

WOOD SHIP PLANS ARE CALLED FOR

Senator Jones Asks "Show-Down" on Shipping Board Programme for Coast.

INDUSTRY SHOULD BE TOLD

President of Tacoma Shipbuilding Company Testifies He Stands Ready to Build Eight Vessels, but Cannot Get Contracts.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Jan. 17.—Senator Jones, in the commerce committee today, called for a "showdown" on the wood ship programme of the Shipping Board, so far as it relates to the Pacific coast, and in response to his demand James O. Heyworth, in charge of wood ship construction, will be called before the committee to state specifically the plans of the Board for the future.

Senator Jones was moved to make his demand after H. A. Rhodes, president of the Tacoma Shipbuilding Company, had testified today that he has been unable to get any additional contracts, notwithstanding he stands ready, at his own expense, to install eight additional vessels in his yards at Tacoma, if the Board will give him contracts.

Industry Entitled to Know. By another official he was told that future wood ship contracts will be let only as present contracts are being completed. Senator Jones said the shipbuilding industry of the Pacific Coast is entitled to know exactly what it may expect, and the country is entitled to know whether or not the wood shipbuilding programme is practically closed, or whether all available resources are being used as long as the emergency continues. Mr. Heyworth is the one official who can state the policy.

As a means to expanding the wood ship programme on the Pacific Coast, Senator McNary today wrote Chairman Hurley calling attention to the fact that there will be need for transportation for 25,000 tons of freight to Alaska during the coming season, supplies for the Government railroad, in addition to normal supplies, and need for tonnage to bring coal, fish and minerals from Alaska. He suggests the building of further wooden craft for handling this business.

Random Not to Get Contracts. Representative Hawley today received a letter from Mr. Heyworth, of the Shipping Board, advising that "it does not appear advisable under existing conditions to undertake ship construction at Bandon."

Reply to a letter from Mr. Hawley urging that opportunity be given to build wooden ships for the Government at that point.

Investigation. It would be difficult to get labor and certain classes of lumber to Bandon if shipyards were established there.

Camp Lewis Notes.

Second Lieutenant T. H. Boyd, 14th Infantry, is named as advocate of the court-martial, and Second Lieutenant Floyd B. Bryant, 14th Field Artillery, will act as assistant judge advocate.

Three hundred and six officers in the reserve lists were made happy today on being assigned to duty in the National Army at Camp Lewis. Most of these officers have been at camp for some time waiting to be assigned and doing whatever they could. Some of them have been in the hospital, and some of them have been in the line of duty.

Emil Joseph Doucet, a private in the 14th Infantry, today was ordered discharged from Camp Lewis. Doucet alleged he was a Swiss citizen.

SCHOOL DISTRICT IS ASKED TO HELP

Assumption of Share of Cost of Library Service Requested.

MISS ISOM STATES CASE

Chief Librarian Holds That Board Should Pay Portion of Salaries of Assistants Assigned to Various Schools.

Need for a change in the relation of Portland schools to the Public Library was voiced yesterday afternoon by Mary F. Isom, chief librarian, at a meeting of the School Board, when Miss Isom declared that the Library Association is seriously hampered for funds and asked that the School District assume half of the salary expense of librarians now assigned to local schools.

Miss Isom spoke of the supplementary work of the Library with the schools, referring to the request for an extension of the service to the Benson Polytechnic School and told the Directors that it was impossible to grant the request owing to the limited resources of the Library Association at this time. A letter from W. E. Ayer, President of the Library Board, setting forth this position, was read.

Under the present system the Public Library maintains branches in four Portland high schools, at a combined salary expense of \$4100 per year. If the establishment of a branch in the Benson Polytechnic is granted, the total salary expense for the five schools would be \$5180.

Director Asked to Help. That the School District, in recognition of the value of such co-operation, pay one-half the salaries of school librarians, or \$2500, and that the Library Association defray the other half, was the proposal presented by Miss Isom.

Chairman Smith, of the School Board, in referring the proposition to the educational committee for investigation, said that the Directors would do their best to devise a remedy.

The recent ruling to regulate the salaries of night school principals on the basis of attendance was contested by L. Pratt, principal of the James John night school, who told the Board that he had been in the employ of the district for 25 years, only to find himself suddenly deprived of the maximum salary by the new ruling. Principal Pratt contended that he had no control over the attendance at night school, which was certain to fluctuate more or less, and asked for consideration of his case, which will be investigated in committee.

Cost of Time Also Rises. The high price of time came up for discussion when a proposal was presented from Isaac E. Staples, jeweler, to replenish the district's supply of clocks, same kind and quality, than the ones destroyed by the fire.

Before the war such clocks sold at \$4.30. It was unanimously agreed that Portland schools would continue to use the timepieces now installed.

As final adjustment of the contract of the Friberg-McLennan Company for the construction of the Benson Polytechnic School was agreed to, the compromise proposal and allow \$1200 for extras claimed by the contracting firm, waiving all penalties for non-completion of the work specified, thus escaping litigation and expense.

SPokane Gets Contract

\$125,000 Order Placed With Halldale Machine Company.

SPokane, Wash., Jan. 17.—(Special.)—Spokane has been given a contract amounting to more than \$125,000 for building deck machinery and equipment for shipbuilders of the Coast. The award comes from three different concerns to the Halldale Machine Company and was secured by E. L. Lee, sales manager of the company.

The Halldale Machine Company is enlarging its equipment and is employing additional skilled labor. The largest contract received by the company is from the Canadian government. The contract price is \$22,000 and is for deck machinery to the value of \$125,000 will go to Portland from the machine shops of this company to equip the Canadian auxiliary schooner, General.

Orders are for the Columbia Engineering company, which has built eight boats since May 1.

ARMED GERMAN IS JAILED

Ed Brunzel, Florist, Has Shotgun, Rifle and Revolver in Home.

Edward Brunzel, a florist, residing at Tremont station on the Mount Scott carline, yesterday was arrested by Deputy United States Marshal Tichenor on a charge of having a shotgun, rifle and revolver in his home in violation of the President's proclamation with respect to the conduct of alien enemies during the war. Brunzel is said to be a German citizen and is the first man to be arrested here for an infraction of this particular Federal regulation. Assistant United States Attorney Rankin last night telegraphed the Attorney-General at Washington for authority to intern Brunzel.

At Brunzel's home at 6904 Sixty-fourth avenue, Deputy Marshal Tichenor found a shotgun, rifle and a revolver. The firearms were seized and Brunzel was lodged in jail.

CHARGE IS DENIED

Jitneys Not Controlled by Car Company, Says Carver.

McGINN IS CONTRADICTED

President of Trackless Car Company Makes Statement in Answer to Public Assertions of Judge on Question.

It is up to ex-Circuit Judge McGinn to prove the assertions that he made in the meetings that the Portland Trackless Car Company, who has been granted city-wide jitney franchises in Portland, is connected with or controlled by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company.

Stephen Carver, who is president of the Portland Trackless Car Company, yesterday made a public offer to Judge McGinn or anyone else, to pay to any charity the newspapers of the city may name, a fund of \$500 if it can be proved that there is any connection whatever between the two companies. Mr. Carver asserts that he is being made a goat by the proposition.

Mr. Carver says that the political motive behind these "jits" is to force him to resign. He says that he has not started jitney service before now is because the City Council has not finally acted on the bonds to be furnished by Mr. Carver to protect the public riding on his jitneys. He declares he owns no stock in the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, and is not interested in or controlled by the Portland Company.

Mr. Carver's statement and offer in the proposition are as follows: Of late there has been considerable notoriety and publicity given to the claims that the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, in its capacity as the Portland Trackless Car Company, is connected with or controlled by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. I have done everything in my power to furnish satisfactory bonds to the city, and as soon as it is approved the service will be started at once. I have further shown my good faith by the bonds guaranteed operation, which bonds would be forfeited to the city if I do not operate. What more could anyone do? So far in life I think I have a good record for carrying out an enterprise that I have undertaken, and it is decidedly unpleasant to be made a goat by people who are making grandstand plays to the public for evident political purposes.

To that end, I will gladly donate the sum of \$500 to any charity to be named by the newspapers of Portland if anyone can show that there is any community of interest in any way between the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company and the Portland Trackless Car Company, which last process is operated through the streets of Portland, either directly or indirectly, except as both

would be interested in a general way in having their capital conserved and protected by fair treatment.
