

BOND DRIVE STARTS IN EARNEST TODAY

Oregon Must Subscribe \$625,000 Every Day of Month to Provide Its Quota.

ENTHUSIASM WORKED UP

Minimum for State is \$16,500,000, but, According to Elasticity of New Loan Up to \$24,500,000 Will Be Accepted.

Oregon starts on the second week of the second Liberty loan drive today and really buckles down to the campaign. Subscriptions to the loan received so far reduce the state's quota from \$16,500,000 to the neighborhood of \$15,000,000. There are 24 days remaining in the Liberty loan month, Sundays included. On each of these Oregon must subscribe at least \$625,000 if the minimum quota is to be met.

The Government has announced that, while the people of America have been asked to invest \$3,000,000,000 it will accept all subscriptions up to \$5,000,000,000. Viewed from the local standpoint, the excess amount that Uncle Sam will accept from Oregon is \$3,000,000 more than the announced quota.

Portland's Share \$10,000,000. From the basis of bank deposits Portland is expected to subscribe the greater part of the quota, approximately \$10,000,000. The remaining \$5,500,000 is to come from outside territory, assuming that the several districts subscribe their quotas in full.

The outstanding Liberty loan event of the coming week in Portland will be the visit of Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo, who is to arrive Wednesday morning, remaining until mid-afternoon. Secretary McAdoo will lay the cornerstone of the new postoffice building in the morning, and at 11 o'clock will join in conference with approximately 240 bankers, from all sections of Oregon, on the placing of the Liberty loan in this state. At 12:15 he will address a public meeting at the Auditorium on the necessity for the loan.

Drive Gathers Impetus. It may be said that the Liberty loan drive has just gathered impetus. By far the greater part of the past week has been spent in perfecting the hard-hitting organization that is now ready for the field. Publicity and speaking features will surpass those of the first loan campaign, and every district of Oregon will be made to feel the urgency of the patriotic call.

The new Liberty loan issue will bear 4 per cent interest, and is non-taxable to normal income. Bonds of the first loan bearing 2 1/2 per cent may be exchanged for the new issue which runs for 25 years with the right reserved by the Government to call it in at any time after 10 years.

Slogans of the second Liberty loan are striking, and they face the citizen from thousands of posters. "Share the money more tender with our dollars than with the lives of our sons" asks one. "A loan for Liberty and for Liberty alone" declares another. "If you go across, come across," is the terse suggestion of a third.

MORMONS BUY \$250,000

Church Will Take From Tithing Funds to Aid Nation.

SALT LAKE, Oct. 7.—The Mormon church today announced that \$250,000 of the tithing funds of the organization would be used to purchase Liberty bonds, the first time in the history of the church that tithing funds have ever been diverted for a purpose outside the church.

Twelve hundred Latter Day Saints read their right hands in the tabernacle this afternoon when the announcement was made, and approved the action of the heads of the church.

RUSSIANS REFUSE TO FIGHT

Soldiers Become Disorderly and Are Surrounded by Cossacks.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 7.—Eight thousand soldiers at Gornia in the province of Mohiliv, after a meeting, refused to go to the front, says a telegram from Gornia. The soldiers later became disorderly, and to prevent excesses they were surrounded by Cossacks, when they promptly surrendered.

JAPANESE SHIPS SOUGHT

Diversion of Tonnage to Atlantic Being Negotiated.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—Completion of negotiations for diversion of considerable Japanese tonnage to trans-Atlantic service in exchange for release by the American Government of steel ship plates to the Japanese was in sight today. The Japanese, it was learned, probably will accept a proposal just made by the State Department, details of which have not been made public.

Miss Calderhead, Militant Suffragette, Is Sowing Seed.

OREGON TO HEAR STORY

Miss Anna Martin, who had charge of successful campaign in Nevada, will deliver series of addresses here.

Refresh from the National capital, and likewise from a three days' sentence in jail there for picketing the White House with a pretty banner, Miss Iris Calderhead, daughter of a former Kansas Congressman and an organizer for the National Woman's party, reached Portland yesterday on a mission for "the cause." She will be here during this month and is the guest of Mrs. W. J. Hawkins, 571 Myrtle street.

"The cause" is that of National suffrage and Miss Calderhead, not at all militant in appearance and rather diminutive as to size, is a representative here just now for the purpose of arranging some meetings for a sister in the work, Miss Anne Martin, vice-chairman of the party.

Miss Martin will come to Portland and Oregon October 28 and will make known the news of importance she brings in a series of addresses to the women of the city and state. Her schedule of speaking dates will be announced as soon as completed.

Miss Calderhead will make a few talks, she said, to small groups—in a way sowing the seed that is to be fully cultivated by Miss Martin when she reaches the ground later. Incidentally, Miss Martin is a clever woman, according to Miss Calderhead, having had charge of the campaign for suffrage in Nevada, which ended in a brilliant success.

Miss Martin is a sister of Mrs. Otto B. White, of this city, and is known to quite a circle of friends here. Miss Calderhead, while here, will co-operate with Dr. Florence Sharp Mahon, state chairman, and Mrs. Hawkins, vice-chairman, of the National party.

Jail Sentences Are Real. "I do not consider myself very militant," commented Miss Calderhead. "Neither are the other American women who have experienced life in jail for attempting to call attention to the President's responsibility in regard to National suffrage. Our work has been misrepresented and our aims misconstrued."

"I may say, however, from experience that the jail sentences are very real; they are not 'paper affairs' at all." Miss Calderhead then related her own experience as a picket near the White House.

"In the first place," she said, "when we went to President Wilson with our request for National suffrage action, we asked us to focus the attention of the country upon the subject; we think we have done it."

NEGRO TROOPS BUY BONDS

Veterans of Pershing's Mexican Expedition Are Among Number.

BISBEE, Ariz., Oct. 7.—Five hundred thirty-six enlisted men of a detachment of 691 negro cavalrymen of the Regular Army stationed at Fort Huachuca, near here, have subscribed to \$47,400 worth of Liberty bonds, according to an announcement today by J. N. Gaines, county salesman in the loan campaign.

Among the men are veterans of General Pershing's expedition into Mexico, including the survivors of the fight at Carrizal in which Captain Boyd and Lieutenant Adair were killed.

BORDER GUARD RETAINED

Fifty-seventh Infantry Relieves Texas Guardsmen.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Oct. 7.—Announcement was made today that the Fifty-seventh Infantry, now in camp at Leon Springs, Tex.; two companies of the Nineteenth Infantry and the Eighth Cavalry, will take up the work of guarding the Texas border after the first National Guardsmen of the Second, Third and Fourth regiments, ordered to Camp Bowie, at Fort Worth, leave for that station next week.

When announcement was made recently that the Texas Guardsmen would be taken from the border it was stated they would not be replaced. Today's order indicates that the border guard will be retained.

SOLDIERS BURN TO DEATH

Fire Destroys Petrograd Theater Used as Officers' Hospital.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 7.—One hundred soldiers, it is estimated, were burned to death and many others are missing as the result of a fire which completely destroyed the Panayeff Theater, which was used as an army postoffice and officers' hospital.
