

HEARD OF GRAIN REGADING

Producers, Warehousemen, Federal Representatives and Millers Confer.

DOCKAGE HELD TOO GREAT

Farmers Assert Vetch in Wheat Inconsiderable and Grades Too Low. 75 Growers Attend; Evidence Goes to Washington.

The possible modification of existing Federal standards for wheat and shelled corn, for the purpose of rectifying any injustice that may exist in the present system of grading, was discussed yesterday at the Hotel Multnomah at a conference of Oregon producers, warehousemen and millers with Federal representatives.

The hearing, one of a series that is being held in every grain-growing district of the United States, was conducted by George Livingston, in charge of the Federal department of grain supervision, assisted by L. M. Jeffers, supervisor in charge of the Portland offices of Federal grain inspectors.

Max H. Houser, Federal grain administrator for the Northwest, appeared before the conference and assured the growers that the government, if referred to his office, would be promptly investigated and justice done.

Mr. Houser asserted his eagerness to aid the growers in securing a proper grade and price for their wheat, and spoke in reply to complaints made by growers who believed that the government have not graded the grain high enough.

Federal Supervisor Explains.

In his opening remarks Mr. Livingston outlined the purpose of the conference. The existing standards have now been in force for sufficient time, he said, to afford an opportunity of considering modifications or amendments suggesting instances in which the present standards may not have met the full requirements of the situation.

Marked interest was manifest at the hearing, and the Federal system of grading was variously discussed by producers and growers. In the main it was conceded to be fair to all concerned, with the exception of grades of wheat based on the mixture of vetch in the grain. The growers thought that the provisions applying to mixed wheat are too severe.

Millers and growers reached a breach of opinion with regard to dockage for the presence of separable and inseparable foreign matter in the grain. The Willamette Valley farmers contended that the grades so determined are too low.

Vetch Held Troublesome.

The presence of vetch in wheat was held by the farmers to be inconceivable and troubling, but milling men constantly contend with the declaration that vetch, although valuable in itself when separated from the wheat, is far more trouble than it is worth and can never be entirely removed. The result, they declared, is the lowering of flour standards through the presence of fine black particles of vetch.

The testimony taken yesterday will be weighed by the department of grain supervision at Washington. If an injustice is found it is the intent of the department to remedy it by a modification of the standards now in effect.

Approximately 75 wheat growers, largely from the Willamette Valley and Eastern Oregon, attended the hearing. The delegation from The Dalles numbered 25.

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STOLEN CAR IS RECOVERED

William St. Clair and Harry Davis Held for California Officers.

Reckless driving of an automobile led to the arrest yesterday afternoon of William St. Clair, 30, and Harry Davis, 18, and the identification of the auto as one stolen recently in California.

Morey, Patrolman Litzberg, flagged the speeding auto at Williams avenue and East Broadway. The boys refused to stop and attempted to run away from the policeman, who overhauled them after a pursuit to East Fifteenth and Broadway.

When the boys and their machine were brought to police headquarters it was found that the numbers had been chiseled from the engine. The single license tag which the machine carried, however, was sufficient to identify it as stolen property.

TWO INJURED BY AUTOISTS

Evelyn Buckner and George Watt Hurt Tuesday Night.

Evelyn Buckner, 20, of 135 Caruthers street, sustained a cut on the head last night when she was struck by an automobile at East Second and Oregon streets. She was taken to the Oregon Hospital for treatment, and went home later.

George Watt, 50, of 45 East Fifteenth street, was knocked down and bruised last night at East Twenty-fourth and Vasco streets by an automobile driven by C. Van Pelt, of 1000 Commercial street North. He was taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital. Mr. Van Pelt reported to the police that he had stepped on the curb in front of the machine, and had been dragged 25 feet.

JOSEPHINE FARMER HELD

A. W. Zollner Arrested on Espionage Act Charge.

A. W. Zollner, a prosperous Josephine County farmer, was arrested at Grants Pass yesterday and released on \$2000 bond for appearance in court on the espionage act. He is charged with having made unpatriotic utterances in the presence of the president, the actives of the Red Cross and the reasons for which the United States entered the war.

When Zollner's case was first reported Deputy United States Attorney Goldstein wrote him a letter and inquired if he had been reported correctly. In reply he stated that he was in the military service and was in the line of duty. Zollner reiterated the statements with which he had been charged. His arrest followed.

RATE HEARING ON TODAY

Interstate Commerce Examiner Will Hear Oregon Men's Protests.

Rates declared to be unjustified on salt from Portland to points in Oregon, Idaho and Washington, and on wheat with rates to the same points from Saltair, Utah, will be aired before Examiner Arthur E. Burton, who is in charge of the hearing, at the Interstate Commerce Commission today. The hearing will be held in the Postoffice building.

Makers of rubber soles and heels also ask for adjustment of freight rates on eastbound shipments of less than carload lots, and reparation will be asked for the shipment of logging machinery between Portland and Vancouver, B. C., in which the through rate charged is said to have increased in the combined intermediate rates.

BROWN REFUSES OPINION

Republican Central Committee Not Considered State Body.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 12.—(Special.)—Edwin Baldwin, secretary of the Republican Central Committee, is advised in a letter mailed by Attorney-General E. B. Anderson, that the committee is not an official state body, he is unable, under the law, to render him an opinion on a number of questions now before the committee. He will, however, be able to proceed in the absence of a chairman.

An act of the Legislature prohibits the attorney-general from rendering a legal opinion except to duly qualified and acting state officers.
