EARL SMITH CORONER

SUCCESSOR ELECTED BY COUNTY BOARD TO DR. DAMMASCH.

New Official In Graduate of University of Oregon, and Will Retain Present Duties.

By the votes of Commissioners Muck and Holbrook, Dr. Earl Smith was elected County Coroner yesterday to fill the unexpired term of Dr. F. H. Dammasch, resigned. Rufus C. Holman, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, cast his vote for Dr. Smith, the appointing power was favored by Dr. Dammasch and a number of undertakers, several of whom were in attendance at the meeting.

Dr. Smith, the appointing power, is a pioneer contractor of this city, was graduated from the University of Oregon Medical College, a member of the City and County Medical Society, is married, and lives at 419 Larrabee street.

In accepting the appointment, Dr. Smith announced that he would continue the policy of his predecessor with reference to maintaining a public morgue. He will retain Edward F. Smith, chief deputy coroner, and the other deputies now employed in the office.

SOLDIERS' GIFTS TO SHRINK

New Postal Ruling Due to Inability of French to Handle Business.

Parcels from home to the boys in France will shrink two-thirds in size on November 1, when a new postal ruling concerning this class of mail goes into effect.

From that time all parcels of fourth-class or domestic parcel post matter, for and from the American expeditionary forces in France, will be limited to seven pounds instead of 20.

The ruling is necessitated by the refusal of French officials, owing to the volume of imperative war business to carry mail packages in excess of seven pounds.

NOTED WORKER HERE

Mrs. Bass Questions Loyalty of Militant Suffragists.

THRIFT PLAN EXPLAINED

Leader in Women's Organizations Declares Her Sex Does Not Want to Be Classed as Auxiliaries Much Longer.

Mrs. George Bass, of Chicago, one of the foremost women speakers and workers in patriotic service, arrived here yesterday. Mrs. Bass came West with Mr. McAdoo in the interests of the Liberty loan campaign. She is official speaker for the National Liberty loan committee and presided for Mrs. McAdoo at a majority of the business meetings of the woman's committee.

Mrs. Bass is the only woman member of the war savings certificate committee, of which Frank Vanderlip is chairman. This committee is entrusted with the task of developing a plan under which \$5 bonds will be put before the public.

"These bonds will appeal to the masses," Mrs. Bass explained. "It will be so arranged that one may buy 25-cent stamps, until they have 20, which will entitle the holder to a \$5 bond. This will induce the child and the woman at home who have but small means to share in helping to win the war."

Mrs. Bass is one of the most ardent workers for suffrage in the country. She isn't a bit militant and she certainly isn't feminine.

"Women don't want to be classed as auxiliaries much longer," she declared. "Women are doing a big part and are doing it well. They want to be patriotic citizens; they want to be 'in the minute'." She reviewed rapidly the part women are taking in Red Cross work, in the Liberty loan, in food conservation and in registering for various lines of service.

She didn't intend to say anything about suffrage, she said. Party lines, personal grievances, all sorts of things are being set aside for the big cause of liberty and justice and humanity, Mrs. Bass said, but when she found that Anne Martin was here and that she was giving addresses for the party that is picketing the White House, Mrs. Bass decided she would tell of the loyalty and the real practical work done by the National Suffrage Alliance that had offered its time, money, talents and influence to back up the Government in the National crisis.

And of course she couldn't help referring to the militants.

"They are hindering instead of helping suffrage," Mrs. Bass declared. "And, I fail to see why they are showing patriotism. We Americans are not standing much from people who talk against the Government these days."

The manner in which Oregon has responded to the Nation's call was the subject of eloquent praise from Mrs. Bass.

Mrs. Bass was entertained on an auto trip yesterday by Mrs. Thomas Carrick Burke, state president of the Oregon Equal Suffrage Alliance, and by Mrs. Donald Spencer, secretary of the organization. Last night she addressed a meeting at the library. Special stress was laid by Mrs. Bass on the winningness of women to be of service when given a definite plan.

GIFT PACKAGES ARRIVE

FIRST RED CROSS CONTRIBUTOR IN MRS. HARRY L. CORBETT.

Several Hundred Received of Portland's First Call for \$5000 to Go to Soldiers Abroad.

Yesterday marked the opening of the campaign for \$5000 Christmas packets to be obtained in Portland and vicinity by the local chapter of the American Red Cross. Many individuals and organizations are working on packets, which must be in the hands of the Red Cross on the second floor of the Corbett building by Friday.

The first package to arrive was the gift of Mrs. Harry L. Corbett, and it was shortly followed by two packages from I. Lowengart. Mrs. E. D. Kingsley sent in five packages. The Red Cross unit at Carlton sent in 100 packages, neatly packed and tied in the Red Cross City unit reported 200 packages prepared. A group of women called the Cleveland Park unit have agreed to furnish 25 packages, and it is understood that the Laurelhurst Club will prepare several hundred. In addition, \$50 in money has been donated.

Christmas packages can be made up at a cost of about \$1.50 and, if desired, the Red Cross will make up the package on receipt of this sum. The packages contain hard candy, small games, gum, dominoes, tobacco if desired, puzzles, a pad of paper, envelopes and pencils, the whole being tied up in a bandana handkerchief and encased in stout wrapping paper. Those interested may obtain further suggestions at the Red Cross headquarters in the Corbett building, or from Lewis A. McArthur, at the Pacific Power & Light Company, in the Spaulding building. Mr. McArthur has the cards for the campaign. Civic organizations have been urged to assume the work of preparing certain allotments of the packages.

20,000 VETERANS EXPECTED TO MARCH AT ENCAMPMENT.

Portland Probably Will Be Crowded With Members of Organization Next Summer.

Veterans of the Civil War are looking ahead to next summer, when the National encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic will be held in Portland, and already steps are being taken to make the encampment a success.

It is estimated that no fewer than 20,000 silver-haired veterans of the Civil War will be in line, marching through Portland streets in the parade which is always held at these seasons. They will be survivors of the big battles of the war, from Gettysburg, Chancellorsville, Bull Run, Forts Henry and Donelson, Vicksburg, Petersburg, and the rest of the battles famous in American history, as well as those who played the part of heroes in many minor engagements.

Thousands of Americans in addition to members of the Grand Army are expected to come to Portland for the encampment, so the city's hospitality will be taxed to the utmost to accommodate the many guests.

TONG HISTORY TO BE GIVEN

Twenty-Three Members of Organizations Accused of Murder.

A complete and detailed history of the Chinese tong of this city will be written into the record in the trial of Gong Woo, secretary of the Suey Sings, which opened in Circuit Judge Gatens court yesterday. Gong Woo is charged in an indictment with 22 other members of the Suey Sings and Hop Sings with second degree murder for the killing of Chin Hong, a member of a rival tong, at Broadway and Flanders street, June 2.

The specific charge against Gong Woo is that he and the other defendants, through their organizations, planned the murder of Chin Hong, chose the gunmen who actually committed the murder and paid the price demanded by the murderers. The blanket indictment was returned by the grand jury on information furnished by Wong Wah and Chin Gee Hoy, former members of the society, of which the defendant, Gong Woo, is secretary.
