

DRIVE STARTS FOR ARMY Y. M. C. A. FUND

State Committee Receives Re-assuring Reports From Various Districts.

COUNTY WORKERS ORGANIZE

Lists of Local Chairmen and Campaign Managers Is Completed. Reed and McMinnville Colleges Respond to Call.

"Don't worry about us," was the laconic telegram received yesterday from the Ontario committee by state officers who are mapping out the coming drive in Oregon for Army Y. M. C. A. funds.

Workers at Newberg, who are ready to direct the drive in the Eastern district of Yamhill County, reported to state headquarters that they have adopted the slogan: "Do it in one day." R. J. Moore is chairman and John Larkin campaign manager for the Newberg district.

Big Campaign Planned.
Other reports showing that county committees are getting together to lay careful plans and work up enthusiasm for the canvass to start next Sunday have come in from many quarters of the state. The lists of chairmen and campaign managers for every county of the state were completed during the day.

Appeals on behalf of the Army Y. M. C. A. cause already have been presented at two of the state's educational institutions with gratifying results. Students and faculty members of Reed College responded to the call by pledging \$1600. At McMinnville College, where the combined student and faculty list is given as 200, the pledges aggregated \$1900. Today speakers of the campaign will appear at the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural College.

Victoria Man to Aid.
Among the speakers at command of the speakers' bureau, which will send individuals and "flying squadrons" about the state to explain objects of the drive, is E. C. Hannah, of Victoria, B. C., a young man of 21 who saw more than ten months' service in the front line trenches in Flanders. Mr. Hannah has been "lent" to the Oregon committee by Canadian army to give assistance in the Y. M. C. A. drive. In company with L. G. Nichols, associate state campaign manager, Mr. Hannah went to Eugene yesterday and addressed a mass meeting there.

COQUILLE SEEKS SERVICE

Improvement in Telegraph and Express Facilities Desired.

COQUILLE, Or., Nov. 6.—(Special.)—The business interests of this city, expressed through the Commercial Club, seek an improvement of telegraph and express facilities and better service at the Southern Pacific, and the Oregon Young, Leo J. Cary and A. J. Sherwood were named as a committee to obtain the service to which the city believes itself entitled.

In support of the efforts to be made, the Commercial Club makes the claim that the Southern Pacific has more than quadrupled its business since the Willamette-Pacific Railway was completed in the Fall of 1916. Another necessity the committee will urge the railway company to furnish is a stockyard to facilitate the shipment of cattle and sheep. The express company and Western Union will be requested to establish up-to-date offices in the downtown section of the city.

Potato Harvest in Progress.

WOODLAND, Wash., Nov. 6.—(Special.)—Potato harvesting is in full swing here. The killing frosts which occurred a short time ago thoroughly set the skins and the present weather is favorable to digging. The crop will not exceed 50 per cent of the normal yield.

Anita Lived in Portland.
YB. Anita King once lived in Portland.

Yesterday the inquiry went out through this department for information relative to Miss King and today, thanks to C. M. Hill, manager of the Portland Paramount—Artcraft Exchange, it may be announced definitely that the former "Paramount Girl," trans-continental motorist and present Balboa star, lived in Portland with her husband prior to 1914.

In 1914 the Kings left for Los Angeles, where King, who had been a racing driver before coming to Portland, went back to the game. In 1915 he entered the Los Angeles-to-Phoenix race, collapsed before he finished, and his wife made an effort to reach Phoenix. She drove the car into a ditch and the entry was out of it. King then recovered and died soon after. Then came the contract with Lasky, the trip across the continent of the "Paramount Girl," and then appearances in a number of pictures, notably "The Race," with Victor Moore. Miss King was named a "City Mother" of Los Angeles to look after the invading hosts of film-struck girls and her work was commended highly.

Miss King made a visit to the Northwest last year, but illness forced her to postpone a personal appearance in one of the Portland theaters. Recently she joined the Balboa studio forces and is to be starred in a series of five-reel subjects.

HORSE STEALING CHARGED
Two White Salmon Residents Are Identified by Indian.

WHITE SALMON, Wash., Nov. 6.—(Special.)—Orland Zimmerman and Fred Moore, two life-long residents of Klickitat County, Washington, were arrested Sunday accused of horse-stealing. Five animals disappeared recently.

Wesley Locke, one of the victims, suspected they might have been traded to the Indians on the Yakima Reservation, so drove over and succeeded in locating two of the missing horses and the Indian to whom they had been traded identified Zimmerman and Moore.

RAILWAY VALUES LOWERED
Tax Commission Grants Cuts to Southern Pacific and O.-W. R. & N.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 6.—(Special.)—The State Tax Commission today gave the Southern Pacific approximately a \$400,000 decrease in its total assessed valuation from last year, or a cut of about \$800,000 from its first tentative assessed valuation as prepared by the commission for this year. The assessed

valuation of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Company was increased about \$300,000 over last year, or a cut of about \$200,000 from the tentative valuation which had been prepared for this year.

The commission today also fixed tentative ratios of assessed valuation to the actual valuation of properties in a number of counties of the state, but these were not finally decided upon, as there are still some counties to be heard from.

Albany College Teacher Returns.
ALBANY, Or., Nov. 6.—(Special.)—Miss Alice Clement, director of the conservatory of music of Albany College, resumed her work yesterday after a month's illness. Miss Clement was in a Portland hospital for some time and since then has been recuperating at her home in Beaverton.

WOODLAND, Wash., Nov. 6.—(Special.)—Salmon-trout fishing on the Lewis River is at its best now. Silver-side and dog salmon have commenced their annual run up the river and the trout are following in large schools. Fishermen are having the sport of their lives. The season is a little later than usual this year.
