WIN FIRST PRIZEBlue Ribbon Spuds at Land
Products Show Attract
Crowds' Admiration.

ATTENDANCE SHOWS GAIN

Management of Exposition Extends
General Invitation to Soldiers
to Attend—Dancing and
Music Will Be Feature."Look here, Mrs. Smith! Those are
just the kind I love to bake."This, and similar ejaculations, with
requests for seed, added about the
prize potatoes at the Land Products
and Land Products Show yesterday,
when the blue ribbons decorated the
champion "spuds" of all Oregon. While
the crowds favored all displays with
appreciative regard, they confronted the
potatoes with mingled evidences of re-
spect and admiration.Whereat the boss of the Crook
County display, which took first on
the grand display, first on the gen-
eral display and four individual first
awards for prize potatoes, discussed
the manifest superiority of the big
"spuds" with a great deal of satis-
faction. He is R. H. Schee, of Prine-
ville, and the prize potatoes were
grown by S. D. Mustard, of Powell
Butte, near Prineville. The four first
individual awards were for Burbank,
Early Rose, Hubbard and Uncle
Sam varieties, with a second award
on Netted Gem.

Fine Grains Grown.

Crook County also boasts of the fine
showing made by grains and produce
grown on the new Chocoma irrigation
project and is equally proud of the
two registered Hereford cows, natives
of Crook County, whose stall is an
admiration center on the lower floor.On the closing day of the land show,
Mr. Schee has announced, the cows,
whose value is in excess of \$500, will be
given away to the fortunate person
who has registered the closest guess of
their combined weight. Hundreds
of people view the animals daily, and
after much judicious reflection, they
make their guesses. The cows were raised
by George Dixon, of Prineville.Favorite display booths with the
visitors are those which have
declared prizewinners, thus confirming
the choice of the judges who made
the awards. There is the Polk County
booth, which won the grand sweep-
stake for the entire state and which
also captured first in the Willamette
Valley section, the Clatsop display, first
in the Coast county division, and the
Jackson County display, second in the
Willamette Valley district.

Attendance on Increase.

Attendance surged ahead yesterday,
when the total admissions exceeded
\$500, by comparison with the 2700
visitors of the previous day. Colonel
David M. Dunne, superintendent of the
show, declared that the wonderful change
in attendance followed at once upon
the adoption of the 15-cent admission
fee and predicts that the attendance
will continue to increase.In a letter to Colonel Jones, at Van-
couver Barracks, the management has
extended a general welcome to all sol-
diers in uniform, who will be admitted
as honored guests of the show."The boys are asked to come and
spend a pleasant evening with us," said
Colonel Dunne yesterday. "We will
have dancing every evening, with
splendid music, conducted by Mr. and
Mrs. Harlow Grady and under the per-
sonal supervision of the director. The
stage has been beautifully set for
dancing and the entertainment will be
maintained on a high and wholesome
plane."Today is Horticulture day and brief
addresses will be given by authorities
of National repute. W. L. Dean, chief

Work of Congress Discussed
Before Jewish Women.

JULIUS KAHN IS PRAISED

Boy Scouts Raise Flag—Falling
School Children Sing Patriotic
Songs—Business Ses-
sion Is Held.Patriotism was the theme of the
meeting of the Council of Jewish
Women yesterday in B'nai B'rith build-
ing. The address of the day was given
by Representative McArthur, who re-
viewed the work of the 64th and 65th
Congresses that related to the present
world war. His remarks were inter-
rupted frequently by the applause of
the several hundred women who lis-
tened with profound attention.Mr. McArthur paid particular tribute
to Representative Julius Kahn, of San
Francisco, to whom he said the Nation
owes a debt of gratitude for his devo-tion and effectual work in the cause
of democracy. Speaking of the ap-
propriations made by the 65th Con-
gress, Mr. McArthur said: "In what
one billion seems a vast amount, but
the end is not yet. Whatever is neces-
sary for our boys, that much will be
raised. We are not going to send our
boys to war and starve and neglect
them. America will find a way to
economize and provide for the young
men who are representing the home
folk in the struggle for upholding the
right."He read a list of suggestions which
told of many ways in which every man,
woman and child in the country can
assist Mr. McArthur spoke with pride
of the fact that he represented the only
district from which there had to be not
one man drafted in the first draft.
The patriotism and quick response of
this state," declared Mr. McArthur, "re-
flects the sturdy ruggedness of the peo-
ple who founded it."An impressive spectacle preceding the
address was a flag ceremony given by
a group of many little chaps of the
Boy Scouts of various troops, who
marched in and raised the American
flag, gave the pledge and saluted with
soldierly dignity. The scouts included:
Flag bearer, Richard Ottenheimer;
bugler, Norman Lane; Irwin Polop, Ar-
nold Marks, David Piper, Ted Baum and
Herbert Goldsmith.A chorus of little children, nearly all
of them descendants of foreign-born
parents, came from the Falling School
to sing patriotic songs. While they
gave "The Star-Spangled Banner" the
entire audience stood. "My Own United
States" and other selections fol-
lowed. The tiny girls all wore white
frocks and pink hair bows and the
boys were dressed alike in white
blouses and dark knickerbockers. Lit-
tle Gusie Lakelish presided at the
piano. Miss Porter, principal of Fall-
ing School, was a guest of the council.
During the business session Miss Eda
Jacobs, Mrs. J. Durkheimer and Miss
Sarah Jacobs reported on the activities
of the recent state federation conven-
tion at Prineville. Mrs. S. Sternberg
gave greetings from the Spokane Coun-
cil of Jewish Women and Miss Pauline
Kline, of Corvallis, representing the
Child Labor Board, spoke briefly. A
social hour, with war bread, instead
of the usual rich cakes, completed the
patriotic programme.Mrs. Solomon Baum had charge of
the programme and Mrs. M. Laven-
son, assisted by several members, pre-
sided at the social hour. The table
was centered with red carnations. Mrs.
Alexander Bernstein presided at the
