

## AUSTRIA'S CABINET GIVES UP ITS TASK

Von Toggenburg Ordered by  
Crown to Select New Set  
of Ministers.

## STRIKE TROUBLES SPREAD

People of Dual Empire Insist on  
Early Peace—Entire Transport  
of Buda-Pest Tied Up; Food  
Problem Is Urgent.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 21.—The Austrian Ministry has resigned, according to a Vienna dispatch to the Berliner Morgen Post.

Count von Toggenburg, Minister of the Interior, has been charged with the task of forming a new Cabinet.

The brief Vienna dispatch does not make it absolutely clear which of the Ministries has resigned, the Imperial Ministry, of which Count Cernin is the head, holding the portfolio of Minister of Foreign Affairs, or the minor body of which Dr. von Seydler is president.

But the fact that Count von Toggenburg, who held the post of Minister of the Interior in the von Seydler Cabinet, has been asked to organize a new Ministry, would indicate that it is the latter.

**Crisis Recently Rumored.**  
Recent dispatches from Vienna reported a crisis in the Austrian Cabinet. Dr. von Seydler being opposed not only by the Czechs and the South Slavs, but also by the Socialists, while the German deputies also were hostile owing to von Seydler's weak attitude.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The strike movement is spreading throughout Austria-Hungary, and it is associated with a demand for immediate peace, according to dispatches received from London from Swiss and Dutch sources.

A general strike was declared at Budapest on Friday, when the entire transport system came to a standstill, while from all parts of the dual empire strikes and demonstrations are reported.

**Socialists State Terms.**  
The Socialist party of Austria has published a declaration stating that the workmen will only calm down when the government can undertake that it will not allow the negotiations at Brest-Litovsk to break down on the territorial question and that the system of food distribution will be reorganized.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 21.—In the lower House of the Hungarian Parliament, Premier Kerkeli, a Budapest dispatch reports, said in reply to a question that the government adhered to the principle of peace without annexations or indemnities and that this standpoint was shared by every organ of the monarchy, above all by the King.

**Alsace-Lorraine Barred.**  
The Premier intimated that his question should not have touched on the subject of Alsace-Lorraine, saying his remarks were not calculated to strengthen the government's position.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 21.—A Vienna dispatch under Saturday's date received here today reads:  
"No newspapers appeared today, the only issue being a sheet published by the Arbeiter Zeitung, which contained nothing but announcements regarding the strike and peace developments."

"At the head of the announcements was one by the directing board of the German Socialist Democracy of Austria, making an appeal to the workers of both sexes."

"The board, said the appeal, had taken cognizance with satisfaction of declarations regarding peace by Count Cernin (Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister) and recognized their firmness."

**Appeal Made to Labor.**  
"The appeal concludes:  
"Labor has maintained exemplary discipline in these exciting days. The party board expects it will calmly await the result of the negotiations with the government, trusting in its representatives."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Labor disturbances in Austria are described as political rather than economic in official dispatches received here today. The demands made upon the government in the statement of the committee of directors of the Socialist party of Austria are as follows:

First—Formal assurance that the negotiations at Brest-Litovsk will not

run the risk of failure because of territorial exigencies of any kind.  
Second—Complete reform in the provisioning system.  
Third—An immediate proposal of a bill establishing universal equal and direct suffrage in the communal elections.  
Fourth—Annulment of the measures which have been taken to militarize the work of the factories and which have deprived the laborer of all his rights.

Count von Seydler, in a long statement, declared that the government would do its utmost to obtain a general peace and that it did not wish for an increase of territory at the expense of Russia.

Regarding Poland he asserted that Austria-Hungary would regard it as an independent state and that it did not wish to dictate its constitutional form or to impose forced relations.

The lower courts held that the passage of the Jones act by Congress granting American citizenship to Porto Ricans was the final act incorporating that insular possession in the United States as an organized territory. Representatives of the island government contended that, despite the grant of American citizenship, the Jones act purposely avoided stipulating that the whole of the Federal Constitution was applicable there.

The proceedings resulted from the release of Carlos Tapia and Jose Muratti, charged with murder, the lower court holding that under the Constitution they could not be held for trial except under indictments.

**Progress of the War.**  
The crisis in Austria, arising from the discontent of the people over the continuation of the war, to the scarcity of food and a general desire for peace, has resulted in the resignation of the Austrian Cabinet.

For weeks there has been bitter opposition to the government on the part of the people, and during the last few days this has resulted in nation-wide strikes and some disturbances.

The internal strife in Austria, which apparently is due chiefly to war weariness, the high cost of living and the dislocation generally of economic life, continues to be of absorbing interest.

Although the exact situation resulting from the troubled times is not given in the extremely meager details available, the dispatches that have crept through are indicative of a situation that will require skillful handling by the authorities again to bring the dissatisfied populace to a state of tractability.

No newspapers in Vienna were permitted last Saturday. The only publication allowed was a single sheet bulletin, which told some of the details of the nation-wide strike, and developments in the peace discussions at Brest-Litovsk. As usual, the hand of the German propagandists was seen in this one-sheet publication, for the chief announcement in it was from the German social democracy of Austria. This lay stress on last year's declaration of the Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, Count Cernin, that the central powers were ready to make an immediate general peace, without annexations or indemnities.

Evidently, however, this statement failed to placate the strikers in Vienna, who sent a large delegation to wait upon the Food Minister to inform him of conditions among the working classes and to impress on him that their desire for peace overshadowed and took precedence over all other demands.

In Hungary also the people are endeavoring to ascertain what are the prospects for a cessation of hostilities and a return to normal life. So insistent has been their effort in this direction that the Hungarian Premier has been forced to announce in the lower house of Parliament that the government adhered to the principle of peace without annexations or indemnities; that even the King shared in this view. The Premier, however, added that the question of Alsace-Lorraine should not be at the present time enter into the situation, as it was not calculated to strengthen the government's position.

**INDIANS NEED MORE FUNDS**  
Large Appropriation for Klamath Falls Reservation Sought.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Jan. 21.—Oregon Legislators at Washington are making an effort to get the appropriation for the Indians of the Klamath Indian reservation this year increased from \$200,000 to at least \$300,000. It is believed that at least this amount is essential to the needs of the reservation at this time.

Congressman N. J. Sinnott has been working assiduously on the matter and a wire received by the Klamath Commercial Club today from Senator Charles McNary declares that, as a member of the committee on Indian affairs, he is endeavoring to secure the needed amount.

**MINERS BACK GARFIELD**  
MAXIMUM COAL PRODUCTION IS PROMISED BY WORKERS.

Delegates Pass First Day of Convention in Discussion of Matters Important to Organization.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 21.—Union mine workers, in convention here, spent the first "heatless" Monday in the consideration of matters pertaining largely to the welfare of their organization. They started the day by giving to Dr. H. A. Garfield, National Fuel administrator, their "unqualified support and co-operation in his great task," and pledged to him the maximum production of coal possible in the fields where the miners are organized.

The 3000 local unions were requested to appoint naturalization committees for the purpose of encouraging foreign-born members of the organization to become American citizens. Disposition of cases now in the Federal courts was referred to a special committee to formulate a policy to meet the issues involved.

This committee will bring in what the union leaders consider an important report. It is made up of nine district presidents, as follows: John Moore, Ohio; Frank Patterson, Illinois; Phil Murray, Western Pennsylvania; John Wilkinson, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas; Edward Stewart, Indiana; C. F. Keeney, West Virginia; John Brophy, Central Pennsylvania; Thomas Kennedy, Eastern Pennsylvania (anthracite); Martin J. Flyzik, Washington state.

Some of the delegates tried to start a fight against continuing the salary of \$5000 a year paid to John P. White,

former president of the United Mine Workers. Last Fall White resigned as president to become labor adviser to Dr. Garfield, and the international board of the union continued White's salary for the period of the war. White receives \$1 a year from the Government. The convention overwhelmingly indorsed the action of the board in continuing White's salary.

Among the resolutions adopted was one favoring old age pensions. Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, will address the convention tomorrow afternoon.

**NEW POWER PLANT OPENS**  
Copco Unit of California-Oregon Company Begins Operation.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Jan. 21.—(Special.)—A total of 15,000 additional horsepower was hatched onto the transmission line of the California-Oregon Power Company, of this city, about 11 o'clock yesterday morning, when the big switch connecting the new Copco plant was turned.

The new Copco plant is declared to be peculiarly well situated for the purpose of supplying electric power to the territory served by the company in Southern Oregon and Northern California as it is near the center of the district and radiates lines in four directions.

The advantage to Klamath Falls will be at once apparent and this district will not be partially dependent upon the plants across the mountains, as heretofore.

**Ten Meat Trains Daily Eliminated.**  
OMAHA, Neb., Jan. 21.—Government operation of railroads has eliminated 10 fresh meat trains daily between Omaha and Chicago and where formerly 12 meat trains were operated every day between this city and Chicago, but two such trains now are run. The running time of the trains has been lengthened from 27 hours to 42 hours per trip.

**Keet Baby Kidnapers Sentenced.**  
MARSHFIELD, Mo., Jan. 21.—Taylor Adams and his son, Cletus Adams, charged with kidnaping baby Lloyd Keet and abducting him to Springfield, Mo., were sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary and Cletus Adams to ten years.

## BRITISH SAVE FOES

Crew Survivors of Cruiser Midullu Rescued.

## GOEBEN STILL UNDER FIRE

Aircraft Hurl Bombs at War Craft Stranded in Narrows—Both Vessels Brought to Disaster by Encountering Mines.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—One hundred and seventy-two members of the crew of the Turkish cruiser Midullu, formerly the German Breslau, were rescued after the action between British and Turkish forces at the entrance to the Dardanelles, the British warship was sunk. It was officially announced tonight.

Of the total of 210 men on the British monitor Raglan and the small monitor M-25, lost in the action, there are at present reported 152 survivors, the announcement states.

Both the Breslau and the cruiser Sultan Selim, the former German Goeben, the other Turkish vessel engaged, were mined, the statement adds.

The Goeben is now being continuously bombed by British aircraft in the Narrows of the Strait, where she stranded after she hit the mine.

The Goeben and the Breslau, the statement explains, had emerged from the Dardanelles on Sunday morning to attack British naval forces north of the island of Imbros. After the Italian and the small monitor had been sunk, the Breslau was forced into a British mine field.

The Goeben headed at full speed toward the Dardanelles, striking a mine near the entrance.

Turkish destroyers, coming to the assistance of the Breslau, were engaged by British destroyers and driven off.
