

ORIGIN OF DEADLY BOMB IS MYSTERY

Twenty-Five Italians Are Under Arrest—Church Wreck Believed Intended.

TRAGEDY GRUESOME SIGHT

Trial of Men Alleged to Have Been Connected With Bay View Riots Supposed to Be Motive for Destruction.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 25.—Twenty-four hours of vigorous investigation has failed to disclose information as to the identity of the person who was responsible for the explosion of a bomb which killed 11 persons in police headquarters here last night.

Twenty-five Italians are under arrest including Giuseppe Mazzini, the Italian who carried the bomb from the basement of the Italian Evangelical Church to the police station, but no action has been taken by the police as the result of the questioning which the prisoners underwent today.

Bomb Timed to Explode.
The fact that the bomb had been placed in the basement of the church and timed to explode when the church would be crowded, and that considerable enmity existed between the Rev. August Guiliano, pastor of the church, and some unknown persons, has caused the police to look to that quarter for a key to the mystery.

Captain of Detectives Sullivan declared today that he believed the bomb was "planted" by persons whose desire it is to break up the religious work which Rev. Mr. Guiliano is conducting among the Italians.

The casualties which resulted from the explosion remained at 11 dead and two injured, no other bodies having been found when the demolished room in police headquarters was searched thoroughly. Many gruesome sights confronted the searchers, and great crowds of curious persons stood outside to glimpse the scene.

Many Aid in Investigation.
State, city and county officials, as well as police representatives from Chicago, are investigating the tragedy and it was intimated by some that through the peculiar construction of the bomb the makers might be known to the authorities.

The trial of 11 men who were said to be connected with the Bay View riots several weeks ago, when a religious meeting held by the priest was broken up, is set for Wednesday. Rev. Mr. Guiliano has stated his determination to appear as a prosecuting witness and there is some thought by police that the bomb may have been placed by persons who wished to prevent him and others of his congregation from testifying against them.

BOMB EXPLOSIONS FREQUENT

Chicago Police Records Show Average More Than One a Week.

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—(Special.)—Nitroglycerine, dynamite, giant powder, fuses, bullets, steel slugs, gaspines and other bomb-making materials are so readily accessible that Chicago has experienced an average of more than one explosion a week since 1915, started the wrecking has extended from Edgewater to Kensington and from the Lake to Austin.

The bomb explosions, according to the police, during the first 47 weeks of this year, are tabulated by months, as follows: January, 1; February, 2; March, 7; April, 6; May, 4; June, 1; July, 10; August, 8; September, 1; October, 3; November, 4. Total, 56.

This does not include the effort of Reinhold A. Faust and others where the bombs failed to explode, some of which cases have reached public print. The bomb throwers have done much damage to property, wrecked a number of buildings, injured several persons and frightened whole neighborhoods. They have blasted the side of a church and wrecked the front of a saloon. They have tossed an infernal machine into a butcher shop and another into a barber shop. They have put their explosives on the front step of a cottage and on the back porch of a 12-apartment building. They have thrown a bomb into a summer garden, in a factory, near a warehouse and under a railway viaduct.

ORDEAL TO BE FACED

Mrs. De Saulles Will Tell Story of Killing Husband.

HEALTH SAID TO BE POOR

District Attorney Declares Cross-Examination Will Be Rigorous—Little Jack Will Testify as to Stories Told Mother.

MINEOLA, L. I., Nov. 25.—(Special.)—Mrs. Blanca de Saulles, who, in her trial for the murder of her divorced husband, goes on the witness stand tomorrow to tell a story lasting several hours, is in poor condition to stand such an ordeal, her physicians said today, and there is some fear that she may break down and be unable to complete her testimony.

Henry A. Uterhart, her chief counsel, said that he considered it absolutely essential for his client to go through with the ordeal and he expected the courage and reserve force she had shown through the trial would sustain her in telling her story.

Cross-Examination to Be Rigorous.
Mr. Uterhart said that his client would have much to say in addition to the incidents which he told in his opening address to the jury, of her treatment by De Saulles, and that she would be on the witness stand a full day. District Attorney Weeks said he would cross-examine her vigorously.

Gossip that was brought to the young woman concerning her husband cannot be proved to be false by the District Attorney. The principle of the case was illustrated in the Thaw case, where it was held to be unnecessary whether the story told by Evelyn Nesbit Thaw to her husband was true, as its effect on his mind would be the same in either case.

Little Jack Not to Testify.
Some of the revelations regarding De Saulles are alleged to have been made to the young woman by their child, who repeatedly told his mother stories of his father and other women, according to the opening statement for the defense. The boy, who is nearly five years old, could be put on the stand for the purpose either of corroborating or denying the fact that he told his mother these things, but the child will not be permitted to take the stand.

MEAT PRICE STABILIZED

REGULATION OF PACKING INDUSTRY EFFECTIVE NOW.

Profits of Industry Must in No Case Exceed 25 Per Cent of Sales. Small Packers Protected.

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—Regulation of the packing industry, effective as of November 1, so that the price of meat to the retailer and consumer may be both stable and cheaper, was announced Saturday by Joseph P. Cotton, chief of the meat division of the United States food administration.

In accordance with the announced policy of the food administration to abolish speculation and unfair profits, Mr. Cotton, in his statement to the

PACKERS, DECLARED THAT PROFITS IN THE MEAT BUSINESS MUST IN NO CASE EXCEED 25 PER CENT OF THE SALES.

Moreover, the annual earnings of the five big packers cannot exceed 2 per cent on the average capital necessarily used in this business, it being pointed out in this connection that these five concerns have diversified business interests that are outgrowths of, but not necessarily a part of the actual packing of meat. Detailed rules and regulations are to be issued to define the general principles outlined and to prevent diversions or concealment of profits, and packers' accounts are to be subject to inspection at all times, Mr. Cotton said. He also declared his intention to protect the small packers and asserted the adjustment of pork prices at the expense of beef or mutton is not to be permitted, or vice versa.

ADMIRAL HARRIS NAMED

ADMIRAL CAPPS RESIGNS AS SHIPPING BOARD HEAD.

New General Manager Is Chief of Navy's Bureau of Yards and Docks and Is Experienced.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Rear-Admiral Frederick R. Harris, chief of the Navy's bureau of yards and docks, was named Saturday to succeed Rear-Admiral Capps as general manager of the Shipping Board's Emergency Fleet Corporation.

Admiral Capps asked to be relieved because of ill health. He was named by President Wilson to succeed Major-General Goethals, who resigned as the result of differences with William Denman, then chairman of the Shipping Board.

Admiral Harris was assigned to the place by Secretary Daniels after the Shipping Board and the Navy Department had been asked to detail another officer for the work. He is a civil engineer and as chief of the bureau of yards and docks has introduced many business methods into the service.

Admiral Harris joined the Navy Corps of Civil Engineers with the rank of Lieutenant Junior grade, in 1903, and has directed a great amount of dock and yard construction.

TRADE IS RESTRICTED

Speculative Buying in Chicago Wheat Pit at Minimum.

LARGE ORDERS NOT TAKEN

Supplies of Grain at Leading Terminal Markets Are so Small There Is No Hedging Pressure.

Crops Late This Year.

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—(Special.)—Speculative trading in grain is curtailed by Governmental restrictions. Officials desire to have it continued as near a minimum as possible. That is, operations of the big traders who buy or sell 500,000 to 1,000,000 bushels of grain are not regarded as essential for the good of the present restricted market.

All large operations, in fact, all trading in the markets is being restricted by Government officials, who have men unknown to the trade on the exchange all the time and promptly report all important operations. That is, the result of the exchange and all the large commission houses are co-operating with the Government and the Food Administration and are restricting trading. Large orders are not taken and moderate-sized ones are not sent in to the trading pits in a bunch, but executed in a way so as to least excite the market.

Large Operations Unnecessary.
The theory of the Government officials is that large operations are unnecessary at present and that they perform no economic function in the market. Supplies of grain at leading terminal markets are so small that there is no hedging pressure in corn and it may be some time before there is. Until such a period exists the lighter volume of trade the better it will be for the market.

Officials of the exchange and all the large commission houses are co-operating with the Government and the Food Administration and are restricting trading. Large orders are not taken and moderate-sized ones are not sent in to the trading pits in a bunch, but executed in a way so as to least excite the market.

The trade, on the whole, has largely lost sight of the fact that the crop this year was two to three weeks late, especially in corn. There were no stocks left over from last year and the trade started with empty bins. Scarcity of all grains caused consumers to take the new crops fully.

It is always necessary to fill up the various holes throughout the country and it is seldom that it can be accomplished within the first three or four, and sometimes six months, after harvest. This is especially true this year in regard to wheat, corn and oats.

Farmers have not sold their wheat, because the Government guaranteed \$2.17 for No. 2 hard and No. 2 red at Chicago for the season. The wheat was not marketed freely early in the year and it has caused great inconvenience and concern on the part of the Food Administration.

To have a large movement from now on seems out of the question, as corn and oats have to be moved in company with the wheat. The wheat is being marketed this year and orders are out for many more cars to be given Western roads, so that as much can be saved as possible.

TOLEDO MAN INSTALLS TIE MILL

CENTRALIA, Wash., Nov. 25.—(Special.)—Bert Moore has purchased a tie mill and will install it on his 30-acre tract of timber east of Toledo.

Mr. Moore will keep the plant operating steadily until all available timber has been cut and as well as ties will be manufactured.

CONGRESS SESSION LIKELY TO BE LONG

Members Already Gathering at National Capital; Preparing for Important Duties.

WAR ON AUSTRIA POSSIBLE

Treasury Department Officials Busy Assembling Appropriation Estimates for Submission on Opening Day, Monday, Dec. 3.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Members of Congress are beginning to return to Washington for the opening of the second session of the war Monday, December 3. Most of them expect the new session to rival the last in important action and few think it will end before the general Congressional campaign next Fall.

Appropriations for the war promise to require much time and there is much new as well as unfinished war legislation to be dealt with.

Many other domestic matters, including prohibition and woman suffrage, are promised attention.

Future relations between this and Germany's allies may be determined early in the session. Many members of Congress are expecting the President's opening address to deal with the question of whether war shall be declared against Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria. Sentiment in favor of such action is general among members now here.

Work on the appropriation bills has already been begun by the House appropriation committees.

Pre-session activity will include the reopening tomorrow by a Senate privilege and elections sub-committee of investigation of Senator La Follette's alleged disloyal St. Paul speech. An executive session tomorrow of the sub-committee to determine procedure will be followed shortly by examination of witnesses, probably including former Secretary Bryan, during the week.

Admiral Capps presented the flag to Mr. Montgomery, who made a brief address. John C. Boyer, hounded the bugle call as the colors crept up the staff. In chorus the club members sang "The Star-Spangled Banner."

BAN ON SEATTLE TO STAY

Departure of General Greene From Camp to Make No Difference.

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 25.—That there will be any change in policy toward Seattle as the result of the departure of Major-General Greene is emphatically denied in official circles at Camp Lewis today.

The order to leave Seattle will not be changed and the ban will not be lifted," said General Greene, just before his departure. "Seattle will have to make its own suitable place for itself."

When General Greene was told of reports that he had been removed from command of the Ninety-first Division and that General Irons was to take his place permanently, he smiled and said: "There is nothing to it. My trip was ordered and arranged before the ban was put on Seattle."

AVIATORS' WORK BRILLIANT

Total of 1030 German Airplanes Destroyed in Ten Months.

(By the Associated Press.)
GRAND HEADQUARTERS OF THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, Nov. 25.—The brilliant record of the French aviators, including the members of the Lafayette escadrille, for the 10 months ending in October shows that they destroyed 1030 German airplanes over the French lines and 297 over the German lines, whose destruction has been fully confirmed.

The formalities of the ceremony were carried out with every apparent reality and only those who knew the secret understood it was a ruse to effect Miss Romanoff's escape.

"These are strange times in Russia," Mr. Narodny said after stating that the young woman was on the Pacific Ocean, nearing America.

Miss Romanoff Favors Democracy.
Miss Romanoff is coming to the United States to "work in any capacity for the Russian civilian relief."

According to a statement issued here tonight, but she prefers to write "fairy tales," give dramatic performances and talk to the women of America about the terrible conditions now prevailing in Russia.

"Miss Tatiana Romanoff does not care," the statement added, "whether her father or the Romanoff dynasty ever reigns again, but she is very concerned about a strong democratic government, or rather a United States of Russia. She will try to explain to the American people that they should not desert Russia and leave her to the Socialists-adventurers and the Germans, but help her to get united and to work for the allies."

Society's Alma Santed.
The purpose of the Russian Civilian Relief, it was stated, "is to promote and foster mutual understanding, friendly relations and the spirit of brotherly love between the Russian and American peoples; to raise funds, solicit volunteers to aid so far as possible in alleviating the sufferings of the masses affected by the war or revolution and to make a propaganda for the establishment of an immediate stable democratic government and counteract the socialist-adventurers."

The Grand Duchess Tatiana was born in Peterhof in 1897. In August, 1918, it was rumored she would marry Prince Charles of Rumania and her betrothal to the Prince of Wales also was reported on October of the same year, but later denied.

BUMPER YIELDS NOTED

CORN, OATS, SUGAR BEETS, RICE, POTATOES AND TOBACCO LEAD.

Wheat, Rye, Barley and Flaxseed Fall Below Five-Year Average of Production From 1910 to 1915.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Bumper world crops of corn, oats, potatoes, rice, sugar beets and tobacco for this year are shown by estimates of the International Institute of Agriculture at Rome, made public today by the Department of Agriculture. Wheat, rye, barley and flaxseed, however, have fallen below the five-year average of production from 1910 to 1915.

The production of wheat in 17 countries, not including the central powers, will be 1,569,000,000 bushels, 5.6 per cent of the five-year average. Corn raised will amount to 2,212,000,000 bushels, which is 1.4 per cent greater than the average production for the last five years.

Other crops are estimated as follows:

Rye, 147,000,000 bushels; 92.3 per cent.
Barley, 587,000,000 bushels; 96 per cent.
Oats, 2,652,000,000 bushels; 113.9 per cent.
Rice, 70,000,000 bushels; 115.5 per cent.
Flaxseed, 25,000,000 bushels; 69.8 per cent.
Potatoes, 719,000,000 bushels; 112.4 per cent.
Sugar beets, 10,000,000 short tons; 106.6 per cent.
Tobacco, 1,186,000,000 pounds; 120.5 per cent.

COLORADO HONORS ITS DEAD

Body of Former Governor Peabody Lies in State at Capital.

DENVER, Nov. 25.—Denver and Colorado did honor today the memory of James Hamilton Peabody, ex-Governor of Colorado, who died here Friday. Hundreds of persons viewed the body during the two hours it lay in state at the Capitol this morning and joined in the procession which escorted the body to the station for the final journey to Canon City, his former home, where he will take place tomorrow.

Mr. Peabody was 65 years old and was Governor at the time of the labor troubles in the Cripple Creek and Telluride silver camps and Southern Colorado coal fields.
