Mr. Kellaher alone voting for it. The Council 'mem-hers agreed, however, that they would support a proposal to submit the ques-tion to the vote of the people at a spe-cial city election in April. "It is true the people voted two to "It is true the people voted two to one for the measure as adopted, but, judging from expressions heard now, the vote now would go nine to one the other way. The streetcar company ought to have compatition. The jitneys can be regulated under the traffic laws of the state and the city. I wish to compliment Mayor Baker on the fine way private machines have been regu-lated under these ordinances, and I be-lieve, judging from this experience, that he can regulate the jitneys to as good effect."

"That measure was passed by the people," replied Mr. Kellaher. "I do not believe in interfering with acts of the people, even though they may have been led into a trap."
