FISH AND BUTTER DROP.

MUNICIPAL MARKET HAS BIG EFFECT ON PRICES.

Butter prices are down throughout the retail business district as a result of the municipal fish market. Markets Saturday quoted all kinds of fish at prices corresponding to the prices offered by the city. One or two private markets even undersold the city.

Butter prices also took a drop in many of the retail markets as a result of the market established by the Oregon Co-operative Dairy Exchange. Retailers who buy from country creameries have been able to get butter for 46 cents a pound and have offered it for sale at 48 cents. This is said to be in the form of a "leader," or special attraction to draw business to these markets.

City creameries which have been boycotted by the city plant have refused to raise the prices to them to 47 cents, wholesale, are still sticking to former prices, which are 48 and 49 cents a pound for butter in cartons. This is being sold by grocers at retail for 55 cents a pound.

The city creameries are still holding out and the city plant is still in the country plants (which would mean 80 cents a pound at retail) and are importing butter from other states. The city creameries are finding an outlet for considerable of the butter at their co-operative store adjoining the city fish market. The city plant is claiming they are laying butter down in Portland from other states cheaper than it can be bought from home producers.

HALLOWEEN PARTY AHEAD.

Christian Young Men and Women to Number of 1500 Invited.

The Epworth League, the Baptist Young People's Union and the Christian Endeavor society of the city will unite with the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A. in giving a Halloween party at the Y. W. C. A. and the Y. M. C. A. buildings October 31.

As no room in the two buildings is large enough to accommodate the 1500 young people who have been invited, the group will be divided into two groups and will move through the lobby of the Y. M. C. A. into the auditorium, where 15-minute vaudeville performances will be given. Then they will be taken into the Y. W. C. A. building, where several surprises are in store.

The final assembly place will be the large gymnasium of the Y. M. C. A. Barclay Acheson is general chairman of the committees that are planning the party.

FRENCH PEOPLE LAUDED.

Charles J. Schnabel Addresses Members of Lincoln-Garfield Post.

The address at the last meeting of the Lincoln-Garfield Post, Grand Army of the Republic, was delivered by Charles J. Schnabel on "America's Debt to France." The speaker laid stress on the assistance rendered the American colonies during the Revolution by its loans, soldiers and fleet, and how, with Washington's strategy, Yorktown and Cornwallis were taken. General Lafayette's services were emphasized, as was also his lavish reception upon his return to New York 60 years later.

"Without Lafayette, Rochambeau and Deshayes there would have been no surrender of Yorktown," he said. "Without Vergennes and Beaumarchais, the revolution could not have been financed. French courage and patriotism to every appeal during that terrible winter of Valley Forge. It is befitting that the two greatest republics in existence should remain in the closest ties of friendship."

CHECK FORGER IS TAKEN.

Harry Howell Also Admits Being Deserter From Marine Corps.

Harry Howell, aged 26, an alleged deserter from the United States Marine Corps, was arrested at Broadway and Washington streets yesterday afternoon by Detectives LaSalle, Hellyer and Tackaberry, and is held in the City Jail without bonds for the Federal authorities.

Howell admitted being a deserter, having left the training station at Bremerton. He enlisted at Mare Island about six months ago. In addition to the Federal charge of being a deserter, Howell is also wanted for forgeries in Portland and Seattle. He admitted yesterday forging a \$20 check on Olds, Wortman & King.

RAINIER MAN IS SHOT

C. L. Wilburn Peppered in Face By C. M. Biggs.

PAIR OWNER AND TENANT.

Controversy Over Rights Leads to Assault, and Wounded Man Is in Hospital, but Injuries Not Serious; Assailant Gives Up.

C. L. Wilburn, of Rainier, Or., is in Good Samaritan Hospital, his face and one arm peppered with birdshot. C. M. Biggs is in the jail at Rainier, charged with shooting Mr. Wilburn with a shotgun.

The shooting was the culmination of a controversy early yesterday morning when Mr. Wilburn went to his farm, about four miles from Rainier, to get some cows. The farm had been rented to Mr. Biggs, who refused to allow the owner access to the cows and a field of clover. According to Mr. Wilburn, Mr. Biggs had ordered him off the place, under a threat to shoot. Mr. Wilburn disregarded the threat, and when he attempted to drive the cows off the place was shot.

Mr. Biggs used a shotgun loaded with birdshot and fired at about 25 yards' distance, the charge taking effect in the right side of Mr. Wilburn's face, the latter defending his eyes with his left arm, which is also punctured in numerous places.

Mr. Wilburn was rushed to Portland and Dr. A. E. King called to attend him. Mr. Biggs surrendered to the authorities at Rainier and was taken in charge by Deputy Sheriff Jesse M. Wilburn is head lawyer at the Columbia River Door Company at Rainier and has lived there for a number of years. Mr. Biggs has lived in Rainier about a year.

Mr. Wilburn last night told attaches at the hospital that the controversy involved a field of clover but because of the distraction due to his wounds was unable to explain the issue clearly.

Dr. King reported that Mr. Wilburn's wounds are painful and disfiguring, but probably not serious.

ARMY GREAT ACHIEVEMENT.

Secretary Baker Gives Credit to General Crowder for Success.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Secretary of War Baker and Provost Marshal-General Crowder were the principal speakers at a dinner last night attended by members of New York city's 189 exemption brigade in celebration of the successful completion of the first draft. General Crowder characterized the work in its first stage as a substantial achievement.

Secretary Baker gave full credit to General Crowder for the success that has attended the intricate task of populating the National Army camps.

Secretary Baker praised in highest terms the work of General Crowder in "originating, preparing and conducting the draft scheme." He declared the work was "done at first sight" to the Provost Marshal-General, and that the completion of the first draft was in itself a victory in the war.

"We have done many a spectacular thing," he said, "but the raising and training of a first draft is nowhere possible, save in America."

MILITARY FUNERAL TODAY.

Major Lawrence H. Knapp Will Be Laid to Rest From Elks' Temple.

The funeral of Major Lawrence H. Knapp, whose death occurred at his home in this city Friday, will be held at 3 o'clock this afternoon from the Elks' Temple under the joint auspices of the lodge and the military officials of the state. He will be laid to rest with full military honors in recognition of his service to the state and country during the past 29 years.

A regimental band from Vancouver Barracks will be in attendance, as will 600 soldiers of the Third Oregon Regiment from Clackamas. The service will also be attended by high military officers of the state and Nation. Rev. William G. Elliot will officiate.

The ashes will be interred in the crematorium, following the military funeral service.

IDAHO LAD ENLISTS IN NAVY.

Juvenile Judge Gives Consent to Youth Who Would Serve Country.

"You may send me to the reform school but I will enlist in the Navy as soon as I get out." Edgar Sherman, an 18-year-old Idaho lad, thus convinced Juvenile Judge Tawell of his determination to do his bit for his country, and before night young Sherman had volunteered in that branch of the service.

Three days ago juvenile court officers picked up in the streets the Sherman lad and two companions, Walter Hogan and Henry Conklin, each aged 16. The trio admitted they had run away from their homes at Mountain Home, Idaho, and come to Portland to enter the Navy.

PINS THOUGHT POISONED.

DARK SUBSTANCE ON POINTS SOLD BY GERMAN PEDDLERS.

City Chemist Examines Matter Found on Roughened Tips; Plot Is Suspected.

Is some German agent or sympathizer in the guise of a peddler, distributing poisoned safety pins about Portland's residence districts? This is a question which the police department will endeavor to solve today when city chemists have completed a chemical analysis of a dark substance found on the point of every safety pin in a package purchased Saturday afternoon by Mrs. G. F. Beckley, 240 East Forty-ninth street. Because of the fact that the peddler from whom she bought them is German, there at once arose the suspicion that a poison squad might be at work in Portland. The police have been instructed to keep a sharp lookout for the peddler, a good description of whom was furnished by Mrs. Beckley.

Except for the points, which are naturally hidden when they are clasped, the pins appear to be new. Police who examined them yesterday did not believe the dark matter to be rust, as it could be easily scraped off.

Another circumstance which lends color to the poison theory is the fact that the points of the pins have been roughened in some manner, apparently for the purpose of having a surface to which the foreign matter could more easily cling.

Mrs. Beckley told the police that the peddler spoke with a strong German accent and that he had a gray beard and wore a dark brown suit.

SPECIAL PERMIT ARRIVES.

Harry Jaeger Enlists in Submarine-Chaser Service.

Because he was a few eighths of an inch under the required height, Harry D. Jaeger, son of J. P. Jaeger, jeweler, had to secure special permission from Washington to enlist in the submarine-chaser service. The waiver for which young Jaeger has been waiting arrived Saturday from Washington and he took the oath Saturday afternoon.

He will leave immediately for the school in Philadelphia, where machinists' mates for motorboats are trained. After completing this course he will be assigned to one of the submarine-chasers in the Government service.

PORTLAND BOY IS CAPTAIN.

Monroe E. Toevs, Now in Hawaii. Son of Local Newspaperman.

Monroe E. Toevs, a Portland boy who has been serving as post quartermaster in the Army barracks at Schofield, Hawaii, has passed the examination for Captain in the Officers' Reserve Corps. He expects to receive his commission in December.

Young Toevs has served for six years in the regular Army. He has won a number of promotions and is now a Lieutenant. He is the son of Frank F. Toevs, a Portland newspaper man.
