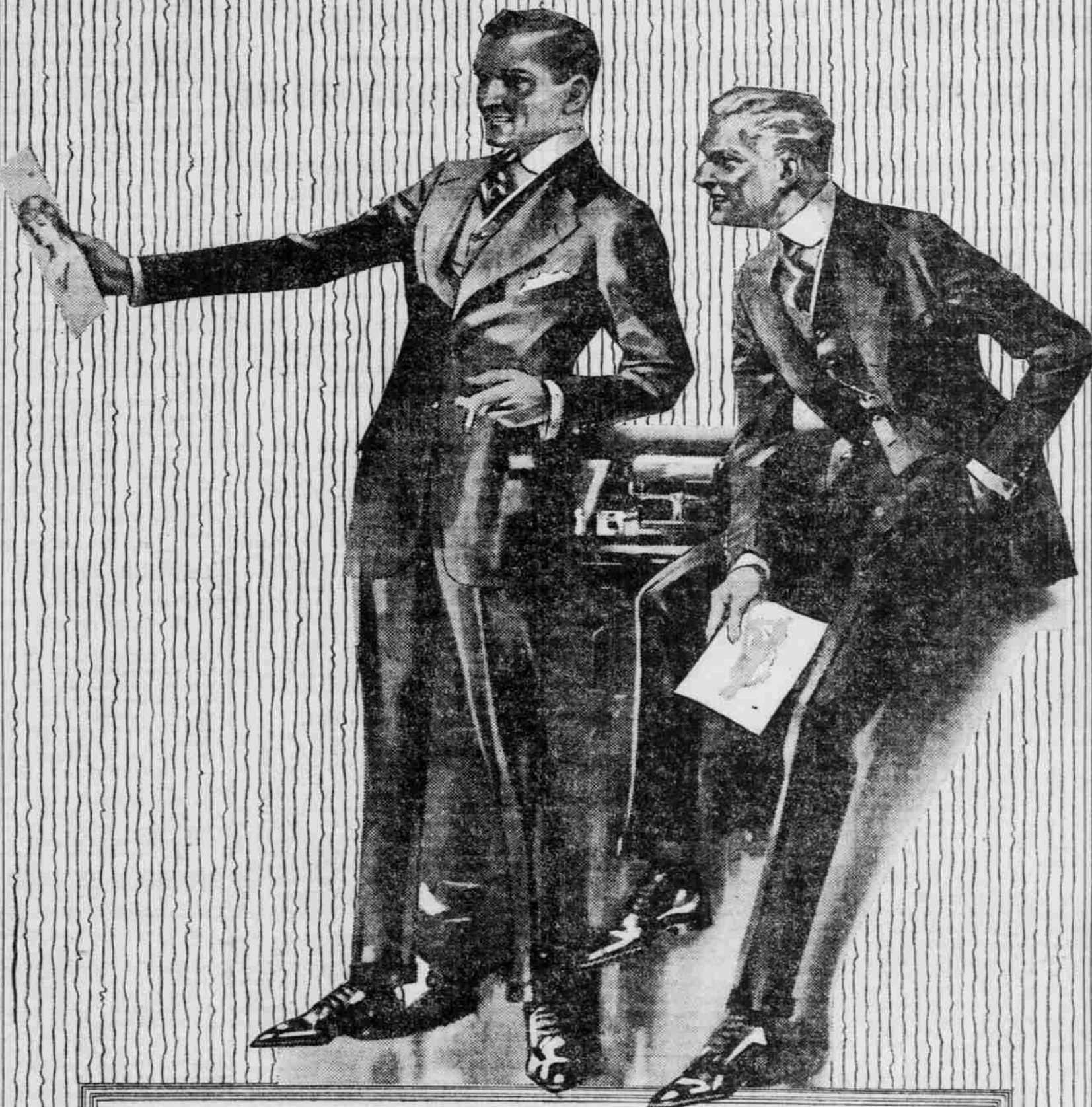
