LIQUOR SALE TO SOLDIERS CHARGED.—Charged with selling intoxicating liquor to a soldier in uniform, James Mahoney, a laborer, was arrested at 2 1/2 street yesterday morning and is held for a violation of the Federal prohibition act. It is alleged that he sold quantity of Jamaica ginger to Henry Mahoney, a soldier stationed at Vancouver Barracks. Dan Singh, a Hindu laborer, is also held as a witness against Mahoney. The arrest was made by Patrolmen Burkhart and Spaulding.

STAGE HANDS GET WAGE RISE.—The Stage Hands' Union of the Theatrical Mechanics Association last week demanded a slight increase in their weekly salary. Yesterday evening, however, in the city granted an increase of 2.50 a week. Manager Johnson, of the Pantages Theater, said last night that he increased wages without controversy. In some of the houses the increase took effect this week, while in others it will be made November 1.

Bureau Aids Prineville.
 The Oregon development bureau of the Portland Chamber of Commerce is working in close co-operation with the new Irrigation Securities Commission appointed at the last session of the Legislature.

The commission investigates any land reclamation district that is formed and passes on the proposed bond issue, so that the securities can be approved by the United States Department of the Interior as legal investment in the state of Oregon.

It is proposed to hold a joint session of the two bodies in Portland in the near future.

The bureau has also been endeavoring to help the city of Prineville with its municipal railway project. Some time. Various methods have been proposed and discussed with respect to the financing of the project from present development to completion, since the amount to be raised in addition to what has already been spent will be in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

The commission reports that about the only method of procedure will be an additional municipal bond issue.

SPEAKERS LINED UP

Gospel of Liberty Loan Will Be Carried Into Every Town.

TALENT BEING PROCURED

Milton A. Miller Appeals to Patriotic Officials in Country Districts to Prepare for Patriotic Addresses.

Through an organization being perfected by Milton A. Miller, chairman of a sub-committee on speakers for the Liberty Loan state committee, Oregon's most remote inhabitant is going to hear about the paramount issue of the day—the second great Liberty Loan.

Men and women are going to tell the story of the Liberty Bonds in every nook and corner of the state, starting next Monday, according to the plan outlined yesterday by Mr. Miller. A pair of speakers will go into every county and spread the gospel of the bonds, one detailing the facts as to the various phases of the second loan, while the other will deliver a general patriotic speech, going into the history of the war and telling of its numerous angles and what it means to every citizen.

Governor Withycombe is expected to issue a proclamation, setting aside next week as Liberty Week.

According to the plan, there will be 36 speakers, who will cover 18 districts. Some of the best talent in Oregon has been appealed to for this service and already a number of the most prominent men and women in the state have replied favorably.

Names and itineraries of the speakers will be announced within a day or so. Telegrams were sent out Saturday morning to those who are wanted for this work and replies began to filter in yesterday. There is no doubt about sufficient able speakers being procured to carry out the program and to get the message of the hour to the various sections of the state during Liberty Week.

"We are going to provide the speakers," said Mr. Miller yesterday, "and when we announce their names and speaking dates we shall expect the people in those cities and towns where meetings are to be held to get in line and prepare the programme. We appeal to the mayors and school officials; to the pastors of churches; to school directors and to officers of all organizations in every community of the state to fall in and help through this plan of speech-making to inform the entire people of Oregon about the bonds. In that way they can do a great service to their country."

Powerful Organ Recital Is Given at Auditorium.
 Edgar E. Courson Plays in Finished Style Before Large Audience.

A LARGE audience that filled comfortably the entire downstairs and the center balcony portions of the public Auditorium enjoyed yesterday the fine pipe organ recital by Edgar E. Courson, organist of the First Presbyterian Church. Mr. Courson played in quiet, finished, first-class style and charmed his hearers by the selection and performance of a programme suited to all tastes.

Several of his selections, notably, the Sullivan "Lullaby," was so much liked that they had to be repeated. The "Tours 'Minuet'" was an impressive selection, combining thunderous strength with a delicately contrasting trio. Two other especially esteemed and well-played numbers were the beautiful "Pilgrim's Song of Hope" (Battiste) and "Answer to Nihilism" (Hahn).

The whole programme was one of short numbers, with not one wearisome interval, and in this respect was an admirable lesson to all young organists. The programme announced for children under 6 years of age not admitted. This rule was not obeyed in yesterday's audience.

FRIARS' CLUB CASE ENDS.
 Liquor Law Violation Matter, Long In Court, Disposed Of.

OREGON CITY, Or., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—The Milwaukee Friars' Club case was disposed of in Circuit Court Saturday when Tom Nahlman, former servant of Wilbur, and Louis Rosenfield, Wilbur's waiter, pleaded guilty to the charge of violation of the prohibition law and were fined \$250 each.

Nearly a year ago the Friars' Club, conducted by Wilbur, was the scene of a raid by Clackamas County officials in which considerable liquor was seized. Wilbur was charged with violating the liquor law, tried and found guilty, the court imposing a \$250 fine and sentencing him to six months in jail. Wilbur appealed to the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court sustained the indictment of the Clackamas County Court.

Meanwhile a second charge was preferred, including Wilbur, his Japanese servant, and waiter, charging all with violation of the liquor law. Upon announcement of the sustaining by the Supreme Court of the first indictment the cases pending against the waiter and servant were set for hearing, with the resulting plea and sentence today.

BOYS FIND HUMAN HAND.
 Discovery Made Under Approach of Burnside Bridge.
