After having their plans accepted the hospital was never built and the county has failed to pay them for their services.

MAN OF 99 IS TRAVELER.—Although past 90 years of age, Benjamin Raley, who recently arrived in Portland, has passed a good part of the last year in traveling in various parts of the West. A short time ago he returned to Oregon from a visit with relatives at Delta, Colo., where he celebrated his 90th birthday. Raley is a retired farmer, and his mental faculties and while walking about uses neither spectacles nor cane.

BOND PAYMENTS DUE TODAY.—Portland banks have been notified that the first installment, amounting to a payment of 15 per cent, on the second issue of Liberty loan bonds must be paid to the Federal Reserve Bank at San Francisco by November 15. In order that the banks in this state may comply with this notice, all Oregon subscribers to these bonds should deposit with their respective banks the amount of this first payment not later than today.

ROAD IMPROVEMENT URGED.—Residents along the Powell Valley road yesterday petitioned the County Commissioners to repair the road in order that it might become passable for automobiles. They declare that several hundred school children are now compelled to wade through mud and water to reach school. The petition was referred to the road department for investigation.

NEVADA LIQUOR DEALER BROUGHT HERE.—Deputy United States Marshall Berry returned yesterday from Reno, Nev., having in custody Jess O. Alderson, a liquor dealer in the Nevada town, who was recently indicted on a conspiracy charge for violating the Federal law which prohibits importing liquor into a dry state. The Government officials charge that Alderson has been supplying bootleggers with liquor for their operations across the state line in Oregon. Denino is located just across the Oregon-Nevada state line. Alderson furnished \$400 cash bail for his appearance.

THREE ADMIT LIQUOR SELLING.—Mike Boukus, an active bootlegger at the DeMoy Hotel, yesterday pleaded guilty to a charge of violating the prohibition law and was fined \$100 by District Judge Jones. He paid the fine. Mike Brlich and Louis Topisch, proprietors of a soft drink establishment at Sixteenth and Pettygrove streets, also pleaded guilty to violating the prohibition law and were fined \$100 each. All three arrests were made by Special Agents Scott and Jeffries, more than 30 quarts of whisky were confiscated.

ROBBING RING SUSPECTED.

TROUTDALE BURGLARY THOUGHT ONE OF SEVERAL BY AUTO PARTY.

Front Door Jammed and Goods Taken Are Just Like Those Stolen From Other Stores.

That the burglary of the store of Aaron Box at Troutdale some time Monday night is another of a long series of country store burglaries conducted during the past few weeks by a gang of automobile thieves is the belief of Deputy Sheriff Phillips, who, with Deputies George Harbitt, Christofferson and Bexford, made an investigation yesterday.

The front door of the Troutdale general merchandise store was "jimmied" open in the same manner as have more than a dozen country stores in Marion, Washington, Clackamas and Yamhill counties recently. In fact, the thieves took the same general character of merchandise as has been taken in all the burglaries.

Merchandise valued at about \$500 was taken from the Troutdale store. This includes a quantity of heavy shoes, cigars, cigarettes, tobacco, overalls and chocolate. The same brand of shoes has been taken in nearly every store which has been robbed, while they have likewise shown an inclination to make away with the same brands of cigarettes and tobacco.

ROADS TO BE BUILT

Construction Will Go on Despite War, Says S. Benson.

OBJECTION HELD INVALID

Chairman of State Highway Commission Disagrees With Plea of Lumbermen's Committee to Stop Work on Highways.

That no necessity exists for the abandonment of road work now being carried on and that several sufficient reasons exist why it should be continued, is the reply of S. Benson, chairman of the State Highway Commission, to the plea of a lumbermen's committee praying that road work be modified during the war and that labor be released for lumbering operations. Resolutions to suspend production of modern working conditions, the eight-hour day and ample time for recreation for laboring people, he said, are not to be increased production and beneficial.

meats, eggs and butter which have been held in storage as long as 30 days must, on being sold or offered for sale, be labeled as a cold storage article. On selling such products to smaller, unlicensed market men and dealers the licensed firm must pass along the cold storage label, thus assuring that the buyer be informed of the fact that he is not getting strictly fresh goods.

As the Government licenses are now reaching the firms which applied promptly for them the food administration officials expect to see the cold storage labels coming into vogue this week.

LIVESTOCK SHOW IS TOPIC
Plea Is Made for Support Before Chamber by W. H. Daughtrey.

Speaking before the members' council of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday noon, William H. Daughtrey, president of the Portland Union Stockyards Company, pleaded for support for the Livestock Show and declared that, should this city ever lose that exposition, it would never get it back. E. L. Thompson, who presided, spoke likewise.

Adrian Lewis, a student of economics and well-known author, who spoke on "Labor in War Times," said it had been proved that overtime work is not conducive to increased production. Modern working conditions, the eight-hour day and ample time for recreation for laboring people, he said, are not to be increased production and beneficial.

Mr. Benson Gives Views.
 In discussing the request, Mr. Benson said:

"I have talked with many lumbermen since the resolution was presented and find that it is not in keeping with the general sentiment, which favors continuance of road work. The men who drafted the resolution are not unknown to me. They have always been opposed to highway construction."

"I assert that the labor used in building roads is not the labor of the logging camps. For the most part it is recruited from farmers of the localities through which the work runs, who are looking for temporary jobs between farm seasons."

"Highway construction is not being pushed extensively at present. The state is doing only such work as is necessary to connect up existing roads that are of prime importance for military or economic purposes."

Labor Surplus Foreseen.
 "The commission discussed the resolution last Tuesday. We came to the conclusion that we are not interfering with the production of food, lumber, or anything that is essential to the prosecution of the war."

"Another thing to be considered is that there will be a large surplus of labor during the winter, which cannot be used for anything else save road work. It is important that some road work should be going on to take care of this surplus. There is quite a large proportion of the state's population who are skilled in paving, rockwork and road construction, that will not work at anything else."

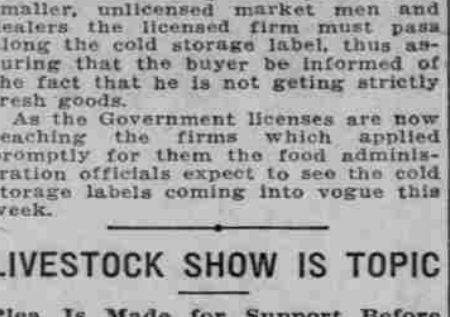
