

MORE BILLIONS TO PUSH WAR NEEDED

Big Collection Task Faces
Congress at Coming
Session.

BOND ISSUES ARE FAVORED

Two Liberty Loans Likely to Be
Floated Within Next Few
Months—Also
Must Have Money.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Congress will have to authorize early in the session convening next Monday means of collecting from the American people between now and July 1 about \$5,000,000,000, in addition to the \$2,500,000,000 from Liberty bonds already authorized but yet to be issued, the \$1,000,000,000 or less expected from war savings campaign and about \$3,000,000,000 from war taxes.

Most congressional leaders believe the \$5,000,000,000 balance must be provided principally by issue of bonds and Secretary McAdoo has told members of Congress that he heartily favors this method. If this plan is finally adopted, the country probably will be called on to absorb two more big Liberty bond issues between February 1 and July 1, aggregating more than \$8,500,000,000. Another big finance question, which will receive the early attention of Congress is the continuance of loans to the allies. If the present rate of extending credits to the allies is continued, the \$7,000,000,000 authorized credits will be exhausted by July 1 and Congress will have to decide whether to continue the loans after that time. Six billion dollars will be required for the fiscal year beginning next July 1, if the rate of \$500,000,000 a month is kept up.

Lawmakers Are Divided.
Wide difference of opinion exists in Congress over the question of whether the bulk of the \$5,000,000,000 should be raised by taxation or bond issues, but those advocating the issue of securities expect strong support from the Administration. They are prepared to argue that the internal revenue bureau already is overburdened with the immense task of creating machinery for collection of the \$3,400,000,000 war revenue expected before July 1 and that great confusion would result from imposition of new taxes before opportunity has been given for the existing levies to adjust themselves to the economic situation.

Taxation advocates are expected to make a fight for establishment of new taxes on certain business lines and for increase of income and excess profits rates. Under the present law, the estimated receipts from incomes is \$1,200,000,000 and from excess profits \$1,250,000,000.

Treasury officials and congressional leaders in charge of the finance programme have no means of knowing at this time what success the war savings plan will meet, but that of them figure on receiving between \$500,000,000 and \$1,000,000,000 of the authorized \$2,000,000,000 total before July 1.

More Certificates Expected.
A number of other issues of Treasury certificates of indebtedness may be looked for. Secretary McAdoo announced tonight, in anticipation of big tax collections next May and June, but these so-called tax certificates are also any which may be issued to prepare the way for future Liberty loans probably will be redeemed before July 1 and consequently play only a minor part in the finance problems facing Congress.

In connection with the taxation legislative programme it is now indicated that Congress will be asked by officials in charge of administering the laws to make a number of amendments to the excess profits tax law. Members of the advisory committee which has been assisting Internal Revenue Commissioner Roper in interpreting the law, feel that it is possible for the executive branch to define what shall be included in "invested capital," for instance, and that further legislation will be required to clarify this and several other sections.

The advisory committee went to work today on its recommendations which will be submitted to Commissioner Roper probably the middle of next week.

CANNON LOOKS FOR ACTION

Former Speaker Says Congress Will
Push War Operations.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Prompt and adequate appropriation by Congress for further prosecution of the war were predicted today by ex-Speaker Cannon upon his return for the new session. "Sentiment as far as I can observe," he said, "is for a vigorous prosecution of the war, to bring it to a successful end as early as possible. The financial needs will be great, both of ourselves and our allies. Of course we can't provide for the whole shoot-out, but Congress will respond adequately to the needs of the situation."

COAL SHORTAGE FELT

While War Boards Quarrel All
Interests Suffer.

MANY MILLS HANDICAPPED

Factories Working on War Orders
Not Running to Capacity in
East and Thousands of
Homes Are Cold.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Nov. 30.—With the fuel administration and the railroads' war board quarrelling over who is to blame for the existing coal shortage throughout the East, nobody, and no official agency is taking any effective step to relieve the shortage. In consequence, steel mills working on war orders are not running full time, other big industries are affected, public utilities in some cities are hampered and thousands of eastern homes are cold because coal is not being delivered.

Up to two weeks ago, the fuel administration proclaimed that there would be no coal shortage and it based these claims on figures showing that coal production this year has been in excess of production in the corresponding months of last year. It overlooked completely the vast increase in the use of fuel, due to the war, due to the demands of factories, railroads, mills and increased exports to Europe. Now the fuel administration, with Winter opening, admits a shortage of 50,000,000 tons, a shortage so small it could not be foreseen a month ago.

Today the fuel administration attributes the big coal shortage to lack of transportation; the railroads, according to the fuel administration, are not moving coal as fast as it is offered and are not furnishing cars for the coal as it is mined. The railroads' board comes back with official figures, showing that the fuel demand will not be

met until the mines produce up to their maximum capacity.

Specifically, official figures show that on an average for the past month coal has been mined at the rate of 10,600,000 tons a week; the full-time capacity of these mines would be 14,600,000 tons a week, or 4,000,000 tons more than is being mined. Going further, the railroads' board cites figures showing that of the weekly deficiency, 1,717,000 tons have been due to car shortage, while 2,283,000 tons is chargeable to inadequate production.

But with these facts seemingly established, the two great agencies entrusted with the duty of solving the fuel problem, instead of providing remedies, are shifting the blame, one to the other and the coal shortage continues.

Mr. Gellatley was born in Scotland, coming to this country when he was 17 years of age. He lived in Wisconsin and California before coming to Benton.

He leaves a widow and five children, Edward, Francis and George C. Gellatley, Mrs. Perry Holdeman, of this city, and William Gellatley, the Sheriff of Benton County.

Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon.

NEWSPAPER MAN, 83, DIES

David W. Higgins, Founder of San
Francisco Call, Succumbs.

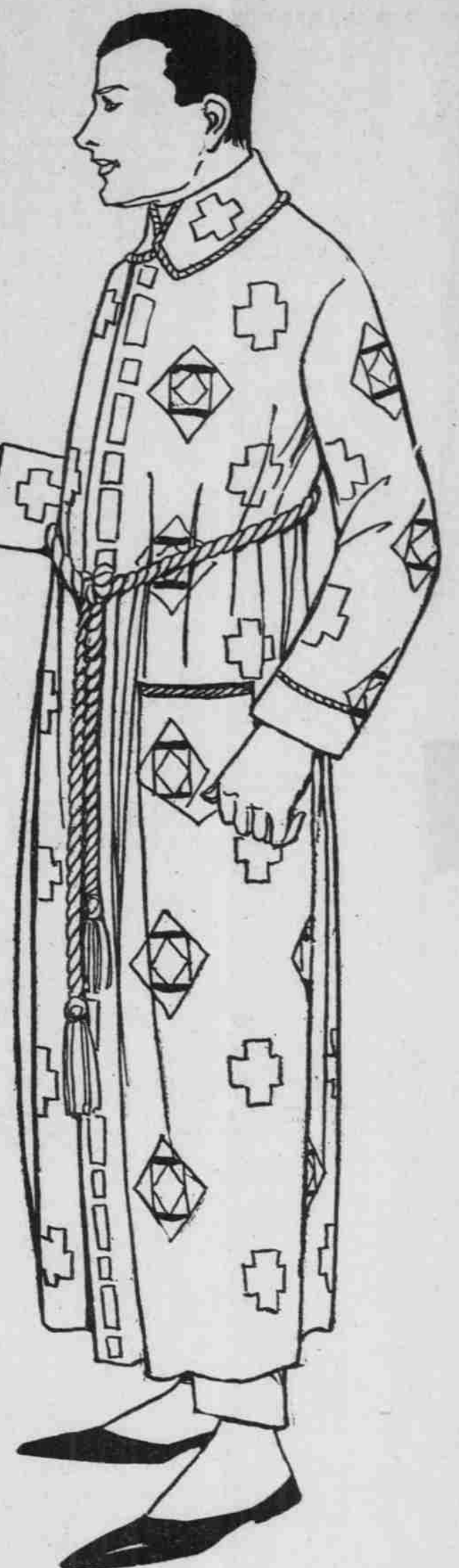
