WASHINGTON, Jan. 15. - The District Circuit Court here today upheld the right of the Postmaster-General to exclude from the second-class mailing privilege the Milwaukee Leader, un-The proceedings brought by the Mil-waukee Social Democrat Publishing Company, which prints the paper, and of which ex-Representative Victor Berger is a member, were dismissed. It was the first test case of the right of the Government to exclude a news-paper from the mails for violation of the new law.

COAL SCARCE IN GERMANY

Swiss Paper Learns Ammunition Factories at Karlsruhe Close.

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, Jan. 15,-The Gazette says it learns that the German ammunition factories at Karlsshe have been forced to close owing to lack of coal, and that 9000 men and women are out of work. Seven other large towns are affected in a similar
