

WASTE OF FOOD TO BE STOPPED BY LAW

Legislation Launched That Will Enforce Meatless and Wheatless Days.

HOTELS, CAFES TO BE HIT

Rich and Poor to Be Treated Alike. Price-Fixing to Have No Place in Proposed New Regulations Under Consideration.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—Bills to amend the food law so as to empower the food administration to compel observance of wheatless and meatless days, or any other measures it prescribes, were introduced today by Representative Lever and Senator Pomeroy, acting for the administration.

The food situation the world over is acute and demands upon us are growing each day. With a disrupted labor situation, production approaching its maximum, the vital question on, therefore, is one of conservation of foodstuffs.

"We must strike at the waste, and the administration has undertaken to do this through voluntary agreements and has succeeded wonderfully well, but there is a percentage of recalcitrants who have not been able to reach by appeals to their patriotism.

"We propose to reach these under the bill which Senator Pomeroy and I are introducing today.

"The bill is especially aimed at hotels, restaurants and dining cars, public eating places.

"In such establishments, I should think, probably 50 per cent of the food of the country is consumed, and it is in such places that we find the greatest waste. They should be, under the hands of the food administration, to fix the portions of the vital necessities that may be served to any one individual.

"We hope also in this bill to see to it that all classes of people, rich or poor, are treated alike. It is not fair to the man on the street who cannot afford a steak at 40 cents for the gourmandizing who waste enough on one meal to feed a whole family of poor.

"This bill provides that the President is authorized to issue rules and regulations modifying, limiting or prohibiting the sale, use, manufacture or distribution by any person conducting a public eating place or by any manufacturer, producer, carrier, distributor or other person of any foodstuff, feed or material necessary for the production, manufacture or preservation of foodstuffs or feeds.

"This bill is confined to foodstuffs, feeds and materials necessary for the production, manufacture and preservation. There is no idea of price fixing in it."

HOUSE MOURNS GARDNER

Ex-Massachusetts Representative to Have Funeral at Capital.

MASSACHUSETTS, Jan. 15.—Preparations were completed today to take to Washington the body of Major Augustus Peabody Gardner, ex-Massachusetts representative, who died of pneumonia at Camp Wheeler yesterday.

The House, after a brief session today, adjourned in respect to Major Gardner's memory.

In adjourning the House Democratic leader, Kitchin, announced that later, if the family agrees, he will offer a resolution to provide for state funeral services either in the House, Senate or the rotunda of the Capitol.

The death of Major Gardner was announced by Representative Larkin, his successor in the House, who had been his secretary for eight terms in Congress. The holding of state services at the Capitol for a member of the House would break all precedents. It will be determined upon the arrival of Mrs. Gardner.

ROBBERS GET SMALL HAUL

Thieves Enter Montague, California, Bank, but Take Little.

MONTAGUE, Cal., Jan. 15.—(Special.)—An attempted robbery was made on the Montague Bank Sunday night between 11 and 12 o'clock and from the work done it was evident that the robbers were old hands at the business. Entrance was gained by climbing onto a porch in the rear and then crawling through the skylight.

A safe in the vault that was not locked and in which the records of the bank were kept was opened and a watch belonging to Cashier Simon and about 20 in. old gold coins were taken. The robbers overlooked \$700 in small change that had been placed in the safe behind the books.

HUNS MAY DEPORT JEWS

POLISH MINISTERS SAY EMIGRATION SEEMS DESIRABLE.

Statement Made When Hebrew Polish Leaders Demand Freedom Like Brothers in Russia.

THE HAGUE, Jan. 15.—The Jewish correspondents' bureau learns from Berlin that the Polish Ministers of Justice and Foreign Affairs, have conferred with Jewish leaders and members of munition councils regarding the settlement of the Jewish question in Poland.

The Jews told the Ministers that there must be more than a statement by the Premier promising freedom and justice. It was absolutely necessary, they said, that special laws affecting Jews be abolished, as the Jews in Russia had been emancipated by the revolution. Expulsion of Jews in Russia from villages must cease. Jewish quarters in the markets must be abolished, as well as the double tax for hospitals, which is demanded of Jews.

The Ministers replied that the emigration of Jews from Poland seemed desirable, and asked the leaders whether they would co-operate in such a project.

ORCHARD COMPANY ELECTS

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MILWAUKEE LEADER LOSES

Paper Barred From Mails for Violating Espionage Act.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—The District Circuit Court here today upheld the right of the Postmaster-General to exclude from the second-class mailing privileges the Milwaukee Leader, under the terms of the espionage act.

The proceedings brought by the Milwaukee Social Democrat Publishing Company, which owns the paper, and of which ex-representative Victor Berger is a member, were dismissed. It was the first test case of the right of the Government to exclude a newspaper from the mails for violation of the new law.

COAL SCARCE IN GERMANY

Swiss Paper Learns Ammunition Factories at Karlsruhe Close.

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, Jan. 15.—The Gazette says it learns that the German ammunition factories at Karlsruhe have been forced to close owing to lack of coal, and that 9000 men and women are out of work. Several other large towns are affected in a similar manner.

The German government's consignments of coal to Switzerland under the diplomatic arrangement, the newspaper adds, are decreasing monthly, the German government seemingly being unable to spare coal.

Road May Be Widened.

ASTORIA, Or., Jan. 15.—(Special.)—County Roadmaster Rose is making a survey and an estimate of the cost of widening the county road from the Youngs Bay bridge to the Miles Crossing, the work which the county court may undertake during the coming spring. The like on which the road is constructed is only 14 feet wide and the plan is to increase the width to about 26 feet.

Ship Men in Class 3-K.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 15.—(Special.)—The United States immigration law and who are employed in the local shipyards are being given a deferred classification by the district inspection board at Tacoma, as a result of their occupation. The classification is Class 3-K, and is subject to revocation at any time a man leaves the employ of the ship company.

H. A. Metschan Is Back.

H. A. Metschan, of the Imperial Hotel, yesterday returned from an extended visit in New York, "glad to get back." Mr. Metschan, who is a brother of Phil Metschan, Jr., reported his stay at the hotel as a result of the two winter storms which followed one another. Traveling is slow and doubtful at best, he said.

Government Seizes Onions.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 15.—Three hundred tons of onions shipped to Vancouver recently were seized today by the food controller and sent to an evaporating plant. Officials found that the onions were spoiling and made the seizure so that the shipment could be preserved for food purposes.

U-BOATS IN DANGER

Effectiveness of Depth Charge Campaign Conceded.

AIRPLANES DROP BOMBS

"Very Unpleasant for Operators of Submarines," Is Admission Made by Article in German Paper of Recent Date.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—German newspapers, in referring to the Anglo-American measures against submarines, indicate that the employment of the depth charge has been greatly increased and perfected since American destroyers arrived in European waters.

CAPTAIN STEALS \$62,826

Military Authorities Say They Expect to Recover Funds Soon.

CAMP FUNSTON, Kan., Jan. 15.—An official check of the funds of the Army Bank of Camp Funston shows that Captain Lewis Whiler stole \$62,826.21 when he robbed the bank last Friday night and killed four men with an axe and injured a fifth.

U. S. WILL FURNISH SEED

\$1,000,000 SUPPLY TO BE SOLD BY FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.

Professor F. S. Cooley Declares Money Will Not Be Advanced for Purchase of Seed.

BOZEMAN, Mont., Jan. 15.—The United States Government will purchase, through appropriation by Congress, approximately \$1,000,000 worth of seed to be held until spring, when it will be sold for cash to farmers of Montana, North Dakota and Texas, according to a statement made here by Professor F. S. Cooley, who has returned from a conference at Washington of representatives of states affected by drought last season.

County Game Warden Named.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 15.—(Special.)—William A. Thompson, a resident of Vancouver for many years, has been appointed county game warden. He succeeds J. M. Hoff, warden for the past four years, who has resigned.

DENMAN FAILS TO SHOW

EX-SHIPPING BOARD HEAD SAID TO HAVE ULCERATED EYE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—When the Senate commerce committee assembled today to hear William Denman, former chairman of the Shipping Board, word was received that Mr. Denman was in a hospital with an ulcerated eye. Proceedings of the day were held in absence until plans for other witnesses could be made.

Mr. Denman recently requested that he be allowed to present his case. In the letter Mr. Denman declared he would show he was opposed to wooden ship construction and was only driven to the advocacy of building wooden ships by the terrific efficiency of the submarine.

In referring to the alleged testimony holding him responsible for the loss of the 15 ships the Government failed to commandeer because of neglect due to differences between him and General Goethals, Mr. Denman said he wanted to prove that "no loss of any ships arose through any act or omission of either General Goethals or myself."
