

DYNAMITE SENT IN MAIL TO GOVERNOR

Explosive Believed to Have Been Sent to California Executive as Threat Only.

FEDERAL OFFICERS INQUIRE

Latest Outrage Recalls Explosion of December 17 Last at Executive Mansion and Arrest of 55

Alleged I. W. W.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 17.—Federal authorities and the police tonight were searching for the person or persons who, they said, deposited a stick of dynamite addressed to Governor William D. Stephens in a mailbox at the Ferry building here shortly before midnight last Tuesday.

The postal officials said they believed the dynamite had been mailed to the Governor merely as a threat, as no apparent attempt had been made to conceal the fact that the parcel contained an explosive. Moreover, it was pointed out, the stick of dynamite was not equipped with a detonating device such as a clock, percussion caps or fuses.

The recent attempted destruction of Governor Stephens' home in Sacramento, Cal., when a portion of the house was blown up had been followed, it was said, by threats of further violence.

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 17.—The only information received at the Governor's office here concerning the interception in the mail at San Francisco of a bomb addressed to Governor Stephens at the executive mansion was that contained in news dispatches received late today.

Had the explosive reached Sacramento in the mail it probably would have been delivered to the Governor's office at the Capitol, as the executive mansion has not been occupied since the attempted dynamiting of the building, Monday night, December 17.

A police investigation following that explosion resulted in the arrest of 55 alleged members of the I. W. W., who are being held in custody here on charges of violating the espionage act. In the meantime evidence seized in raids on the headquarters here is being prepared for submission to the United States grand jury here.

ITALIANS HOLD THEIR OWN

Austrians Again Driven Back With Losses on Lower Piave.

ITALIAN HEADQUARTERS IN NORTHERN ITALY, Jan. 17.—The enemy has received another bloody repulse on the lower Piave in the sector nearest Venice. Here his attack was thrown back after four hours of desperate fighting.

The enemy suffered heavy losses, the ground being strewn with his dead. The Italians captured 150 prisoners and a large quantity of guns and war material.

LONDON, Jan. 17.—"We carried out a successful raid last night north of St. Quentin," the War Office reports. "The enemy's artillery was active in the Tynes sector."

"The delegation takes note of the declaration that the Russian government, from the fact that the occupied regions having belonged to the former Russian imperial empire, does not draw any conclusions which would impose any political obligations upon the peoples of these territories in relation to the Russian republic and the old frontiers of the former Russian empire—frontiers established by acts of force and crime against such peoples, and especially against Polish people, have disappeared, together with Czarism."

The Austro-Germans, the statement declares, do not intend incorporating the territories now occupied by them into their respective countries.

Withdrawal of the Austrian and German troops from the occupied territories while the war lasts, is impossible, the statement says.

BIG BATTLE RAGES IN ODESSA

Bolshevik and Ukrainians Clash and Fleet Bombarbs City.

LONDON, Jan. 17.—A pitched battle has occurred in the streets of Odessa between Ukrainian and Bolshevik troops, according to a dispatch received from Petrograd and forwarded by Reuters Limited. The Ukrainians held the theater building and posted machine guns in nearby streets. The shooting soon spread throughout the city. The chief of the Bolshevik troops was wounded mortally.

A battleship and other warships in the roadstead opened fire on the town. Accounts of the battle differ as to whether the Bolsheviks have taken the arsenal.

CAMP SWINDLE SCENTED

OPERATORS OF SOLDIER STORES ACCUSED OF CONSPIRACY.

Joseph Ruhlman and Captain Robinson Alleged to Have Defrauded U. S. Government.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 17.—The case of Joseph F. Ruhlman, indicted today by the Kansas City, Kan., Federal Court here today in connection with an alleged swindle in the purchase of Army supplies at Camp Funston, Kan., today was continued to the April term of court in Topeka, Kan.

Ruhlman, who is indicted jointly with Captain C. W. Robinson, now held at Camp Funston, is alleged to have had the camp store at the disposal of the army.

The indictments charge that Ruhlman and Robinson conspired together to make a swindle of the government, and that they conspired to defraud the government of revenue by representing that the goods purchased for the camp store of which Robinson was in charge, were all for the government, and therefore not subject to the war tax.

N. ROMANOFF ESCAPES?

EX-CAZAR AND FAMILY REPORTED TO BE AT LIBERTY.

Petrograd Hears Unconfirmed Story of Flight From Prison Quarters Near Tobolsk.

LONDON, Jan. 17.—Nicholas Romanoff, the former Emperor, and his family, have escaped from their prison near Tobolsk, it is reported in Petrograd, according to a Reuters dispatch from the Russian capital. The report, the dispatch adds, lacks confirmation.

Nicholas Romanoff and his family were removed to Tobolsk by the Kerensky government last August. In October the Romanoffs were taken to the Monastery, some distance outside Tobolsk.

The executive committee of the Congress of Peasants' Deputies on January 15 adopted a resolution urging that the former Emperor be taken to Kronstadt or Petrograd.

A dispatch from Amsterdam on January 16 reported that German papers had said the former Emperor had become insane and was confined in a sanitarium at Tobolsk.

Interment was made in Mount Scott Park Cemetery. Mr. Mackenzie is survived by his wife, Mrs. Lillian Mackenzie; a daughter, Miss Dorothy, and a brother and sister, who are in Toledo, O.

and which he contended it was essential the House should know. He asked for a secret session. Premier Lloyd George intimated his acquiescence and the galleries were cleared.

Andrew Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced in the House of Commons today that the British government had arranged to take over the payment of Russian credits and treasury bills maturing this month in exchange for three-year exchequer bonds at par.

At the present market value the exchequer bonds are worth about 85. The effect of the government's programme is that the treasury insures the holders of these bills against loss at a premium of 15 per cent.

Huge Sum Involved.

The total cost to the government, the Chancellor said, would be £11,500,000.

The bills for which the British government has assumed responsibility, according to the announcement of Bonar Law, are treasury bills issued on behalf of Russia through the Bank of England, which mature January 25, and bills drawn under a credit commercial arrangement by the Russian Finance Minister through the Bank of England in 1915.

Mr. Bonar Law explained that the government had no direct responsibility in the matter but in view of the serious consequences to holders and acceptance of these bills through the financial disturbance between England and Russia, the government had decided to assume their rights against the drawers and guarantors.

"HAMLET" GIVEN IN ARTISTIC HANDLER

Presentation of Shakespearean Play at Heilig Is Thoroughly Satisfying.

COMPANY'S WORK IS LIKED

Portrayal of Principal Roles by John E. Kellard Is Pleasing and Full of Naturalness, Character Being Made Loveable One.

Carefully studied and extremely interesting is the artistry of John E. Kellard in the tragic role of "Hamlet" in which he and a capable company opened an engagement in Shakespeare's repertoire last night at the Heilig.

Mr. Kellard's "Hamlet" is one of excellent understanding and infinite variety. He gives us a thoughtful and scholarly Hamlet, a deliberate, mature and intelligent painting of Shakespeare's poet philosopher. There is a seasoned quality about his work and a sincere poetical insight.

The artists who have brought for our pleasure their interpretation of Hamlet are many and each season sees its quota.

Robert Mantell's Hamlet is a robust chap, quite mad and with vengeance overshadowing any quality of grief he may hold in his madness; Forbes Robertson's Hamlet was a beautiful, sexy, wholly somber and morose mental figure. Sothorn's Hamlet is picturesque and gloom-ridden. To go further back entails a list of Hamlets, for they are many, and these are of a latter day.

Role Made Loveable.
Mr. Kellard's Hamlet is a dignified one and intensely human withal. He makes the role lovable and manly, and certainly not a mad Hamlet. He is quite an authoritative hold, that Shakespeare created him, a mystic poet, dreamer, thrust suddenly into situations where his own searching mind is forced to sit in judgment on every phase of human existence, with material and spiritual powers in constant struggle for supremacy in his consciousness, obsessed of a longing to draw aside the curtains and peer beyond and yet held back in fear of what lies beyond.

Mr. Kellard makes his Hamlet a universal figure, typifying meditative mankind. One senses it in his reading of the lines, in his exquisite understanding and discursive use of the poetic passion and sincerity of purpose. His quality in Mr. Kellard's art is possibly the most dominant in his interpretation. It invests the role with an authority and a sense of intimate contact with the author's and the actor's minds.

Mr. Kellard's reading of the famous soliloquies were characterized with naturalness and freedom from extravagance. His scenes with Ophelia were marked by tenderness and his dramatic scenes with the guilty Queen Gertrude when he pours into her ears all his thoughts, fears, reflections, superstitions and horrors that possess his troubled soul, are pitched in a powerful dramatic key. In marked contrast to these are his playful and oftentimes sarcastic humor with Polonius and his air of deep cunning with the Players.

Company Is Adequate.
Physically Mr. Kellard is of slender build, of rapid, nervous energy, of superior intelligence even unto intellectual, and endowed with a poetic passion and sincerity of purpose. His company is adequate. Margaret Bulkeley is tenderly appealing as Ophelia, and Georgiana Wilson as Queen Gertrude was a picturesque and dramatic figure. A splendid Polonius, invested with a rare and delightful comedy presence, was contributed by Charles A. Smiley. Walter Hubbell's reading of the Ghost speech was excellent, and Arthur Seaton as the gravedigger qualified in the famous role.

Tonight Mr. Kellard's company will present "Macbeth." On Saturday afternoon "The Merchant of Venice" will be given, and Saturday night "Othello" is the bill.

JACK DUNDURE TO MANAGE UNIVERSITY YEAR BOOK.
