NEW YORK, Jan. 4 .- Preceded by owerful railroad tugs acting as icebreakers, a fleet of ocean-going barges was on its way to New York from New Jersey tidewater points tonight with 50,000 tons of coal. It was expected that half of this supply would be unloaded before morning. If the barges loaded before morning. If the harges arrive without mishap they will be just in time to prevent the closing for lack of fuel of many large office buildings, hotels and apartment-houses.

Many large office buildings will close tomorrow, according to Reeve Schiey, county fuel administrator, unless supplies reach the city during the night.

The use of the Pennsylvania tunnel under the Hudson River to hasten coal into the city has aided somewhat, but has not accomplished as much as was expected

Albert H. Wiggin, state fuel administrator, announced that the Washington authorities had ordered the New Jersey fuel administrators to life the embargo placed on ferry boat transportation of coal, but it had not been done at 6 P. M. It was said a misunderstanding of telegraphic orders from Washington, the meaning of which was not clear to the New Jersey officials, had brought about the interference with New York coal. - Jersey Embargo Continues.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 4.—Pennsylvania, which produces 47 per cent of the coal output of the United States, appealed today through its Federal fuel administrator to the Government to save it from further suffering due to the scarcity of coal to the consumers.
William Potter, Federal fuel administrator for Pennsylvania, said tonight that he expects the director-general of railroads to place an embargo tomorrow on all incoming and outgoing freight in the Philadelphia district ex-cept coal. Congestion Worst in Years.

The railroad congestion in and about Philadelphia is the worst in many rears, it was said.
