BAR FIXTURES TO BE DESTROYED.
 District Judge Bell yesterday signed an order authorizing Sheriff Hurlburt to destroy all bar fixtures which have been used at Holly Lodge, a resort which has been raided numerous times as a bootlegging resort. Under the prohibition law all fixtures in a place condemned as a common nuisance can be destroyed.

GRANGES ARE PROSPERING
 Sherwood Meeting Interesting One and Well Attended.

SHERWOOD, Or., Jan. 28.—(Special.)
 Washington County Grange meets at Sherwood January 31, with about 175 present from all parts of the county. There were also several grangers from Clatsop, Clackamas and Marion counties to join in the festivities. At the morning session reports

were read from the subordinate granges, all showing a healthy condition. The fact was brought out that seven of the 12 granges in the county own their halls, and another is planning to build soon.
 At dinner time Mr. Hoover was quite forgotten, except that chicken was the only meat eaten. At the afternoon session a number of resolutions were adopted, among them one objecting to any affiliation between the granges and the labor unions, on the ground that the cost of the war is being greatly increased by the demands of the unions. Another resolution called for a meeting of grangers to find some remedy for present unsatisfactory marketing conditions.
 An interesting talk was given by N. C. Jamison, county agricultural agent, on the work being done by him. The use of molasses as a dairy cow feed, he said, has proved highly satisfactory. He also told of attempts being made to exterminate Canada thistles, and moles and gophers as well. Extensive experiments in the use of fertilizers and lime are to be made this year.
 In the evening an entertainment was given, consisting of recitations, songs and a quartet and violin solos. A class of 23 was initiated for the fifth degree.

FULTON FUNERAL TODAY

SERVICES TO BE HELD AT FAMILY RESIDENCE AT 2 O'CLOCK.

Interment Will Be Made at Oceanview Cemetery, Astoria; Lawyers to Attend in Body.

Funeral services for Charles W. Fulton, ex-United States Senator from Oregon, who died Sunday afternoon, will be held at the family residence, 636 Weidner street, at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Thomas A. McBride, Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court, will deliver the oration and Dr. Joshua Stansfield, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church of this city will assist in the ceremonies.

The body will be at the family residence until 4 P. M. today, so that his friends may view his face for the last time and tomorrow morning it will be removed to the North Star funeral home and placed aboard a special train, bound for Astoria, which place will be reached about 1 o'clock. An escort of Elks from Portland will accompany the body and at Astoria, where Mr. Fulton lived and first came into prominence, the local lodge of the order will meet and escort the remains to Oceanview Cemetery, for interment.

Jay Bowerman, law partner of the deceased, yesterday designated Judge Robert Tucker and W. M. Davis, president of the Multnomah Bar Association, to arrange the details of the funeral. They have requested that all lawyers meet at the Courthouse at 1 o'clock this afternoon with their automobiles and go to the services in a body.

As presiding Circuit Judge, J. P. Kavanaugh has appointed Judge McBride, Charles H. Carey, Jay Bowerman, John H. Hall and John C. McCreas as a memorial committee from the Bar Association.
 Mr. Fulton died as the result of illness covering a period of several months. He was a distinguished lawyer and practiced his profession here for several years, after serving his term in the United States Senate. He was for many years a leading figure in the politics of the state and served four terms in the Legislature.

ARMENIAN NEEDS TOLD

REV. M. B. PAROUNAGIAN SPEAKS FOR RELIEF FUND.

Native of Armenia Gives His Time to Aid of Cause; Tour of State Made and Response Is Praised.

The story of devastated Armenia and her ravished, starving and murdered peoples is being painted in broad strokes this week in Portland by means of addresses by Rev. M. B. Parounagian, a native Armenian, Sunday school missionary for the Oregon conference of the Methodist Church. Rev. Parounagian has been invited by the Conference to the Portland division of the American committee on Armenian and Syrian relief, for the period of the drive in Oregon and he arrived in Portland Saturday, after a fortnight spent throughout the state, where he organized several counties and got the work well started.
 "I am more rejoiced than I can tell you that my church has released me to help in this great humanitarian work which you American people are doing for the Armenian brothers and sisters in Armenia. Although I have been in this country for 18 years—my wife is a New England woman—and I am a naturalized American citizen, I still love my people and I hope my

message to the Portland people this week will help to awaken them to the great need for immediate and generous giving to this most noble enterprise.
 Rev. Parounagian spoke last week in Enterprise, Walla Walla, Joseph, Baker City, La Grande, Prairie City and The Dalles, organizing committees and receiving large cash donations. He is loud in his praise of the generosity of the people with whom he has met.
 On Sunday he was heard at addresses at the Vernon Presbyterian Church, the Highland Baptist Church and the Waverly Heights Congregational Church. Monday he addressed the meeting of the Episcopal clergy of the city. This evening he will speak from 8 to 8:30 at the Y. W. C. A. and at noon today he will be heard at the Rotary Club.

Mrs. R. S. M. Enrich, chairman of the California division of the American committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief, will arrive this morning from Spokane and she will address a public meeting in the Municipal Auditorium Wednesday evening.

WHITE IS IN FRANCE

Former Adjutant-General Carries Wife He Is Across.

OREGON BOYS WIN PRAISE

Mrs. George A. White, Who Visited Husband in Camp, Says Western Soldiers Make Fine Impression on People in the East.

"Have gotten 'over there' safely and will write you very soon when we get settled around. Feeling fine and getting fat."
 That cheering message received yesterday by Mrs. George A. White, of Portland, brought the news that her husband, Major George White, former Adjutant-General of the Oregon National Guard, now a Major and Adjutant-General in the Army, had arrived safely in France.
 The message relieved much anxiety for Mrs. White knew her husband had sailed, having been with him at Camp Merritt, N. J., until the day before the departure.

Family Visits Army Man.
 Mrs. White went East with her two children to be with her husband three months ago. She lived near Camp Merritt, where the troops were stationed there and when they were transferred to Camp Merritt she went there. She returned to Portland about a week ago. "I am more proud than I can say of our Oregon Men," said Mrs. White. "They have made a fine name for themselves wherever they have been stationed. It is not because I am an Oregonian that I say they were the finest body of troops at Camp Merritt and later at Camp Merritt, for it was a fact admitted by everyone there. Regular Army officers were warm in their praises of the soldierly qualities of the Oregon troops."

"The people at the places where they were stationed all liked them. It did me good to hear such fine things said of the sturdy young men from Oregon. And never once did I hear of a soldier soldiering himself other than as a soldier and a gentleman. They showed their splendid training and discipline."

Major White First.
 As Adjutant-General of the Oregon National Guard Major White gained the name of being the man who put the "first" in "Oregon first." During his incumbency of that office Oregon was the first state to mobilize its troops last March in response to the President's first call for men shortly before war was declared.

It was the first Adjutant-General to be able to report that the regiment from his state was recruited up to full strength. Before orders came from Washington to bring regiments up to full strength, he had a recruiting campaign in progress that quickly filled the ranks of the Third Oregon.
 As Adjutant-General, Major White was in charge of the execution of the selective service law in this state. Again Oregon was one of the first states in completing its war census and later in sending its first draft contingents to the mobilization camp.
 General E. A. Crowder, Provost Marshal General, in his report, called particular attention to the fact that Oregon headed all other states in the Union in the percentage of its citizens who had been drafted. One of all the 48 in the cost of administering the draft law. Credit for this remarkable record of efficiency is due to Major White more than to any other person.

After he had completed his work of organizing the state for the draft and had seen the first draft successfully completed, Major White applied for active service with troops and was assigned.

Speeder Pulls New One on Judge Rossman.

Car Unable to Make 30 Miles an Hour, Asserts Officer.

JOE ESKAZOR pulled a new one on Municipal Judge Rossman yesterday morning, when he was in court charged with speeding, having been arrested by Policeman Norene.
 "That car I was driving has only three cylinders and couldn't make 20 miles an hour if it had to," was a part of the unique defense set up. "The officer don't like my car," was the statement.
 "I never saw this man before," testified Norene, "and, according to my speedometer, he was going 30 miles an hour."
 "What have you to say as to that?" asked Judge Rossman.
 "Nothing," replied the defendant, but he kept on talking until told to quit. During his rambling statement, however, he mentioned that he has several children, and Judge Rossman said:
 "I am going to treat you better than you deserve. You are a father of children; your fine will be only \$7.50," and Eskazor nearly fainted. He paid, however.

Being late and speeding at 30 miles from an East Side street onto the Broadway bridge, over which she drove her car 25 miles an hour, cost Mrs. A. C. Meyer \$2. The only excuse was that she was late, but the arresting officer said in her behalf that she passed no other cars and kept in line on the bridge.

Going across Ladd Addition Sunday, bound for Oregon City and a big dinner with friends, J. G. Howe "shot her up" to 33 miles, according to the testimony of Policeman O'Halloran, who arrested him. He passed three cars in so doing, which called forth a lecture from the judge.
 "In passing those cars you set a bad example to those who were keeping within the law," said he. "It breaks down the spirit of the ordinance when those who are observing its provisions disregard them and leave them behind. You pay a fine of \$7 and cut your speed to comply with the law."
 Open mufflers are being campaigned against by the police and among those present yesterday morning was G. O. Gundersen, who was riding a motorcycle with considerable disturbance to the public. He was fined \$2 and was told to keep his muffler closed, "as the noise caused by faulty machines is a nuisance."

H. E. Klerman, driver for Kennard & Adams, drew a fine of \$5 for exceeding the speed limit, but excused himself by laying the blame upon his co-pilots. He said he had orders to make as fast time as possible, but said there is no speedometer on his car. The judge said he should get one.

CLOTHES LURE TO THEFT

"MARY BROWN" UNABLE TO EXPLAIN WHY SHE SHOPLIFTED.

Woman Arrested for Stealing Walrus and Gloves Declares She Did Not Need Them.

Mary Brown—it's not her right name—presented the most pitiable spectacle beheld in the Municipal Court for a long time, as she stood before Judge Rossman yesterday, charged with and admitting shoplifting.
 Forty-seven years old, with a son holding a high position in the city and with friends in number, she declared, the woman frankly confessed to purchasing two silk walrus and a pair of gloves from a department store last Saturday afternoon. She was detected in the act, arrested and locked up to await a hearing.
 "Why did you do it?" asked Judge Rossman, kindly.
 "Judge, I don't know why I did—I've clothes a-plenty at home, I didn't need them, but still I took them," she cried. "For God's sake, let me out of here without publicly disgracing me, for since my arrest I have suffered torments such as I never knew, possible; I've neither eaten nor slept."
 The judge closely questioned her to learn more of the details of her life, but she steadfastly refused to disclose her right name and was let go with a reprimand.
 "How true it is that the lure of clothes works great distress in many cases!" exclaimed the judge. "We have had many instances of this kind, but none more pathetic than this."

CHAIR WARMER WARNED

JUDGE ROSSMAN SUGGESTS CHANGE FOR RICHARD CROSS.

Youth Is Advised to Get Job, Quit Dillyng in Pools and Read Books and Papers.
 As a means of reforming the life of Richard Cross, chairwarmer extraordinary in the North End district, Municipal Judge Rossman yesterday made some recommendations which he thought might have a good effect, if adopted.
 "You have been warming chairs in North End poolrooms and other resorts," said the judge. "But this has done you no good; on the contrary, it has resulted in leaving you penniless and with no friends except a lot of cheap fellows not worth knowing. Is that not a fact?"
 Cross admitted the truth of the court's statement.
 "Well, I'm going to recommend to you a new line of endeavor. In the first place, you must get a real job. There is plenty of work at the shipyards and mills and no excuse for idleness at this time."
 "At night, instead of spending your time in poolrooms or other resorts, go to the library and read newspapers or books. Get the life of Abraham Lincoln or Jacob Rius and read them for your own good. Now, go and try to make something of yourself. Come back here, and I shall make a rock-crusher of you."

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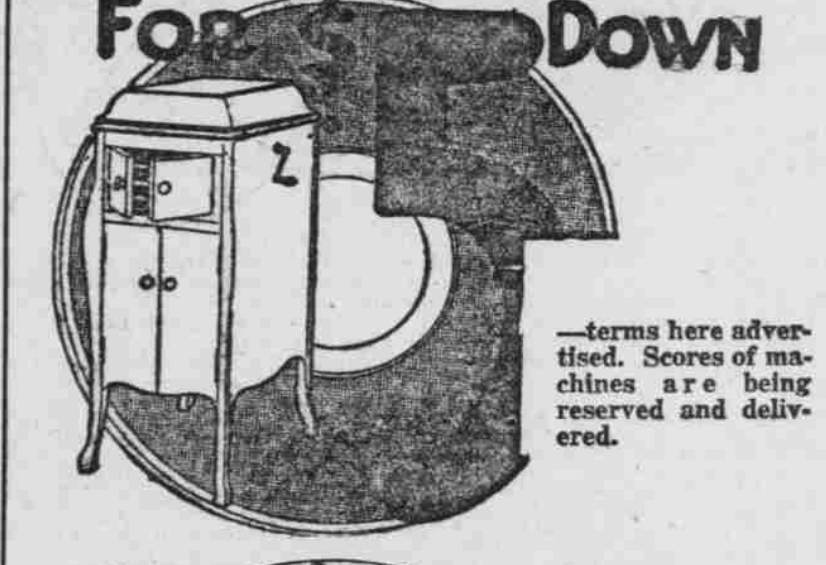
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Honolulu Chamber Elects.
